Heffering on Mach Three's untimely death: "I figured I had mine already"

Owner of Tara Hills Stud reacts to news that the sire of Somebeachsomewhere - and total progeny worth some \$100 million - has been euthanized in New Zealand.

David Heffering said he always believed pacing stallion Mach Three would end up dying of natural causes at a very old age to be laid to rest in a lush field in New Zealand.

"I figured I'd had mine already. I lost Astreos when he was Down Under. I lost Strong Yankee here at the farm. Now we've lost Mach Three," a devastated Heffering said Friday, shortly after word reached him that Mach Three was euthanized that morning (Jan. 20) at Alabar Farms in Waiau Pa, New Zealand following a paddock accident. Mach Three just turned 18.

"I always figured the rest of my stallions would just die of old age. They would stick around... Mach Three didn't deserve to die this way," said Heffering, the owner of Tara Hills Stud in Port Perry, ON where Mach Three has stood for 14 straight years during the northern hemisphere breeding season.

Mach Three — the sire of the legendary Hall of Fame racehorse and stallion Somebeachsomewhere (\$3.2 million, 1:46.4 world record) — suffered a broken leg in his paddock and had to be put down.

"The stallion handler went out to Mach Three's paddock at Alabar Farms in New Zealand and found him lying there not able to get up. After an examination from the vet, they found Mach Three he had a fractured tibia. There was nothing they could do and had to put the horse down," Heffering said.



Mach Three not only produced the winners of some \$100 million, he was particularly photogenic, too.

Mach Three spent all 14 of his years as a northern hemisphere stallion at Tara Hills Stud.

Astreos, who won the 2000 Little Brown Jug and later stood at Tara Hills during the northern hemisphere breeding season, was found dead in his paddock at Alabar Farms in New Zealand in October of 2006 after an apparent heart attack. He was nine. Just two months later, Strong Yankee was only four when he had to be euthanized at the University of Guelph after suffering a severe shoulder injury in a paddock accident at Tara Hills. Strong Yankee had not, yet, bred any mares.

The Horse That Changes My Life w/John Kopas

Tara Hills Stud owner David Heffering said he and his staff are devastated by the death of Mach Three.

Though both of those deaths came more than 10 years ago, it didn't make Mach Three's death any easier on Heffering and his staff.

"Mach Three was a good horse to work with, a kind horse to be around," Heffering said.

To add to the tragedy, Mach Three's death came the same day Tara Hills announced his 2017 book was full and closed at 140 mares. Mach Three was due to get on a plane back to Ontario on Thursday (Jan. 26).

"My staff is torn apart and wrecked by this. He was part of the family... This is family that has died," Heffering said. "We're in the livestock business and we're used to it, but no matter how many years that you're in the business you never really get used to it."

The fact that Mach Three cheated death twice before also gave Heffering hope the stallion — who is owned by the Muscara Racing Trust of Ivyland, PA — would live a long life.

Heffering said Mach Three developed colic before he first came to Tara Hills at the end of his 2002 season.

"I forget how many feet of intestine they cut out of the horse, but when he came to us he was just a rack of bones. He looked awful. We brought him back from the dead, basically, and he continued on and flourished. He's been great and he was a very photogenic horse for us. Lots of great pictures."


Heffering said a year ago Mach Three contracted pneumonia and nearly died.

"Still, clients stayed with us and we still bred 111 mares to him last year with good fertility," he said, adding that the Muscara family offered discounts to clients for the inconvenience. Now that Mach Three has died, Heffering said those impacted by his death would be offered discounts to breed to another of the Muscara-owned stallions. Other stallion owners with studs at Tara Hills have stepped up to also offer discounts, Heffering said. He said those affected should call Tara Hills for more information ((905) 985-7770).

Mach Three, a son of Matts Scooter out of All Included, has produced 1,297 offspring to date, with total progeny earnings of nearly \$103 million by Standardbred Canada accounting and \$97.5 million by USTA records. Standardbred Canada has Mach Three's progeny's average earnings per starter at \$112,034 (\$103,126 by USTA records). The stallion produced 298 horses that earned \$100,000 or more and 105 that made more than \$250,000, by SC records. He produced 437 horses than had a 1:55 mile, 274 that had a 1:53 mark and 30 that had a sub-1:50 mile.

