# Campbell Captures Canada

*Alberta-based horseman Brandon Campbell captured the Canadian National Driving Championship Friday night at The Raceway at The Western Fair District in London, ON and will wear the Maple Leaf next year at the World Driving Championship being held in Canada.*

Brandon Campbell won the 2016 National Driving Championship (NDC) on Friday night (Oct. 14) at The Raceway at the Western Fair District in London, ON and will represent Canada in the 2017 World Driving Championship to be hosted by Standardbred Canada next August at racetracks across the country.

Campbell accumulated the most points during the eight-race driving tournament over seven other top Canadian reinsmen to earn the honor of representing his country on the international stage.

The 33-year-old reinsman from Calgary, AB advanced to the National Driving Championship after winning the Western Regional Driving Championship this past June at Century Downs Racetrack and Casino – one of four regional tournaments from which the top two point earners advanced to the NDC. This was Campbell's third time competing in the

NDC and his first victory.

"I've done this three times now, I'm thrilled," said Campbell. "I don't even know what to say."

Campbell put together a string of runner-up finishes in four straight legs of the NDC to remain a contender throughout the heated competition in which seven different drivers earned wins.

Campbell padded his leading point total with his first victory of the tournament in the seventh leg, guiding Wacky Rei (\$4.90) to victory. He secured the lead from the inside post with the four-year-old pacing mare and held off the pocket-pulling Shesastarreporter and James MacDonald in a photo finish for the 1:58 victory.

While Campbell said he was confident in his chances of winning the NDC title, there was an anxious moment when his mount broke stride at the start of the final race, leaving the door wide open for James MacDonald, the runner-up in the point standings, to steal the glory with a first or second-place finish.

"There were tears. I was crying a little bit," Campbell said of his reaction when he was taken out of contention in the final leg. "I was watching James second over, he was the first or second favorite, and I thought it was all over. He went to move her and she didn't have any go and I started cheering again 'Go boys, go!'"

MacDonald finished sixth in the final race, won by longshot Ivegetmyeyeonu and Trevor Henry, and was unable to catch Campbell atop the leaderboard.

Campbell secured the 2016 National Driving Championship title with 63 points while James MacDonald finished second with 57 points. Jason Hughes, the only two-leg winner in the competition, was third with 52 points. Jim Marino (50 points), Henry (45), Brett MacDonald (41), Guy Gagnon (32) and Corey MacPherson (30) completed the order of finish.

The National Driving Championship consisted of races two through six and eight through 10 on the Friday program at The Raceway. Drivers were able to have input into the horses they drove as a hockey pool style "draft" was conducted Tuesday for them to choose their horses in each race before the post position draw was made.

## **Another year of sweet memories in Ohio**

*The beloved Ohio fair circuit closed out its 2016 season on Friday, but left plenty of rich memories to augment a long history in the Buckeye State.*

It's over. But before the stopwatches caught their final mile, an informal marriage derby was held not too far from the racetrack, and Robert and Margaret Hayden walked out from under a big blue and white striped activities tent as the couple wedded the longest. The Haydens, at 71 years and counting, will hold hands and the matrimonial honor through the weekend's closing ceremonies.

Yet for those with a set of hobbles, as well as eternal and unbridled hope of victory, fair racing season in Ohio is officially over.

What started on June 13 at the Paulding County Fair in the northeast corner of Ohio when Say So Syd, a freshman pacing filly, won the first race of the day, ended here Friday afternoon (Oct. 14) in the center of the Buckeye State when Gliding Chip broke her maiden (after 13 misfires) in a dash with a \$1,000 purse.

For those scoring at home, the 63 fairs saw 8,578 horses compete in 1,466 races for \$7,960,299 in purses. The figures would have been a bit higher except that Henry and Montgomery Counties lost their race meets to weather and track conditions.

That Ohio's county fair harness racing season, by far the largest and longest running in the land, ended in picturesque Lancaster with Fairfield County's three-day meeting, is quite fitting.

