USTA launches bid for national standardbred aftercare group

USTA CEO Mike Tanner says the industry needs to do a better job of looking after its retired racehorses, which led to the idea of the Standardbred Transition Alliance (STA).

USTA CEO and executive vice-president Mike Tanner is leading the charge to establish a national aftercare program for retired racehorses.

Mike Tanner said the decision to try to establish a national aftercare program for retired standardbred racehorses really took hold at a meeting at Red Mile last fall when the story of the rescue of Killean Cut Kid (full story here) piqued the emotion of the people in the room.

"There were a lot of people in the room and there was a lot of emotion and a lot of passion," said Tanner the CEO and executive vice-president of the United States Trotting Association (USTA). "I was

sitting there taking notes and listening, jotting down ideas more from a business perspective – how can we make this work?

"I started thinking that I have access to some people who can help with this and I'd like to think that they are with the USTA to address situations and to try to find ways to make things better. So I'm looking around and seeing all these people with all this energy and it kind of hit me, 'How do we use this energy? If this energy could be harnessed, if there was a plan to work on then we might have something here."

Thus, the Standardbred Transition Alliance (STA) concept was born. Though, Tanner stressed it is only an idea at the moment.

The idea — officially broached at the USTA's annual meeting this last weekend in Columbus, OH and well received by directors — is for the industry and the USTA to

provide seed money to establish an independent, non-profit group that would develop a set of minimum prerequisites and qualifications that a rescue organization would have to satisfy in order to qualify for funding.

Funding could potentially come from a number of sources, but one idea being floated is a mandatory donation of \$1 per start. Also being considered is a \$1 fee on all transactions processed by the USTA, a less-than-one-percent fee from consignors at horse sales and even the option for horseplayers to make electronic donations. Nothing has been decided regarding funding.

"In a perfect world, we would see the entire industry buy into it and support it. We would see the dollar-per-start idea that I put forward," Tanner said.

He said looking after the horses on which the entire industry is built is simply the right thing to do.

"It's a good business decision as well, and when those two things intersect it's a good thing to be pursued," Tanner said. "I originally came from the thoroughbred side of things, and it seems like they've been a step or two ahead of us on after care. I don't want to call it a void, per se, but a way that the USTA could step in and make a difference. I've felt that way for a while now and it was just heightened with the Killean Cut Kid situation and the meeting I went to in Lexington."

Tanner said it's also important to get out in front of the issue before animal rights groups focus more attention on standardbred aftercare.

"In any business or any endeavor, if you don't define who you are then you run the risk of having others do it for you," Tanner said. "In this day and age, there is a different expectancy regarding after care and humane treatment, whereas that might not have been such a concentration in the 1970s or 1980s when I was just a kid and going to races with my day when I was too young to get in. It's different now and that's something that we need to recognize."

The issue is also a personal one for Tanner.

"My wife has a pacer that she just retired and has been trained as a riding under saddle horse, and lives a couple of miles from the house. So we're really lucky in that we're in a position where we can support the horse, hopefully for the rest of his life. But not everybody can. There needs to be incentives and some sort of safety net for this issue," Tanner said. "It's unrealistic to say that we can care for every retired racehorse. I can't make that promise and I don't think anyone can, but we can do more collectively than we have been doing. There are a lot of people out there that feel that way and want to help and I'm looking forward to working with them."

Tanner said USTA president Russell Williams has "assigned a three-person committee to help answer those questions of what we do next. It's Don Marean, Jackie Ingrassia and Fred

Nichols. What I plan on doing is meeting with them, as well as some of the established rescues. Standardbred Retirement Foundation is on that list. New Vocations is on that list," Tanner said. "One of the concerns that has been brought to my attention is that if we go forward, will it hurt donations to the existing rescues. That's a concern. I think we have a good idea here, but we need to consider all of the downstream effects and build something that will be an overall net good for the industry."

Tanner promised to work hard to try to bring the STA to life, but he stressed it's only "an idea with some possibilities," at the moment.

"We'll work internally on this, find a way to allocate more money towards after care and I think the big thing is just buy-in from all segments of the industry," Tanner said. "The USTA can't go it alone. It's got to be something that every in the game, or at least all segments of it, support it. We need an alliance. It's not a USTA program as much as it is a USTA idea to bring everyone to the table and we'll all move in the same direction together.











Gural baffled by USTA stance on his marketing plan

But USTA CEO Mike Tanner said Gural's frustration may be misplaced.

Meadowlands Racetrack owner Jeff Gural said he's surprised the United States Trotting Association (USTA) acknowledged its members were supportive of diverting money toward a nationwide marketing plan for harness racing, but he's frustrated with the USTA's decision not to act on the matter as proposed by Meadowlands chief operating officer Jason Settlemoir.

A USTA News release about the Monday, March 12 closing session of the association's annual meeting in Columbus, OH said the following:

"In the closing session, Jason Settlemoir (District 8) asked the board to consider polling USTA members as to whether or not they would approve of five per cent of purse funds from tracks with expanded gaming to be placed in a nationwide marketing fund. Ivan Axelrod, USTA chairman of the board, responded that yes, he thinks that if posed this question, most members would say yes to 'spending other people's money' to market the sport. What comes next would be the challenge, since determining the means of obtaining the money, then determining who deployed the money and how the money would be utilized remained as questions too big to be answered, regardless of the results of a survey. 'We know what the answer is going to be, so I think that would make our members more upset with us because we couldn't do it, than by not asking at all,' Axelrod said."

Gural's take?

"I think what they are saying is pretty sad. They are saying it's too hard and it's too much work for us to implement, so, screw it, we'll just do nothing," Gural said. "We all know what the end result is going to be... it's not if, it's when. It's very frustrating, not to me because I'm 75, but anyone under 40 that thinks they have a long-term career in this business better go back to school and have a plan B because they are not... I guarantee that the founders of the Hambletonian Society would never approach it this way. They would look at it like they have an obligation to protect the members who are under 40."

USTA CEO and executive vice-president Mike Tanner said, "it's always worthwhile to market your sport and the product, (but) marketing needs to be defined and over the years that Jeff has been bringing the idea forward, the most detail that we've gotten is that we would get all this money and just hire a big marketing firm.