"He's been a big part of the Canadian breeding scene and the North American breeding scene," Heffering said. "He made racehorses. That's what everybody tells us. You can breed to him and you'll get a racehorse."

Mach Three's six richest offspring are: Somebeachsomewhere (\$3.2 million), Monkey On My Wheel

CONDITIONS

- The fields and post positions for all races; preliminary, finals and consolations will be drawn by lot. All races 1 mile dashes.
- 2. A Trainer/Owner will be limited to 1 (one) declaration per division for each preliminary.
- 3. If there is more than one division of any preliminary race, each division will race for the full advertised purse. If more than three divisions of a preliminary race are required, right is reserved to race one or more of these additional divisions on the next two racing nights.
- 4. The declared horses with the highest money-winnings will be eligible to the final and consolation races. The final and consolation races will be limited to eight starters. Choice of a starter for those horses that are declared in of horses with the same money-winnings will be drawn by lot except that a non-stable entry horse will be given preference over a horse creating a stable entry. In the event not enough money-winners declare for the final or consolations, starters in the series that are not money-winners may declare and will be drawn by lot, to obtain a full field of eight. A trainer and/or owner will be limited to only a two horse coupled entry in both the final and consolation. Any horse that changes owner or trainer after time of declaration of its first start in the series will be ineligible to race in the finals or consolations. The consolation race must have six separate betting interests or it may be canceled by the raceway.
- 5. Purse Distribution: 50% First, 25% Second, 12% Third, 8% Fourth, 5% Fifth (Dead Heats will be divided evenly)
- 6. Declarations to start close at a prescribed time and date, and must be made for all preliminary, final and consolation races.
- 7. Should circumstances prevent the racing of any or all of these races, monies paid in will be refunded to owners of horses nominated unless one race of the series has been contested. In the event of weather or other unforeseeable cancellation of any preliminary race, no make-up will be made. In the event of weather or other unforeseeable cancellation of the consolation and final races a make-up will be made the following week. All divisions of a Preliminary must be completed in order for points to be earned.
- 8. One charted line meeting the qualifying standards is required within 30 days. If continued satisfactory performance is not maintained in races, additional qualifying line(s) will be required and subsequent declaration rejected until this requirement is fulfilled.
- 9. There will be no refunds for horses that are not properly nominated.
- 10. Yonkers Raceway reserves the right to refuse any horse, trainer, driver and/or owner to race in this series.
- 11. These races will be conducted under the rules and regulations of the New York State Gaming Commission and Yonkers Raceway General Rules and Procedures.
- 12. Judges official order of finish will be used in determining eligibility to the Final events, exclusive of all appeals yet to be decided at the time of declaration to the Final events. In the case of a positive drug test, all appeals will be excluded from eligibility to final events until they are resolved by adjudication.

(\$1.7 million), Mach It So (\$1.68 million), Solar Sister (\$1 million) and Camaes Fellow (\$985,000) and Down Under wonder Auckland Reactor N (\$966,000).

The late Joe Muscara, Sr. of Huntingdon Valley, PA purchased Mach Three in May of the pacer's sophomore season from Linda Magid of Cambridge, ON, the widow of the pacer's breeder, Karl Magid. Karl was known for founding the famed Lulu's Roadhouse in Kitchener, ON in 1984. Lulu's, which Karl owned until 1987, was a mammoth nightclub that occupied the site of a former K-Mart and once was home to the world's longest bar. It was also a frequent stop for some of the world's most successful popular music acts.

Mach Three posted a record of 7-2-0 in nine starts at two in 2001 and won the \$1.1 million Metro Pace at Woodbine in 1:51.4 while under the tutelage of Brett, Shawn and Bill Robinson, along with Monte Gelrod. The Metro victory came seven months after Karl Magid died of cancer.

The following year, Mach Three won the \$1 million Meadowlands Pace in a career best 1:49. At three, Mach Three had a record of 11-2-2 in 18 starts to give him a career record of 18-4-2 in 27 starts and earnings of \$2,376,700. Mach Three was predominantly driven by Randy Waples at two and John Campbell at three.