"We've been here since 1850 and our fair is the last and

best," said retiring fair manager Dave Benson. "We're very proud of the Fairfield County Fair.

So much so, that Benson and his staff offer a Fairfield County Fair Christmas ornament for \$15 "to capture your cherished Fair memories for years to come."

The fair scene is so woven into the life of the local population that the students of Liberty Union-Thurston Local school system are excused for classes for the entire week. The school board calls it "Fair Break." The kids of the Lancaster City school system aren't quite as lucky. They settle for having Thursday and Friday off.

While fair time is fun time, the folks of Fairfield County did suffer a major loss in anticipation of the annual fair when on the morning of Sept. 24 their century old wooden grandstand, located in the first turn of the half-mile track, burned to the ground.

Police suspect arson, but there have been no arrests.

The grandstand had long been featured in photos of the Fairfield Fair. A memorial to it was created with a photo of the structure placed under a tent on the spot where the grandstand stood with the words, "Thanks 'Old Grandstand'"

With so much money on the line on the Ohio fairs circuit, the quality of racing is quite outstanding. And, since a fair is a fair, the fastest mile this year was easily the 1:49 turned in by Betting Line in winning the Little Brown Jug at the fabled Delaware Fairgrounds.

Grand circuit racing aside, the fastest mile was clocked at the Darke County Fair at Greenville where Atta Boy Dan, a regular at Yonkers Raceway, shipped in to win the Aug. 26 Gene Riegler Memorial in a track record 1:52.

What was Atta Boy Dan doing in Greenville? Not only was he honoring the memory of Riegler, a homegrown member of

the Hall of Fame, he was doing so for a purse of \$35,000.

Not only are fast horses shipping from Buckeye fair to fair, so are consistently good ones. Bourbon St. Hanover, who prevailed on Friday's final card at Lancaster, was winning for the 16th time this year. He ranks as the third winningest horse in North America in 2016.

And then there is Caramel Dumpling. The gelded pacer hung up his halter last at age 14. But before calling it a career he made 489 starts, many of them on the Ohio fairs circuit.

While records are sketchy, a United States Trotting Association official believes Caramel Dumpling is the most raced horse in harness history, including 56 starts in 2011. His last start? Of course, it came at Lancaster.

Race officials also show stamina. Gene Wiley of Richwood, a small town in Union County about a 25 minute drive southeast of the Delaware County Fairgrounds, has spent nearly 50 years on the Ohio fairs circuit.

At age 82, Wiley continues to work as a presiding judge at more than dozen fairs as well as filling in as a judge at three Ohio raceways (Dayton, Northfield Park and Dayton Raceway).

"For years, I had a few fair horses that didn't amount to much, but I got my starter's license in 1975 and that got me going as an official. I really enjoy the races," he said. "Favorites? I like the fairs in Lorain (Wellington) and Champaign (Urbana) Counties."

Gary Spiess, the presiding judge at the Lake County Fair in Painesville, faced a unique problem this summer. The mobile starting gate car was on the fritz.

"We had two options," said Spiess. "We could go with nothing, which would have been difficult, or to go with a pickup truck. We used the truck and it worked out well, helping to gather the horses."

Starter Dick Roth was probably the most challenged by the broken down car.

"We put him in a lawn chair in the bed of the truck with a walkie talkie," said Spiess. "He survived."

Chris Patterson, 64 of Cambridge, is the race caller at Lancaster. He is also the busiest of Ohio's fair announcers.

"I've done 23 fairs this year," he said. "I usually do about 30 fairs I year, but I slipped and fell on the ice and snow this winter and broke my right leg in three places. I was in a rest home for three months, recovering. The food was bad but I had a lot of 80-year-old girlfriends."

Patterson, after serving as the track announcer at Scioto Downs for a couple of years in the 1990's, has pretty much made a living on the fair circuit.