"All I've heard – and maybe Jeff has more details and we

just haven't seen them – is that we'll raise all this money to create a national marketing fund and then we'll give it to a big advertising agency or a big marketing firm and they'll tell us what to do."

Tanner stressed that he is not a USTA director, but his read on the directors' reaction to the idea of a USTA survey of its members on the matter is that it is unnecessary.

"We've already done this. We did it with the Meadowlands back in 2012. There was a survey that Jeff paid for, that the USTA facilitated," Tanner said. "It went out on USTA letterhead and envelopes even though it was Jeff's survey."

A USTA story on the subject from March 19, 2012 (full story here) said, "the results of a recent survey conducted by Tioga, Vernon and Meadowlands operator Jeff Gural was presented by USTA director and Tioga Downs executive Jason Settlemoir. The survey of USTA members in New York, Pennsylvania and Delaware asked if horse owners would be willing to divert one percent of purse money to improved drug testing and one-half of one percent to marketing efforts; the result showed an 84 and 87 percent "yes" response to the questions, respectively."

All that is moot, anyway, said Tanner. He said the USTA does not have the power to redirect purse money to industry-wide initiatives.

"We don't have the autonomy to take any purse money," Tanner said. "That lies with the state racing commission and the horsemen's organizations and that became very clear in the wake of that 2012 survey.

"There are laws, for example in Pennsylvania, that say you can't use it for anything except 'this and this'. It became clear to us that there were some major roadblocks there and I think there are people in the industry that think we are a central organizing body that has commissioner's powers and we are not. We're not at all."

Tanner said the USTA leading the charge on an industry-wide after-care program called the Standardred Transition Alliance (STA) (see story pg 1) that is asking for an allocation of funds from existing industry money — similar to what Gural is asking for in his marketing strategy —is simply a case of backing a program with a better chance of success.

"As to why the USTA cannot go out into the industry to pursue 5 percent funding for marketing when it now has decided to go out into the industry in an effort to establish an aftercare program, my answer would be that the STA has a better chance of happening than does Jeff's proposal, at least in the short term. The 'ask' is more modest, there's a plan on the table, and there's been vocal support for the idea from a diverse group of prominent industry members."

He also stressed that the USTA has led the charge on

marketing efforts in the past that produced mixed results.

"If you remember, the USTA spent \$750,000 over the course of three years to do a social media marketing plan and when we introduced that... part of that was people standing up in the room and saying we needed to do this, Jeff being one of them," Tanner said. "It was made clear that we would need buy-in from the rest of the industry in order to continue it. Over the course of that time, we, and I was definitely part of it, approached a number of entities in the industry and there was just not the interest to support that project on a mass scale, which is a good part of the reason why it just went away."

Still, Gural insists a major marketing initiative needs to happen one way or another or the sport is doomed to extinction.

"I honestly think that when the end time comes, people from outside will look at us and say, 'Wait a second, you mean to tell me these guys got \$500 million a year in subsidies from the government and they didn't use any of it for marketing?' They are going to say that they deserve what they got. That's going to be the reaction of the world, if there's any reaction at all," Gural said.

Critics point to Gural's marketing plan and say it will never be approved because the money is to be taken out of purses and tracks do not share an equal burden to market the sport.

But Gural said the money simply has to come out of purses because tracks have no reason to want to support such an expenditure.

"I don't think (participants) understand that the tracks — including me, if I'm just wearing my 'track hat' — all want harness racing to disappear as quickly as possible," Gural said. "We lose millions of dollars. Every one of us that has a racino loses millions of dollars on harness racing. They want to see harness racing disappear as quickly as possible, so they are going to do whatever they can do to make that happen and they are certainly not going to spend their money on marketing the product in order to delay the inevitable. I happen to be an owner and a breeder, so I'm spending my money marketing Tioga and Vernon, but there's no economic reason for me to do that.

"It's up to the people who are benefitting from the subsidies to make sure that it lasts as long as possible and not end in a short period of time, especially for the younger people."

Gural has been pushing for a plan to divert a percentage of purse money to marketing for many years and he said his frustration with inaction is growing.

"I'll tell you one thing and everybody better be ready to hear this... I'm done subsidizing the Meadowlands. This is the last year I'm going to do it. If I can't get money from the state to supplement the purses, then I'm going to radically change the racing schedule next year at the Meadowlands and it will be bad for everybody, including me as a breeder. If it's too much trouble to try to take five per cent of the money to try to get younger people interested, then I'm not going to subsidize this any longer so that the top drivers can take the winter off and enjoy themselves and the breeders, including myself, can sell horses for a lot of money and everybody is happy, and I'm losing millions of dollars and getting criticized for it," Gural said.

While the possibility of adding sports betting may help the Meadowlands' financial challenges, Gural said it won't solve the problem.

"That will help reduce the deficit that I have, but you don't make a lot of money on sports betting," he said. "It'll put people in the building. Hopefully, people in the building that want to bet on horse racing, but we used to get \$30 million a year, which we split with the thoroughbreds. That's what we need in order for the Meadowlands to have a viable racing program, because, basically, the only reason we have a viable racing program (now) is because I pay for it."

Is legal sports betting a friend, foe or something in between?

In part 1, we'll take a look at the bull case for horse racing.

The past several months have been a whirlwind for those following the path for legal sports betting in the U.S. Within perhaps weeks, the Supreme Court is expected to rule on New Jersey's bid to offer sports betting and many seem to think it's a slam dunk, evidenced by the 20 states that have already enacted legislation to take advantage of the change.

As we all know, betting sports is as old as the day is long. It's estimated that legal and illegal wagering on this year's NCAA tournament will total \$10 billion. Legal sports betting in Vegas has doubled the last 10 years. This is a market with tremendous upside.


What's that upside mean for horse racing? What does such a strong, new competitor do to the wagering landscape?

We'll explore potential positives below.

Sports betting and racing (seems to) coexist happily overseas

Early this century, the sports betting markets opened up in Australia. Turnover grew in rapid fashion – from almost nothing to over \$6 billion (AUS) in 2015 – as chart I (courtesy the Australian Racing Factbook) illustrates.

What's especially interesting about the chart, is that horse



racing handles did not falter as sports betting handles grew; in fact, they mirrored them. Clearly, we have to be careful making concrete conclusions (we don't know what horse racing handles would've been if sports betting was not made legal), but with all types of betting handle increasing, it's tough to say it was a death-knell for racing.