Mach Three stood his entire career at Tara Hills Stud in the northern hemisphere and Alabar in the southern hemisphere. His first foals hit the ground in 2004.

"The Muscaras have been friends forever," Heffering said.
"They're taking it very hard. All of us know this can happen in the livestock business, but their father passed away a few years ago and this is part of their dad's legacy to carry on. Young Joe has gone down to New Zealand to visit the horse. They are very close to their horses."


The impact of Mach Three's death on Tara Hills is immense, Heffering said.

"He's been a cornerstone stallion here for the farm and a marquee stallion for the farm... He's been a big part of the Canadian and North American breeding scene."

Heffering said Mach Three would be buried in New Zealand.

"We knew that someday he probably wouldn't be coming back here. We talked about him retiring one day and staying in New Zealand... where most of the time the weather is pretty nice and there's nice green, lush pastures," Heffering said.


Three business strategies for racing to embrace in a changing world

Racing often wrings its hands about the loss of on-track betting revenue and continually establishes policy to 'fix' this issue. The hard truth is that this revenue is not coming back like it once was. New strategies need to match reality, not be based on a wish.

I don't think it's a big secret that brick and mortar retail has been feeling the pinch. But we're starting to see more and more of it in the headlines.

About a month ago, Macy's announced they're closing 15 per cent of its stores in 2017. Macy's is not making this move because the economy is terrible, or because retail sales are cratering. In fact, retail spending over the holidays was up 3.8 per cent. The problem: retail sales are rapidly moving online — Internet sales were up 17.1 per cent year over year for the same holiday period.

These sales are flowing to businesses like Amazon, where gross sales have increased from \$6.9 billion in 2004 to over \$100 billion in 2017.



This is not happening in just one sector, but many. Today, Statistica reported that **Netflix revenues eclipsed the entire DVD and Blu-Ray US sales figures in 2016**. The changes in

music are even more eye-opening. Streaming revenue through portals such as Spotify and Apple Music was higher than revenue from on-demand video for the very first time this past year. It grew at a whopping 82.6 per cent rate from 2015. Seriously, when was the last time you bought a CD?

Racing has its own form of disruption in precisely this vein. People are not frequenting the track like they were; they're betting from home. The industry often laments this, and with on-track revenue falling, it's an issue. But this is the new normal. Each fall, the clocks roll back because of the tilting of the earth, but they can't be rolled back for racing.


Racing – both harness and thoroughbred – first responded to falling on-track handle (15 or so years ago) with a want to restrict customers.

"They're not going to the track, so let's make them go to the track."

Restricting supply, not selling signals to Internet partners, and focusing on offshore sites as a cure not a symptom didn't come close to working. When your first reaction in the new century — with new consumer paradigms and massive technological disruption — is to try and dictate, protect and control, you're fighting a battle that can't be won.

A decade later, we see similar strains of this strategy still at

work. Contest and fantasy websites have popped up, offering potential customers an easy gateway into the sport. These sites keep existing customers engaged and help stop them from doing something else, like playing poker, heading to the casino or playing fantasy sports. Racing's response has primarily been about legislating them out of existence, or trying to squeeze small amounts of revenue from them.

Another wave of industry response has been eerily similar, and we're seeing a lot of this today — racetracks charging Internet betting partners a higher fee for the right to show their races. This probably won't work very well, either. When you charge an advance deposit wagering company a higher fee, that fee — at least in part — is passed on to the bettor. As well, as a partner's margins shrink, discretionary spending on marketing, improvement of their product, and investing in technology, falls. Increasing prices, stifling demand, and taking money out of marketing and end-user customer service doesn't sound like a very good recipe for increasing the bet.

In my view, those are all 1975 solutions in a 2017 world. They don't have any hope of working long term. I think old-time racing is best to take another approach; an approach that fits more into where society, racing, and the consumer ecosystem in 2017 is. Here are a few suggestions:

Growth will come from productive partnerships

When it comes to knowing what makes bettors tick, the smartest people I have met in this business are not from racetracks, or racetrack ADWs, but from small grassroots betting sites. They know the customer intimately and they innovate to serve them better than racetracks could ever do.

ADWs are the store front and deal solely with customers. Racetracks are the back-end; they deal with entry boxes, horsepeople, food service and a hundred other things. This is an optimal business arrangement and it needs to be treated

as such in 2017 and beyond.