"I love the fairs," he said. "I know where to get a great roast beef sandwich, the best pork tenderloin, and I get a paycheck every two days. What's not to like?"

Patterson said his favorite fair is Wooster (Wayne County) because the horses are good and the bettors wager big money.

"But I think we've lost a lot of the big bettors," he said. "I wish we could get them back."

Another busy announcer on the fair circuit is Ayers Ratliff. He finds the time to wedge 13 fairs into his schedule that includes being the voice of Northfield Park and a city councilman in his hometown of Marion, Oh.

"I find the fairs very enjoyable," said Ratliff. "It's a great area of development for young horses and drivers. Also, you meet a lot of great people."

As for Lancaster, Wiley said, "It's definitely one of the prettiest fair settings. You have the leaves turning and Indian summer in the air."

Wiley said one of his funniest moments as a judge came this summer when a woman came to him with a problem.

"She said her horse was sick and wanted to substitute another horse for the sick horse," he said. "I had to straighten her out a little bit. Yes, just what we would have needed, a ringer in a county fair race."

Wiley is not only looking forward to next year's fair schedule, he's looking forward to walking down the aisle.

"I'm engaged to be married," he said. "I lost my wife of 58 years and three years ago I met a lovely lady."

Hoover Fudge of Canfield, Oh, has been selling sweets at Ohio fairs for more than 60 years. This year the employees served up a bit of politics with slabs of its famous chocolate peanut butter fudge.

Positioned on both sides of the scale that weighs purchased confections are candy jars with the wording "Tips for Trump" and "Tips for Hillary."

"We've been doing it all summer and the Trump jar always seems to have more money in it," said a Hoover worker.

But the guy offering Fairfield Fair memories they stretch beyond this weekend and this lifetime is Bill Boone. He is the president of Logan Monument Company and he has more than two dozen headstones on display just below the banked stretch turn at Lancaster.

"At 90 plus years, we're the second oldest vendor at the fair. Only the cane toss guys have been here longer," said Boone.

And the headstones and his newest product called Garden Tributes?

"I've sold two," said Boone. "They are not just for broken down horseplayers."

One of Canada's top harness racing executives credits a New Zealand born TV star for stoking his interest in the game.

Cardigan Bay, the kiwi pacer imported to North America by Hall of Famer Stanley Dancer, walked right onto the stage with Dancer on the Ed Sullivan Show on Oct. 13, 1968, just prior to a performance of Good Vibrations by The Beach Boys and a standup routine by Richard Pryor. Some 20 million viewers tuned in to the show.

Hugh Mitchell, the chief executive officer of The Western Fair District in London, ON, was 10 when Dancer leased Cardigan Bay and brought him to the United States in 1964.

Mitchell knew Cardigan Bay was a star, but he took more interest in the pacer on the racetrack.

"I saw him in Windsor and Toronto at Greenwood in stakes races," Mitchell said. "He pretty much raced at Roosevelt and Yonkers in the sixties. He was just one of those horses that dominated, but was very versatile. Half-mile tracks, five-eighths, mile tracks."

The pacer was eight when he came to these shores. Despite being a veteran already, Cardigan Bay became the first standardbred to earn a million dollars on the track in North America. Not long after reaching the milestone and appearing on the Ed Sullivan Show, Dancer retired the gelded son of Hal Tryax—Colwyn Bay. The legendary pacer was returned to New Zealand with great fanfare with thousands at the harbor awaiting his arrival.

Long before that point, Cardigan Bay was well cemented in Mitchell's mind.

"He was a horse that I always admired when I was very young in the business for his versatility and longevity," Mitchell said. "He really got me enthused about racing."

"There's been a lot of great horses since, but that was just my time in life that he was very impressive."

## Bring A Horse To School Day

Jennifer Dalton recently delighted her daughter Reign's grade school class when she arrived at the Fort Lee, NJ school on Thursday with gelded pacer Somewhere With You.