Moving to Hong Kong, where both soccer betting and lotteries are now direct competition to the Hong Kong Jockey Club, we see similar numbers (chart courtesy Bloomberg).

In the halls of the HKJC they are wary of the new make up of revenue; however, horse racing handles keep motoring. Hong Kong racing barely garnered \$8 billion (U.S.) turnover in 2007 and the trend was poor. Today, patrons wager over \$13 billion (U.S.) a season, and although leveling off somewhat, handles are strong.

When slots were introduced in North America as competition, the only major study concluded that pari-mutuel wagering (on site) decreased 21 per cent as the machines poached horse race bettors' pocketbooks. It appears the same thing has not happened overseas with the introduction and proliferation of sports betting.

Theoretically, as betting became more mainstream it created a culture of wagering as a pastime with the general





public, and these synergies allowed horse racing to benefit in at least some way.

Will the same thing happen in North America? Can these two competitors coexist, or even thrive?

Offer good bets, attract new money

A friend of mine wagers on sports (mainly soccer) at UK-based Betfair and he's a fairly large bettor, playing five figures per match. As he continued to generate ROI, he started to branch out, looking at what else he could model and play profitably via the exchange.



He began looking at racing and discovered a situation where he thought the betting bots were not working efficiently. He dove in and played millions, some of it going right into horse racing bottom lines via their share of takeout.

This is not uncommon. When profit driven bettors are offered something new to play – whether it be Daily Fantasy, sports betting, or racing – they often dabble in these new games.

Horse racing has an edge on one bet here in North American which encourages the dabblers: The carryover.

Garett Skiba was on the final table at the NHC in Vegas last month and plays Daily Fantasy Sports, but I don't see him play harness racing too often; unless there's an edge. When the mandatory payout at Hawthorne harness was announced last month he noticed it and, well, there he was, spending money on the positive expected value bet.

Woodbridge Ontario native Rob Pizzola is a professional sports bettor who might not know a lot about horse racing, but he knows a good wager when he sees one. Recently, he tweeted about a trip to Woodbine where he, like Garett at Hawthorne, was investing money in a super high five mandatory pay. With the pool larger than the takeout, any bettor worth their salt will fire.

Rob spent a few hundred dollars on the bet and his betting partner (his dad) spent about double that.

That's added money into a pool that horse racing would never normally see; from a sports bettor, not a seasoned horseplayer. It's all due to a good bet, with good value.

Making the tent bigger - how, and what's it all mean?

Let's imagine for a minute that TVG, DRF or Twinspires get into the sports betting business, and with their infrastructure already in place they use that advantage to attract myriad sports betting customers to their platforms. These new customers are not only exposed to the sports bets they're looking for, but they can bet racing in the same shop. In effect, the bettor bankrolls controlled by TVG et al, grows, as do the number of players. This increases horse racing's exposure to people with bullets in their accounts.

Players who have the characteristics of a Rob Pizzola can be marketed to for such things, like carryovers. A portion of their bankrolls could – in fact, if they're true value seekers – will enter the horse racing landscape. The sport which has



found it incredibly difficult (impossible?) to find new markets suddenly has a new market to sell to, without a lot of the hard work. The U.S. Supreme Court is doing most of it for them

Is this phenomenon why horse racing and sports has worked in tandem in places like Australia? Maybe, maybe not, but in my view broadening the tent and allowing new markets a conduit to bet horse racing makes some sense as a positive.

Conclusion and part 2

I hope in part 1 we've established the potential positives for wagering with the legalization of sports betting. And, of course, we didn't even examine it in a potential new revenue context, like Monmouth Park is expecting once legalized.

In part 2 we'll switch gears and look at the bear case. Namely, racing can offer their product to a new skill game gambling market under the same roof; one in which they've been trying to reach for a generation with no success. However, what's good for the goose is good for the gander. While sports bettors are exposed to horse racing, existing horseplayers who possibly rarely bet sports are now offered an easy, legal way to play, perhaps right from their ADW. I'll share my thoughts on just how worried horse racing should be about that next time.

Training Center in Florida.

"We have confidence because we put him in a position to be successful. We have a great syndicate behind him and we kept the stud fee at a very modest \$15,000 so people could breed to him for four years.

"I spoke to numerous trainers and everybody seems to love theirs, but Tony (Alagna) has 18 of them here, 11 colts and seven fillies. I've got eight, seven colts and one filly. Let's just say, we wouldn't give them up right now... they are pretty precocious."

Alagna, who trained Captaintreacherous, said he is conditioning 35 rookies at the Sunshine Meadows in Florida and more than half of them are by Captaintreacherous.

"I have 18," Alagna said. "I really like the American Jewel colt (named U S Captain). I really like the colt out of Fresh Idea (named Shipshape), a filly out of Bodacious Hanover (named Key West), a filly out of Apogee Hanover (named Odds On Clearwater) and a filly out of Take Into Account (Tall Drink Hanover).

"They all have a lot of (Captaintreacherous') traits. They are laid back, but they are very willing of their work. So far, I've been very pleased with them. They have a good work ethic and they don't get their feelings hurt. They like their job and so far they've been solid."

Bell said Captaintreacherous has been fortunate to have been bred to a long list of talented mares.

"I believe in first-crop sires if they were bred to the right mares and he has... If we would've bred those mares to Old Shep we would've been okay, but these mares got to Captain, who we feel is going to be an outstanding stallion. He reminds me more of Artsplace than he does Somebeachsomewhere, in his temperament and demeanor, I think he's going to be very successful," Bell said.

"Don't forget that he sold 20 \$100,000 yearlings in his first crop. Twenty."

Alagna also has a few progeny of other first-crop sires in his barn.

"I've got a really nice Sweet Lou filly. She just happens to be out of a sister to Captain, so I bought her more so for that, but I'm glad I've got a first crop Sweet Lou as well. I like her a lot," he said. "And then I've got three Trixton colts I really like. I didn't get any Father Patricks bought, I just couldn't find one I could buy. I was the underbidder on the expensive colt out of Designed To Be, so we bought three Trixtons and they are training well."

Alagna, who some 80 total horses under his care, also has a number of promising 3-year-olds training back, including the O'Brien Award-winning 2-year-old pacing colt of the year Stay Hungry (Somebeachsomewhere – My Little Dragon) and a fellow sophomore pacing colt named American History (American Ideal – Perfect Touch).