It goes the same with contest or fantasy sites. These sites service a completely new consumer through web-based deliverables racetracks are foreign to. Let them do what they're good at.

Racetracks need to "know their customer"

Anyone that walks into a racetrack is a customer a track can own forever. Horse racing's customers are a unique lot, because when they like you (and they like the game), they like racing for a long time, and present tremendous "lifetime value." They are yours, until they're not.

"Know your customer" is an actual regulation for stock brokers, and in my view, it should be one for racetracks. The lady who just walked in might gamble a great deal of money and goes to the casino often. She might respond to an on-track rebate and top-notch betting service. She might be worth six figures to purses and profits. It's your job to know.

The gentlemen who walked in might come very often, but he's very responsive when you walk over the fifth time you've seen him, introduce yourself, and buy him a coffee. It's your job to know.

Retail stores study their customer behavior all the time, and build responses to them and their habits. I know for a fact racetracks aren't doing enough of this, and have let high value customers walk out the door to the nearest offshore betting site or poker table. You can do better.

On-track wagering revenue has left the station: Focus on alternative revenue and lobbying

Fantasy boosts reality: NFL TV ratings hit a record this year thanks in part to fantasy football leagues

Fantasy football has broadened the game's appeal to include people who previously followed football little or not at all, and rewards viewers for watching from kick-off to the game's end.


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It's clear the sport has changed and large amounts of revenue will (continue to) come from sources other than betting dollars. The industry must seek out alternative forms of wagering, maximize it and keep this revenue flowing.

In 10 years, it'll be about more than just slots. Racetracks have to be positioned as the hub for many types of wagering that's coming down the regulatory pipe. This is vitally important, because when you stake your claim to a space, it's very difficult for governments to take it away.

Currently, there are smart people in horse racing handling this; those who know their stuff when it comes to governments and racing – Faraldo, Gural, Tanner, some in Pennsylvania and Ohio come to mind. But they are disparate, sometimes not rowing the boat in the same direction, and at times not sharing best practices or speaking with the same voice. It's not being done in an industry-wide fashion.

The sport doled out \$420 million in purse money in 2016, and in coming years some of this money should be used to get this lobbying talent on the same page, and build a brand. A 'Department of Harness Racing' that focuses on every state and jurisdiction (rather than just one or two at a time) can be worth hundreds of millions of dollars to the business over the next decade. It's too big a job for the USTA, and too important a job to not be addressed.

In the end, I believe on-track revenue consisting solely of betting dollars is never going to be what it once was. In harness racing, betting revenue will grow in the next decades through partnering with technology and exploring new mediums, not fighting them, or nickel and diming. It will grow when racetracks are incubators who cultivate, foster and know customers; servicing them in new, positive ways. The sport will grow by holding on to alternative gaming — and bringing more of it in through sports betting, etc — and that is contingent upon a funded, modern, flexible and strong lobbying arm.

The future might not be bright for bricks and mortar retail, but for harness racing, I think there's a lot of serious potential. If the sport changes its focus, I think it can be unleashed.





Allard appeals, given stay; back racing at WEG soon



The Pennsylvania
Horse Racing
Commission (PHRC)
confirmed Saturday that
trainer Rene Allard (left)
has appealed his

Allard, the third leading

money-winning trainer in North America in 2016 with nearly \$5.6 million earned, has been given a stay of his suspension and fine until his appeal is heard. Initial estimates are that it will take four-to-five months for the appeal to be heard.

Allard's lawyer, Howard Taylor, issued a statement on Saturday that said, in part, "Mr. Allard had one of five

positives for this medication found by the Pennsylvania Racing Commission within a very short period of time. In fact, a stay has been granted to all five of those receiving positives for Oxycodone by the Commission. The levels found in all five of the horses including Mr. Allard's were extremely minute, measured in picograms (one trillionth of a gram) which support the probability of environmental contamination."

Jamie Martin, the executive vice-president for the Woodbine Entertainment Group (WEG), said via text last week that WEG was not accepting Allard's entries for races this weekend while waiting to see if the penalty was appealed and a stay was given by the PHRC. When the appeal became official, Martin said WEG would begin accepting the trainer's entries again starting this Monday.