"American History was probably our best trainer down here (last year)," Alagna said, "but he got sore and needed some time. Just immature in the back ankles and we had to wait on him and when he come he made huge steps late in the year from where he came from.

"I think they are both going to be very, very useful horses. I think that either of them could switch back and forth at any time. Stay Hungry's got the more impressive resume and he's done it, been there done that, so it's just a matter of how they both come back and how things shape up."

Alagna said he's also happy, so far, with sophomores Babes Dig Me (Somebeachsomewhere – Western Babe), Western Ideal-Worldly Deo colt Odds On Lauderdale and Captaintreacherous' full-sister, Odds On Stephanie (Somebeachsomewhere - Worldly Treasure).

"We raced her one time at Lexington last year and she paced in :53, but just wasn't as good as I wanted her to be after that race so we sent her for a nuclear scan and she had some spots that lit up on her and we just shut her down. She's training back very well and I expect good things out of her," Alagna said.

From the Paul Kelley stable came two fast Cantab Hall fillies Evie Hanover from Epona Bluechip and Seaside Bliss out of You Want Me in 2:25/1:10/:34, followed by Crowned Eagle a Cantab Hall Colt from Red Hot Spicy, Have A Habit a Conway Hall colt from Habits Best and Hat Trick Marleau a Crazed from Catch Some Z's in 2:24/1:09/:34 all looked sound and good.

On display from the Peter Wrenn barn was Chin Chin Hall a Cash Hall brother to Cantab Hall and one of my favorites with Swanstotalpackage a Swan For All Colt out of Showpiece — in 2:23/:33.

From Lindy Farms the pacing colt Magic Joe Lindy, American Ideal from Lindys Bandita beat up on two nice trotters — Mischief Managed a Muscle Hill Colt from Susies Magic and Hall of a Dream a Cantab Hall filly from Luna Dream Om in 2:27/1:10/:34. They all were eye catching.

Also from Lindy was the unnamed Father Patrick from Highscore Kemp and unnamed Trixton from True Diva in 2:30/:34 — two outstanding fillies.

Some impressive three-year-olds were on display from Casie Coleman-Herlihy with David Miller and Steve Condren aboard. Summer Travel, Wanna Hall and Western Passage looked sharp in 2:07.3 and Play The Bell and Alexis Faith were very strong in 2:08.

Kelley showed off a group of talented three-year-olds. Russian Spy, Byway, and Keystone Tenacious all looked great going a mile in 2:08. They are by Credit Winner, Muscle Mass and So Surreal, in that order. Keystone Tenacious earned over \$100,000 and finished fourth in the Breeders Crown.

A fabulously-gaited Chapter Seven filly Quiss Me Bluechip out of Makeit Bluechip reeled off a mile in 2:25, but blazed the last quarter in 33 seconds, very good for a baby on this track. It was definitely equivalent to 29 seconds at the Meadowlands. She is owned in part by Grossman.

The one and only time...

The one and *only* time the following has happened:

- Brian Sears twice won the Horse Of The Year with an undefeated horse 2009 with Muscle Hill 12-for-12 and 2013 with Bee A Magician 17-for-17. Nobody has ever matched this.
- Susan Looney winning a Meadowlands race at age 16 (in June, 1984, with One For All). This might last into eternity with the driver age rule hiked.
- Only one female has won a trotting event in sub-1:50 time

 Hannelore Hanover. Only one female has lost a trotting
 event timed in sub-1:50 while doing so. Shake It Cerry was a long nose behind J L Cruze in 2015 during his epic 1:49.4
 score.
- Only one trainer has had the HOY on two continents in the same year. In 1997, Jimmy Takter had Malabar Man in the U.S. and Kramer Boy in Sweden.
- Only once has a horse won the richest race of all time twice the second one being a million-dollar event Niatross won the \$862,750 Woodrow Wilson in 1979 and the \$1,011,000 Meadowlands Pace in 1980, the first seven-figure event in the sport's history.
- Only once has a horse at the Meadowlands won a maiden race twice. It happened on April 20 and 24, 1978 with New Lew and Lew Williams. New Lew was eligible at the time of entry, a rule that was then quickly amended.
- Only one driver not counting Hall Of Fame races strictly for Hall Of Fame drivers won a race at the Meadowlands at 74 years 7 months old. Terry Morgan did just that on Friday, March 9, 2018, going wire-to-wire at 36-1. Morgan was born right smack in the middle of WWII (August 15, 1943).
- Only one Trotting Triple Crown winner has banked over \$2 million Marion Marauder. His 5th birthday was Tuesday, March 13. Note that the first six Trotting Triple Crown

winners all lived until at least 28, with the average length of life a touch under 30 years of age.

- March 16, 1979 was the one and only time a horse was claimed for \$100,000. Thomas Fay of New Hampshire claimed Taurus Romeo for that amount at the Meadowlands.
- Only one horse in the past half century Rambling Willie has twice been the richest pacer ever. How? He entered 1980 as the pacer with the biggest bankroll ever, but a horse called Niatross came in and had a lot to say about it, thus becoming the richest and the first \$2 million winner. But Willie was to race 3 more years, and at age 13, in 1983, he caught Niatross in the fall to re-establish himself as the richest pacer, only to watch a streaker by name of Cam Fella pass them both on Dec. 10 of that same year.
- Elsie Berger, who started Niagara Acres in 1947, was downsizing her broodmares in the mid-1970s. She decided to keep just one mare Niagara Dream the dam of Niatross. This coming after Niagara Dream had a couple of solid performers Minute Ms and Best Bizarre. The first time she paired her lone mare with Albatross whose fee at the time was \$5,000 BINGO, Niatross arrived. My guess is that this is the main reason that, later on, Albatross' stud fee zoomed to an industry all time high of \$75,000.
- The one and only time Cat Manzi drove Artsplace he set the world record of 1:49.2 seven years after Nihilator established the mark of 1:49.3 on Hambletonian Day. Cat is the all-time leader in drives, with over 95,000, making this even more of a statistical oddity.

Jimmy Takter is the one and only trainer to have three straight Horses Of The Year with two different horses. He did this in 1997 with Malabar Man and 1998-1999 with Moni Maker. Takter has also been first or second each of the past three seasons — Pinkman was the runnerup in 2015 runnerup, Always B Miki was the 2016 winner and Ariana G and Manchego were second and third, respectively to Hannelore Hanover in 2017.