"Mr. Allard has a meritorious defense and suspicion as to how the contamination occurred and we remain confident that we will be able to prove this at an administrative hearing which has yet to be scheduled," Taylor said. "We are therefore extremely confident that Mr. Allard will prevail on the merits and that the matter will be dismissed without penalty."

Is this a make-or-break year for the Yonkers International?

Track officials are beginning to question the expense of reviving the international trotting event.

The \$1 million Yonkers International Trot, which resumed in 2015 after a 20-year absence, may be in jeopardy beyond this season.

"I would say this is maybe a make or break year," said Bob Galterio, chief operating officer at Yonkers Raceway. The mile-and-a-quarter contest, which is struggling to return to the prestige it enjoyed when it was held at old Roosevelt Raceway, is scheduled for Oct. 14.

The International debuted at Roosevelt in 1959 and soon built a reputation for its ability to land the world's finest trotters as part of an event that appealed to a global audience. Yonkers made a major commitment when it decided to resume the International as part of its effort to stimulate interest in its racing program abroad.

Beyond the purse, which makes it the richest standardbred race held in New York State, management makes a significant expenditure in its attempt to attract the best of the best while providing owners and trainers with first-class entertainment. A dinner cruise aboard a yacht that passes by the Statue of Liberty as it navigates around Manhattan is among the most popular activities.

Galterio is beginning to question the return on such a grand investment, however.

"The jury is still out on it," he said. "I think it helps us world-wide as a symbol of top racing at Yonkers Raceway. But there comes a point where we're going to have to sit down and see dollars and cents and say, 'Is this really worth it?' because it is a big financial undertaking."

Joe Faraldo, president of the Standardbred Owners Association of New York, is adamant that the resumption of the International will be rewarded over the long haul.

"Yonkers people are concerned that we don't make money on this or on that," Faraldo said. "But racing needs marquee events. You need the Hambletonian. You need the Little Brown Jug. You need the International."

Track officials were surely disappointed last year when Timoko, a runner-up to Norway's Papagayo E. in 2015, did not return last October. That ultimately left the International without a participant from France, a key market for Yonkers due to its simulcasting relationship with Pari Mutuel Urbain



Jamin of France won the first International (Aug. 1, 1959) with an ontrack attendance of more than 45,000 at Roosevelt.

(PMU) in that country. Elitlopp winner Nuncio of Sweden was another star that stayed away.

To make matters worse, Pagagayo E. was unable to defend his title due to an injured suspensory ligament. Last year's edition was won by Resolve, one of three U.S. participants in the 38th edition of a race that lacked suspense. Resolve, the even-money favorite, led throughout and set a record for a half-mile oval by trotting the mile and a quarter in 2:23.4 to easily turn back Italy's Oasis Bi.

Even if the International continues to lose money, Faraldo views that as a worthwhile loss.

"You can't always make money on everything you do," he said. "I don't really care whether we're making money or not in the short term. I care about making the product viable and the industry continuing on in the long term."

Secretariat won the NJ Futurity at two at Garden State Park to wrap up his first of two Horse of the Year seasons; John Henry winning the \$400,000 1984 Ballantines Scotch Classic. The \$500,000 bonus attached to it (NY Turf Classic also) made him the richest ever horse at the time \$6.597 million by virtue of the \$740,000 added to his account from that night in East Rutherford.
- 6. Jimmy Takter, the six-time Trainer of the Year and the last three in a row lives in East Windsor, NJ.
- 7. Donerail, a 1994 division winner and a standout broodmare sire, never left NJ to race in any other state.
- 8. The "Million Dollar Babies" 1986-1989, the "World Cup" 1982-1985 and the "Statue Of Liberty" 1985-1989 all were held in East Rutherford and attracted the best horses of all ages from around the world.
 - 9. The first \$1 million and the first \$2 million race came

- 10. New Jersey is the only state to have two races for two-year-olds in the same year valued at over \$1.5 million each, at two different tracks. In 1986, the \$1,562,500 Woodrow Wilson was won by Cullin Hanover (Buddy Gilmour) at the Meadowlands and the \$1,513,500 Governors Cup was won by Redskin (Bill O'Donnell) at Garden State Park.
- 11. Somebeachsomewhere lost his only race in NJ and finished his career in NJ.
- 12. Dave Miller, a three-time recipient of the Driver Of The Year Award, lives in NJ.
- 13. The first \$4 million, \$5 million, \$6 million, \$7 million and \$8 million handles came at the Meadowlands the first in the 1980 Meadowlands Pace and the last on Hambletonian Day.



John Kopas' career-changing moment happened 40 years ago, but the Ontario horseman remembers it vividly. It wasn't every day that a 22-year-old kid got the chance to drive an undefeated two-year-old pacing colt in a Grand Circuit race at Blue Bonnets in Montreal for Hall of Famer Alan Leavitt.

The year was 1976 and Kopas went to Montreal with his father, Hall of Famer Jack Kopas, to race Nat Lobell, Super Clint, Missile Almahurst and Jade Prince.

"As it turned out, Nat (Lobell) and Super Clint got in together. My father was the owner of Super Clint. The rule — and I don't know if it's still the same — but if you owned the horse you had to drive him," John said. "So, he was not going to be able to drive Nat Lobell because of that, so he called (Nat Lobell's owner) Alan Leavitt, and explained to him what was going on and Alan said, 'Well, let John drive.' Father said, 'Well, are you sure? That's a lot of pressure for a kid his age and with that colt being undefeated.' Alan said, 'I'll tell you what, have John call me.' So, I called him later on that

evening and he said, 'You go ahead and drive him. Win, lose or draw don't worry about it and good luck to the two of you.' As it turned out, I won with him."

Nat Lobell, a son of Nansemond out of the Duane Hanover mare Nardins Tempest, went on to earn over \$415,000 in his career.

"What helped there, with respect to my career, is the other owners in our stable saw that Alan Leavitt had somewhat endorsed me and I was able to get the job done with the horse and that opened the door for me, at a very young age, to drive a lot of other great horses that my father trained," John said.

"The other thing that led to was the following spring, dad sent me down to New York with a stable of horses and it was related to that race and Nat Lobell. By this time, we had quite a few horses for Leavitt and his partners in the New York area and they were very comfortable with me coming down there and racing their horses."

Well Said moving to Ohio's Sugar Valley Farm

Well Said, who has stood stud at Hanover Shoe Farms in Pennsylvania since 2010, is relocating to Delaware Ohio's Sugar Valley Farm, just a couple miles down the road from the scene of his decisive 1:51.4 score in the 2009 Little Brown Jug.

Well Said took his 1:47.3 mark in the 2009 Meadowlands Pace en route to being that season's Dan Patch Award winning Three-Year-Old Colt Pacer and Pacer of the Year. A winner of 14 of 26 starts lifetime and over \$2.5 million on the racetrack, he has proven successful as a stallion as well.

Well Said is the sire of 2016 Meadowlands Pace champion Control The Moment, 2013 Breeders Crown Champion Uffizi Hanover and 2015 Little Brown Jug runner-up Lost For Words. In 2016, he was the 12th ranked pacing stallion in North America by two-year-old earnings and ranked fifth by three-year-old earnings. A son of the prolific Western Hanover, and out of Artsplace mare Must See (\$487,122), Well Said brings one of the most sought after pacing pedigrees in the sport to Ohio.

Turning into the stretch, Jim Marohn, Jr. asked Crosbys Clam Bake while Opulent Yankee used the slingshot move from the pocket. Opulent Yankee proved strongest down the lane, kicking home in 27.3 to win in 1:53.3.

"Opulent Yankee took advantage of a great two-hole trip on the muddy track," said trainer Julie Miller. "It was really satisfying to see him at his best tonight. I'm hoping we can keep him together and have another good season here at the Meadowlands with him."

B Yoyo closed up the pylons to grab second with Crosbys Clam Bake backing up to third and Muscle Diamond rallying belatedly to be fourth.

Opulent Yankee returned \$32.40 to win and topped a \$289.60 exacta and \$1,209 trifecta.

Yannick Gingras made his 2017 debut at the Meadowlands after an extended winter break and immediately posted a driving double, winning with Can Do in the fifth race and Sheer Flex in the seventh.