- Only Hall of Famer Dave Magee could say that he appeared in exactly one Hambletonian. He was sent off as the 9-5 favorite with Dreamaster who won the Beacon Course/Dancer the week before and finished fifth the very same year he was inducted into the Hall!
- My Field Marshal and He's Watching have now made Art Major the one and only stallion who can say he's sired a sub-1:47 winner in both the Northern and Southern Hemisphere 1:46.9 for the 6-year-old Down Under bred My Filed Marshal a new mark there and He's Watching, whose 1:46.4 in the Meadowlands Pace still stands as the

fastest ever Pace in 41 editions

- Five-year-olds, for the first time, have been named Horse of the Year in back-to-back years —Always B Miki in 2016 and Hannelore Hanover in 2017.
- Hannelore Hanover is the only trotter that won the Horse of the Year award and has a sub-1:50 record (1:49.2 at Red Mile).
- Walter Case, Jr. is one of four drivers to win more than 1,000 races in a single season. But Case is the only one to do it with fewer than 3,000 starts in 1998 he had 2,993 starts.
- From Western Dreamer to Keystone Velocity, Western Hanover sired a Triple Crown winner with his very first crop (1997) and a division winner and a 1:47.3 winner with his very last crop-Keystone Velocity.

Captaintreacherous is the only colt to win the Woodrow

Wilson in sub-1:50, doing so in 1:49.3 in 2012. It was the last edition of that race.

- Stephane Bouchard recently celebrated the 15th anniversary of his epic day from March 3, 2003. He won 11 straight drives the last three at Freehold and the first eight at Yonkers. He is the only driver to pull this off.
- Brett Pelling is the only trainer to have won the Meadowlands Pace and the North America Cup twice and neither horse was named the 3-year-old pacing colt of the year. In 1995, Davids Pass turned the trick the year Jennas Beach Boy won the division crown. In 1999 The Panderosa won the Cup and Pace, but the division title went to pacing Triple Crown winner Blissfull Hall.











Cultural anthropology fuels success for racetrack management

I am going to make another point about racetrack management initiating the "partner" goal, so read closely track administrators. For this presentation, however, I want to steer clear from the pari-mutuels and casino businesses and support the importance of the measure from an entirely different perspective.

The late cultural anthropologist, Margaret Mead, will support this particular analogy, based on my experience working with her.

Trust me and read on, please.

Let me set up the circumstances, since the very notion of Frank Cotolo working alongside (no less in the same room publicly) the respected academic researcher/author/speaker Margaret Mead is unmistakably absurd without explanation.

It was the late in the summer of 1976. I was living in Brooklyn, NY, going to a New York City college and working weekends as a musician. This gave me plenty of time between college semesters to wander the city on no particular mission. One afternoon I met someone who talked me into doing volunteer work for the Democratic Party. On the slim chance that I may learn something about presidential-election politics from the inside, as well as contribute to the Jimmy Carter campaign's goal to beat President Ford, I agreed to do it.

The New York City Democratic Presidential Campaign Headquarters was located in a floor or two of an office building in midtown. It was a crowded, bustling atmosphere with ad-hoc offices strewn across the long floor, piles of campaign material here and there and volunteers like me, waiting for leadership.

The young man who lured me into this political machine turned out to be one of the top guys in the New York State campaign organization. We hit it off well, so he told me he would assign me to one of the major programs in the campaign. Though I knew I did not deserve such a position, I took it and was happy when I became a part of a vibrant program led by — you guessed it — renowned cultural anthropologist, Margaret Mead.

Ms. Mead was seventy-five years old in 1976. I had, of course, heard of her, but she was the last person on Earth I imagined meeting in my life, no less in the Presidential Campaign Headquarters. Of course I knew of her but I had no preconceptions. However, when we met I was shocked to discover she was not a boring member of academia, or a

political hack. She was a delight and extremely sharp for a person in her seventies who had thrived from living in far away places so dim and dark that they didn't offer post cards.

Stav with me, here.

All right, so what was the Margaret Mead program that I dare say supports the racetrack management partner revolution?

Ms. Mead represented a non-partisan program that would personally escort anyone to the polls as long as he or she was a registered voter, should they not have transportation or the physical ability to go on Election Day. Of course, I didn't entirely understand why the Democratic Party would create a program and employ staff members to go out of their way to assure that people who may vote for a Republican as well as a Democrat would get to the polls.

Ms. Mead's explanation was enlightening. Since there were more registered Democrats than Republicans in New York City, the program's goal was to get as many Democrats (who the program's research insisted would vote along party lines) as possible to the polls. It would not matter helping Republicans because there were not enough of them to win New York City and to win New York City would make it easier for Carter to capture the state's electoral votes.

Ms. Mead was correct. Carter won the city and the city more than helped win the state. It wasn't entirely due to Ms. Mead's program, of course, but a slew of people would never have cast their ballots at all were it not for her program.

Your raceway doesn't have to hire busses to assure new or old customers come to your track; then again, based on the customer research you should have, it shouldn't be such a far-out possibility. Casinos do it all the time, adhering to their research that if the customers cannot come on their own, the casino will go out and get them.

Think of this, racetrack managers: being familiar with and available to help your audience, as well as build it, has nothing but positive affects. Offering your patrons benefits



A conversation with Wally Hennessey

Wally Hennessey is still relishing the job he says he was born to do.

The 61-year-old Hall of Fame driver is leading the standings at Florida's Pompano Park, where he has long been one of the top drivers and is looking for his third consecutive title. When Pompano's meet concludes at the end of May, Hennessey will move to Saratoga, where he also has enjoyed countless years of success. Last season, no one won more races at the Spa during the three months Hennessey called it home.

Hennessey was born on Prince Edward Island, where he followed his father, Joe, and grandfather, Wal, into the sport. He made a name for himself in the Maritimes in the early 1980s, setting annual records for wins and purses, before traveling to Florida and launching a career in the U.S. that eventually led him to one of the greatest horses in harness racing history.