Brett Miller led all drivers with three wins. 10 different drivers visited the winner's circle.

Total handle was \$2,744,956, up more than four per cent over last year's corresponding night with one fewer race.

RE: Sending harness execs to the track

Dean Towers wrote an excellent piece on "Sending a harness executive to the track" (story here).

It clearly shows that in this age of racinos that most any new customer that happens to check out the live horse racing for the first time, would just about walk away from all the confusion and that has happened with a lot to regular bettors too.

Post drags, high takeouts, inability to see horses up close (like in t-bred races), lack of live tellers and forcible use of self-serve betting machines without assistance, all add up to making the "experience" one that would chase away new customers.

Casino executives, for the most part, care only about one thing and one thing only, EBITA (earnings before interest, taxes, and amortization)... how much profit can they make for shareholders? Casino mostly make big profits from their games and for the most part, racing does not.

They understand that if not for racing there would be no slots, but that does not supersede EBITA. If something does

not make money for the company, change it to make it profitable or cut it out ASAP.

It is absolutely a proven fact that casino fans can and will enjoy horse racing and if made easy enough, will wager on them. But they have to been hand-held at the start and will then catch on. Everyone loves the majesty of horse racing.

We need to bring the horse to the people. Let them see them up close before the go on the track like the t-breds do. We need to take small groups on mini tours of the race paddock, meet a trainer and driver for five minutes trackside, get a ride in the starting gate. Show them how great our people are and then they will feel more comfortable about wagering, telling others, sharing on social media how much fun they had, etc.

And that should go for all racino executives and all employees too!

Clueless judges?

Race 10 at the Meadowlands last night (Jan. 14) exemplifies some of what Towers has written about.

I will not write a book about what happened and did NOT happen in the race. Looking at the replay yourself should be self explanatory (replay link here).

I stood at the Meadowlands with four other very seasoned handicappers/gamblers, and what the judges would not do in over 10 minutes seemed obvious to people with a combined 100+ years of watching and wagering experience. And to have no explanation other than "the 1 horse drifted causing the 2 to interfere with the 10" is simply not enough and incorrect.

Try showing that replay to aspiring fans of the sport, and then explain the rules beyond the basics to them. Then ask them what they think the proper decision should be.

Or better yet, show that replay to five sets of judges at five different tracks. I'll bet you get several different decisions.

Nothing is more infuriating to a bettor than uneven judging, and that's exactly what we get.

How five guys who know racing can see an infraction exactly the same way, yet have three judges say it is something different is beyond my comprehension.

Watching bad racing that should be at Freehold be transferred to East Rutherford is one thing. To watch clueless judging impact a result is quite another.

Maybe the judges can invite me to their office and we can look at it as many times as they did last night, and I can show them that the "infraction" that they took no action on happened after the interference, not before.

Two suggestions

I very much enjoy reading diverse opinions on horse racing. I have worked at racetracks in New Jersey for around 15 years. However, I have noticed a very obvious phenomenon. Bettors who win money at the racetrack almost never complain about how the races are run. However, fans who lose money often find multiple things to complain about. The trainer is a drug merchant, the jockey or driver held the horse back, the field was too small, etc.

Recently, I have been tweeting with some harness racing experts on some interesting topics. Conventional wisdom has always been that the size of purses dictates the amount of handle. However, results from Yonkers and the Meadowlands the last few years has shown that might not be true. The experts also claim that slots at the tracks are doing more harm than good to the sport. I would think that no track operator, owner, driver, trainer, or jockey would agree with that idea.

I would offer two suggestions which would make Harness Racing Update more interesting. There should be a section relating to handicapping ideas. This would be helpful to both new bettors and the less than professional handicappers. I would also suggest more articles on the lesser known drivers in the sport. No disrespect to drivers such as Tetrick, Sears, Gingras, Miller, etc. But, they have been written about hundreds of times. I'm much more interested in what a less established driver has to do to get mounts at different tracks during a week.

I've been following him over the years, a few times he has come to the Meadowlands during the winter months and picks up a few drives here and there. Mostly he would be driving long shots and not many favorites. However he would hit the board with some real nice place and show prices.