In 1995, Hennessey began a six-year association with the female trotter Moni Maker, who was Horse of the Year in 1998 and 1999 and Trotter of the Year in 1998, 1999 and 2000. Hennessey and Moni Maker posted many memorable wins together, including the Elitlopp, Hambletonian Oaks, Breeders Crown Open Trot, and three editions of the Nat Ray. Moni Maker retired with a then-record \$5.58 million in purses.

Hennessey, who entered Tuesday with 9,635 career wins, has been inducted into both the Harness Racing Hall of Fame in the U.S. and the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame, as well as halls of fame in Florida, New York, and Prince Edward Island.

Last year, Hennessey won 335 times and ranked 27th in North America despite competing in fewer than 1,300 races. (He was the only driver among the top 33 to drive in fewer than 1,600). He is highly regarded for his consistency, which has seen him post a driver rating of at least .300 in 28 of the past 29 years. His lone miss came in 2001 when he finished at .295.

Hennessey recently took time to talk about his career with USTA media relations manager Ken Weingartner.

KW: You're having another good year and your career is still going strong. What keeps you going?

WH: I'm still competitive and still getting some nice stables to drive for. I feel good. I work every day with the

horses. It was something I was bred to do and it's something I want to continue to do as long as I feel I'm not in anybody's way.

KW: When you're in front of everybody it makes it easier.

WH: (Laughs.) The racing game today, the strategies aren't quite the same as they were years ago. When you look at most racetracks, you'll see the favorites win anywhere from 32 to 40 per cent. If you happened to be getting the ones that are favored, and sometimes they're false favorites, but if you're the lucky guy getting the horses that have a chance at 5-1 and under, you're in the game. Over the years, I've been fortunate to be one of those guys.

KW: How have you seen the game change and have you adjusted?

WH: I would say yes. When I first started racing, which was back on Prince Edward Island, there wasn't a whole lot of power. But over the years, yes, with the way that the tracks are and the breed of the horse, it's changed. There is a fine line between the worst horse in the program and the best horse in the program. There's a difference whether they can beat one another, of course, but as far as speed or times of the mile, you'll see on any given night the cheapest class on the card will go (1):52 and the top class will go (1):52. It's a fine line.

As far as adapting, I had to adapt. If you're on a favorite, generally you have a 40-per cent chance of winning. So you have to put yourself into a winning position. Most times it means the horse has to be driven aggressively. Maybe in years past you could work out a decent trip with a horse and let somebody else dictate the fractions and still beat them. I believe today that if you let somebody else dictate the fractions and you're not in the right position, you can't win

that race like you did years ago. You have to be in position the last quarter of a mile, somewhere near the front end, or you're not going to win. Not all the time, but the majority of the time.

KW: Have you become more aggressive or have you always considered yourself aggressive?

WH: Oh yes. I think I always was a touch aggressive, but I'm very aggressive (now). But it's not about me; it's about what I'm driving. Yes, I'm very aggressive; probably ultra-aggressive. But I'm able to do that because of the animal I'm driving or the stable I'm driving for that does a tremendous job. I'm just the guy that they choose.

KW: What do you most enjoy about doing it after all these years?

WH: It's the same today as it was — the adrenaline rush. To be able to do this on a nightly basis, and the feeling you get when you win a race, that's really never changed. Whether it was a cheap race or a great race — and of course a more significant race is better monetarily — but it matters not to me. A win is a win. There is no greater feeling. Not many people get to have that adrenaline rush when you're doing what I've done for over 40 years.

KW: Well, you've had the highest of highs, that's for sure.

WH: Oh yes, that goes without saying. There was none better and there has been none better in my eyes than Moni Maker. Having said that, she made my career and she ruined my career. (Laughs.) I've said it many times, "How do I compare any horse to her?" When you've had the best, not that you don't respect other horses, but how many have come along that have been like her. She was a once-in-a-lifetime thing.

KW: I'm just glad I got to see her in my lifetime.

WH: It was a pleasure. When we were going through those years you knew it was special, but you really know later in life how special it was. You guys, as the audience, were probably more in awe than the people involved right in it with her at the time. But after the fact, I think anybody that's ever had anything to ever do with her looks back and says, "Wow." Even though we always knew she was extra special, but it's 20 years later and we're still talking about her. Whenever there is a poll about the greatest of all time, her name comes up. Not that everybody feels she was the greatest — I do — but her name is definitely mentioned.

Having said that, I'm just happy that in my harness racing career that I happened to be the one who was part of her career. I'm sure everybody involved feels the same way. We were lucky she was with us, not that we were with her.

KW: Do you still think about her a lot today?

WH: Her picture is all over my house. (laughs.) It was a special time for me. For me, she was my greatest of all time. You know Wally Hennessey — whether you've actually met him or know him or what — and you know him because of Moni Maker. You don't know him because he's won 9,500 races or because he's the leading dash-winner at Pompano Park. You know him because he was the driver of Moni Maker. That's plain and simple.

KW: You mentioned the wins, and you're coming up on 10,000. Do those milestones still matter at this point?

WH: When you reach them, yes, but when you're on your way to them, not so much. It's a number, and we're a numbers world, but I thought 1,000 was great when I reached it. And then 2,500 I thought was wow, amazing.

I remember when I was a young fella in Atlantic Canada, Clarkie Smith had won 1,500 races and I said to him, "Fifteen-hundred wins, I can't believe it. I don't even know how I'm going to get 1,500 drives." In my case, I've raced year-round for 40 years. I've driven in quite a few races and I'm getting chances to win. As long as that continues, I'm going. I don't care what my age is or where I'm at. But I will quit. You won't see me stop in anybody's way. I will quit before that happens. I'll know when it's time. It's just not time for me yet.

KW: I take it you'll be going to Saratoga again?

WH: That's always been my routine, even when I was doing well on the Grand Circuit and New York Sire Stakes. I believe doing the two things that I've done, between Florida and Saratoga, you couldn't ask for two better places to, not only to do your job, but to live. I've been in an environment that I wanted to be in. I did not want to be at the Meadowlands year-round. I was quite content with my career and the way it turned out.

KW: Has that contributed to your longevity and kept you fresh and enthusiastic?

WH: Absolutely. Not a question. I never get burned out. If you look at my statistics, any given year, I think the most drives I've ever had in a year is 1,500 or 1,600. Tim Tetrick won 1,100 races in one year. (laughs.) You know what I mean? I don't know how he did it. I feel 1,500 or 1,600 (drives) were the most I could go in a year, and I thought I was run off my feet. But I'm competing where I want to compete.

KW: How did you settle upon Saratoga?

WH: It was just the way my life went. I came to Pompano in 1986 and I was just coming down for the winter. Warren

DeSantis was the race secretary (at Pompano). That year, Saratoga was sold and Warren was hired as the general manager. We were done here around the first part of April. He started contacting me in February or the first part of March and wanted me to bring my stable to Saratoga. He thought my horses would do all right there. I said no.

He kept at me. Saratoga to me might as well have been New York City; I had no idea what Saratoga was. His final push, about a week or two before we were leaving here, was to tell me to stop on my way back to Atlantic Canada. That was it. It just suited my lifestyle.

If it weren't for Warren DeSantis, we would not be talking today. I was able to scratch out a living doing these two venues. And then the other stuff that came beside it, right? Warren was a big part of that. If he hadn't been persistent, I was going back to the Maritimes and I don't know what would have happened from there. I'm pretty sure I wouldn't have been heading down here again.

KW: It's funny how all those things work out.

WH: That's how life goes. Being in New York and starting on the New York Sire Stakes circuit, Moni Maker was New York-bred, so that's the whole ball of wax there.

KW: How is Dan? (Hennessey's brother, who has trained more than 1,000 winners despite losing sight in his left eye in 2002 because of cancer and suffering additional vision problems more recently in his right eye because of a detached retina.)

WH: He's doing okay. He's still having complications with his (right) eye. Over the last three or four years, his retina became completely detached so he's had complications ever since that, between being completely blind for a short spell to now his vision is average at best in that eye. But we still fool around with the horses. He was the leading trainer here last year at Pompano. This year when we came back, he had some more complications with the eye so we just cut back to around half a dozen horses. But they're doing good.

No matter what I was doing, I always had a little stable and he was the trainer. I go every day. That's part of my routine. That's good for me because it keeps me active. I like the horses. When you're doing good, it gives you confidence and when you're not doing good, you feel it. That's all part of it. That's the ups and the downs of the business.

KW: What else do you like to do with your free time?

WH: I'm a complete sports guy, but I really love hockey. As far as what I do, I guess the thing I enjoy most outside of this is if I can squeeze in a round of golf with a bunch of the guys. That's the competitive nature in a person. That you're

out there on the golf course trying to win.

KW: Do you win?

WH: Not all the time, but I get my share.

KW: What do you shoot?

WH: I'm about a 14 handicap. Sometimes better, sometimes worse. It's okay; nothing great. I wouldn't be bragging about it.

KW: So you're not going to retire and join the tour?

WH: No, I'm not going to the tour. (laughs.) Maybe as a caddie. That would be the only way.

KW: If you hadn't done this (harness racing), what do you think you would have done?

WH: I grew up in a harness family. When I went to school, I wanted to be at the barn. It was never about the future, it was just about today. I guess that's how I look at life now, for today. (Retirement) is coming, but I hope it's not soon. Racing, this is what I was groomed to be. This is what I spent my whole life at. I've never had another job.

I'm extremely happy. If you'd asked me when I was growing up if I'd have the career I've had, there's not even a chance. This wasn't even part of the plan. It evolved to what it was just because it happens. I just kept working. The work ethic has a lot to do with it as well. I just never stopped. And what keeps you doing that is the drive to get to the winner's circle. You're going to get beat way more times than you win. But I haven't accepted being a loser yet. I don't take losing well. I know it's part of the game, but I don't accept it. I don't say, "Oh that's the way it goes." No, that isn't the way it goes. We're going to try something different next time. I haven't lost that. I haven't been defeated yet.

KW: It's great it all worked out the way it did.

WH: I could never have imagined it in my wildest dreams, all the things that have happened to me in my life; to meet the people I've met. I'm doing exactly what I wanted to do. That's it all in one sentence. There it is. It's what I was raised to do. It's what I was put here for. And it's all I'm going to do.

It's no longer real racing."

"See, you're a traditionalist, you're blinded. You are a purist. However, the audience of purists is very limited."


We were approaching the interstate and he said, "Pull into McDonald's, I want to show you something."

I did. He showed me his iPad, and then said, "The top diagram is the one that I sent you. Obviously, you're correct.

The start of this race is scientifically staggered using complex algorithms. Six horses finishing in a dead heat is the goal. The purpose is an improved product with wider markets."

I looked at it again.

"Okay Trey, look at the photo finish of this race and tell me who won.



"Blue."

"No, blue was third, here is the order of finish."

1st 1:52.1

2nd 1:52.4

3rd 1:53.1

I looked at both diagrams and compared them to the finish order, but did not speak.

He did, and then he spoke like a Ted Talk. "All of your life, the horse that got his nose across the line first was the winner. That scenario is all you know. In this model, the horse that raced the fastest mile in this race was the yellow horse. Our math people gave me six different measurement formulas and it was not even close."

"That's just too bizarre."

"Bizarre is spending a great deal of money to get a horse to a stakes race and then getting stuck in the eight hole. Bizarre is having an automobile in front of horses. Bizarre is having horses fall into a single file line. Bizarre is the need to go a ridiculously fast first quarter. Bizarre is little movement in a race, and the most bizarre part of your sport is presenting a stagnant product that cannot be simultaneously used by the majority of the gambling public who do not want to think."

"How can you start a staggered race?"

"Open your mind. We have cracked the genetic code, we know what you prefer for breakfast, we can let you pay your bills with face recognition software and we make three-D printers that can build just about anything. Do you really believe that strategically and scientifically positioning six moving trotters at the start of a horse race is a gigantic assignment?"

"But, how?"

"My friend, we never ask how. We ask if we should."

"You info-tech people may be ahead of the curve, but having a horse win a race without crossing the line first is insane."

"We could make an argument for purists that a staggered system would make the race a truer test. Races would have safer starts, be more visually accessible, and more competitive. If the data proves the audience desperately craves that the winner cross the line first, we can deal with it in several ways, like splitting purses for the fastest mile and for the first across the line."

I put the car in gear and left the golden arches in my rearview mirror. For one of the few times in my life, I was speechless. It only lasted ten seconds, "That's all theoretical BS. You will never change minds."

"You underestimate the ability of people to change."

"You overestimate the ability of this fractured sport to change."