Last Friday night I looked over the entries for the Meadowlands and didn't see Billy Dobson's name in any races. Turns out he drove in the fourth with an 85-1 shot and finished eighth. But, he had another drive in the 11th with a 40-1 shot, Long Story Short. He wins and pays \$82. Billy certainly fits into this group. Maybe Billy doesn't want to drive here year round. That could be his personal choice, but as far as talent is concerned he's proven he can make the jump up.

There has to be some trainers out there with decent stock willing to give him a chance. There no reason he couldn't drive high priced stakes horses. I feel you won't be disappointed.

Fair start pole

When I saw the subject of Brett Sturman's HRU column on Jan. 20 (How fair is the fair start pole?) I had a feeling I would be writing a letter to the editor and here I am, though for a different reason. I agree with Sturman's assessment of wagering should close before the field is assembled so every horseplayer is given a fair chance. Alas, this will likely never happen due to horsemen and track operators' objections.

These two parties will object because they fear a drop in handle because the whales like wagering at the last possible seconds to see if they can take advantage of any late clue to a race's running such as a horse leaving or not, as well as the possibility of a horse going off-stride before the gate. To be honest, it is a legitimate complaint, assuming these gamblers will not adjust to the new normal. Quite honestly, the idea of an even playing field with the other gamblers is one the whales do not relish. Hence, while this proposal is in principle correct, it will sadly not see the light of day.

At least fans of Canadian racing have an advantage over American punters where there is no such thing as a fair start (other than at Hoosier Park) and it will never happen. A few years ago in New Jersey, there was a proposal for a fair start and while the racing commission agreed to formulate a rule, it took them two years for it to happen (of course, if it was something the tracks wanted, it would have been formulated much quicker), only for the rule change to be rejected at the final hearing, no doubt at the urging of horsemen and track operators worrying about the impact on their bottom line.

The sad truth is while racing commissions are supposed to protect the public's interests, their interests lie with horsemen and track operators. If they are united against a rule change, the racing public has no chance. This is why each racing commission should have at least one horseplayer on their board to represent the public's interest. Would this change things, I don't know but at least it would be a start.

Pelling was spot on

Recently, you had an article about the great trainer Brett Pelling's eminent return to harness racing. What I found particularly interesting was Pelling's comments about how to improve the sport. He had two suggestions. One was for every driver to use the same type of sulky. The other was to try and control the way driver's lean all way back in the bike.

I interviewed Pelling some years ago and found him to be articulate, smart, and frank. His suggestions about these two factors are spot on. Two of the main reasons why the sport has lost popularity is low payoffs and boring one-dimensional races. These problems are more pronounced on half- and five-eighth mile tracks, which are dominated by short-priced leavers from inside posts. But the racing could be much better on the bigger tracks, as well.

If every driver in the race leans way back, it makes it difficult for a horse to rally from behind, because it extends the lengths-behind margin by several lengths. Here is a column written by Jay Bergman of the Daily Racing Form that addresses this in detail (story here).

As for the bikes, Pelling recommended something like the Jerald Sulky. The Jerald is a wood sulky that is not off-centered. The modern day bikes are steel, aerodynamic, and off-centered. As some of you know, I've long been an advocate for a wood bike that is not off-centered. The sport would benefit greatly by using a sulky that's similar to the ones that were used when the races were much more exciting than they are now.

With the speed bias, half-mile and five eighth track racing has become too predictable. The exciting three- and

four-wide backstretch brushes are rare because the horses can't rally wide into the wicked third quarters set by the pacesetter. On some nights, almost every race is won by either the pacesetter or the pocket horse. If someone goes to the harness track for the first time and sees a bunch of wire-to-wire winners that pay \$3, why would he come back? You have to have off the pace winners.

There's another problem: every time a new generation of sulkies comes out, one or two drivers have the new bike. This creates an unfair advantage which can last for several weeks, or months, until every other driver buys one of the new bikes. Traditional handicapping goes out the window as you have to try to figure out, not which horse is best, but which horse has the best bike. It's crazy.

Pelling also suggested that the sulkies be colored to match the program number, which is a brilliant idea. Imagine, every driver has the same bike, no more guessing. And, horses win from second and third over again. We can only dream, I guess, because the people who manage the tracks don't seem to get it.