"No we don't. When the economics are in place, when we control the pipelines of information, your sport will change or wither. If the data supports your gamer, we will use our talents and our oceans of information to take your horses and, pardon the pun, run with them."

"Is that possible?"

"Anything is possible. In the meantime, I just sent you another prompt."

First Division

From post two, season-debuting Mach it So (Tim Tetrick, \$4) threw down an early series gauntlet, retaking from Chumlee A (Larry Stalbaum) en route to a handy (:28.2, :57.3, 1:25.3, 1:53.3) win. Chumlee A chased, beaten a length-and-three-quarters, with pole-sitting Bettor Memories (Kyle Husted) a three-hole third.

For Mach it So, an 8-year-old Mach Tree—Beach Dancer gelding owned by Bamond Racing trained by Jeffrey Bamond Jr., it was a 41st career victory as he nears \$2.5 million in career earnings. The exacta (two wagering favorites) paid \$11, with triple returning \$52.50.

Second Division

It was first-up and first home for Always At My Place (George Brennan, \$12.60). From post two, he engaged last season's series winner, Keystone Velocity (Dan Dube) after that one's intervals of :27.2; :56.4 and 1:24.3.

Always At My Place forged by late, beating a pylon-skimming Mister Daytona N (Jordan Stratton) by a head in 1:54. Christen Me N (Tetrick), angling from the pocket as Keystone Velocity tired, was third, beaten a neck.

Dr. J Hanover won by a length-and-a-quarter, with Somewhere in L A (Jason Bartlett) a first-up second and 19-10 fave All Bets Off (catch-driver Yannick Gingras) a loose-pocket third.

For second choice Dr. J Hanover, a 5-year-old Somebeachsomewhere—So Perfect gelding co-owned by Brad Grant, Robert Leblanc, Steven Wienick and Irwin Samelman and trained by Tony Alagna, it was his first win in

For Rockin' Ron, a 6-year-old Real Desire—Im All A Roan co-owned (as Burke Racing) by (trainer) Burke, Weaver Bruscemi, RTC and J&T Silva Stables, it was his first win in three seasonal starts. The exacta paid \$18.80, with the triple returning \$56.50.

Fifth Division

Bit of a Legend N (Stratton, \$21.60) seemed to be minding his own affairs in his '18 purse debut, when things worked out quite well for him. From post three, the 2016 Levy champ

Merriman hits 10,000 wins with victory at The Meadows

Aaron Merriman, whose quest for career win 10,000 suffered a temporary setback this week when an administrative ruling cost him two 2017 victories, got the milestone mile Saturday at The Meadows when he piloted Icy Crystals to victory in Race 6. Merriman collected win 9,999 with I'm Feelin Good in Race 3 and win 10,001 with Gee Wizz George in Race 9.

Merriman, 39, harness racing's "winningest" driver in each of the past three years, became the 13th driver to reach the 10,000 plateau.

On Friday, Merriman thought he had 9,999 wins and needed only one victory among his assignments at Miami Valley to reach 10,000. He got that win. Earlier in the day, however, Merriman learned that the appeals of disqualifications of two horses he drove to apparent victory last October had been denied, thereby reducing his win total by two.

"It was just one of those things," Merriman said. "I actually laughed about it. I try to block out all those things when I'm going into a race. I just literally enjoy racing horses."

Merriman maintains a hectic schedule, working daylight cards at The Meadows and often driving at either Northfield or Miami Valley — in his native Ohio — in the evening. He said he likely will maintain that pace for the foreseeable future.

"It's not the racing, it's the travel that wears on you," he said. "But it's the way I make my living. I am worried about my family, and I would like to spend more time with my kids."

To create that family time, he indicated he might be more

selective about accepting Grand Circuit assignments this year.

"It's a special feeling to be part of the Grand Circuit, especially when you get an opportunity to drive a nice horse," he said. "I might not chase the longer shots like I've been doing. I may evaluate things a little bit differently."

Even as he celebrated his milestone win, Merriman said his thoughts were elsewhere — with fellow driver Matt Kakaley, who was injured in a mishap at Yonkers last Tuesday.

"I'd like to give Matt a shout out," he said. "I talk to him about every day. He's doing well, but it's a scary thing. Here I'm enjoying this accomplishment, and he's in the hospital. It doesn't seem fair. My heart goes out to him."

Lots of guys are tough guys and have swagger until the steel door is locked behind them and they lose their freedom.

Prison is a good deterrent in this case.

The lawsuit will go nowhere. The gambler who instituted it probably knows that.

Caveat Emptor is in play here: If you are stupid enough to play the game, then you should realize what could happen.

This is how people who don't bet on horse races view this, and whether you agree or disagree, that's what it is.

Why not put this topic to bed already?

Loss of ability to participate in the sport.

Total loss of any possible financial gains from nefarious actions.

Prison time.

No excuses.

I understand and appreciate your article regarding the cheating and lawsuit. However, until there is culpability for all party's involved in the cheating it will continue.

The parties are the trainer, the driver, the owner, and, yes, the track and possibly the Racing Commission.

Taking away the purse money does not compensate the bettors. As a betting customer I expect that the Racing Commission has done their job in licensing the principals and that includes insuring there are measures in place to deter potential abusers. In any other part of life where there is an abuse of laws, be they drug related or otherwise, there are consequences such as misdemeanors or felonies. If the State Racing Commission has failed to uphold those remedies, I believe they are culpable. If an owner/trainer/driver knew of the downside of their cheating and those consequences, which I'm sure would negate their licenses, I believe the cheating would end.

So, the first level of responsibility lies with the State Racing Commission. If they were doing their job and applying appropriate legal deterrents, we wouldn't need the track to step in or worry about the betting public losing their money. I believe the State has failed in their duty to the point of an obvious and egregious oversight and that negates their immunity position. So let's put the blame where it belongs.

Now compare a DUI stop and subsequent fines and legal findings with finding horse doping violations. Why in world would we give doping offenders multiple opportunities to cheat again? In some states, if you're convicted of a DUI the first time, you are required to equip your vehicle with a license plate indicating you've had a DUI conviction. If I saw that entered horse had this type of notation, I would certainly avoid that race.

So, the bottom line is we need to press for a way to put the pressure at the right spot — the State Racing Commission. Protecting and Serving.