In what may go down as one of the greatest Show and Tell moments in school history, on Thursday (Oct. 13) Jennifer Dalton brought her six-year-old gelded pacer Somewhere With You to her four-year-old daughter's Fort Lee, NJ school.

"The whole school knew about it. It was really a once-in-a-lifetime experience for these kids. The owner of the school said, 'Jennifer I can't believe not one parent had a problem with their child near the horse.' In fact, a lot of the parents came to see the horse themselves and we're taking pictures with Somewhere With You. One of (my daughter) Reign's best friends, Paris, was sick with a small temperature and her mom brought her to school just to see the horse, so she didn't miss it. She left after we left to go back home. That means something."

In all 19 children – and some of their parents – had a chance to meet the horse and go on a jog cart ride with him. Dalton is currently planning a field trip to the Mark Ford Training Center in Middletown, NY – where Somewhere With You is based – to give the children a closer look at harness racing.

"I'm going to do it big when they come," Dalton said. "I'll have my friend Danny Dube and a few drivers come out to show them how fast the horses go. And, of course, give them all another walk/jog on the two-seater jog cart. We'll order pizza, touch the horses, learn about the equipment, let them watch races on our TVs in our barn, and learn more about harness racing.

"I feel all kids love horses and Reign is very proud of her

racehorse. She tells everyone she owns a horse called Somewhere With You and, 'It's a standardbred racehorse, not the kind you ride on its back. It's the kind you drive on a cart.' I'm not kidding and she's only four years old."

Dalton, one of the winners of the Meadowlands' Own A Horse promotion, went on to buy Somewhere With You in June. She said she was at Reign's school with the son of Somebeachsomewhere for an hour Thursday.

"We also showed one of Somewhere With You's races and all the kids went crazy," Dalton said. "The teachers said we made all the kids so happy... The kids were asking all kinds of questions. 'What does he eat? Where does he live? Is he friendly? Why do you use a cart and not ride on his back?' It was awesome. They learned all about harness racing and so did the parents. The parents were intrigued when I said he's racing at Yonkers Raceway after this tonight."

The Frank Caleca trainee finished fifth in his \$12,500 claimer Thursday at Yonkers with Dan Dube in the bike, but was a clear winner earlier that day on his trip to meet young school children.

A trainer friend of mine, Lee the Flea Tremont, was going to meet Phil at the gate two hours before post time. Flea is down to three horses, so he has a lot of time on his hands. He is an outstanding ambassador and quite charming for a guy who gets up at four o'clock every morning. After Flea takes Phil on a tour of the backstretch and gets up close to some horses, he will escort Phil to the clubhouse where Eddie the Exacta Clemmons, another racetrack charmer, will act as a personal tutor to Phil during the race program.

Phil reciprocated and set up my day. He knew I flew down



to visit my aunt May for a few days every July. Aunt May lives in a trailer park near Miami and I keep tabs on her. Phil used this trip to set up my everglade experience by giving me a brochure and a map for a hike on the Scenic Everglades Nature Trail in Everglades National Park.

It was a long drive. Every mile the traffic thinned, I soon felt like Survivor Man. When I stepped out of the car, the heat took my breath away. ## **Pacing Sire Trends at Lexington**

*An analysis of how the top sires fared at the Lexington Selected Yearling Sale this year compared to 2015.*

The average at last week’s Lexington Selected Yearling Sale was a record \$56,304, up 24.5 per cent over last year, when the sale was up 13.46 per cent over 2014.

Here’s how the pacing sires stacked up compared to a year ago:

**Somebeachsomewhere** sold 39 yearlings – 23 colts and 16 fillies – for an average of \$123,615. That’s almost \$38,000 more than he averaged for five fewer yearlings last year in Lexington. And it’s more than double what he averaged for 50 sold at a disappointing sale in Harrisburg in 2015.

Right off the bat, at hip number one, he sold a filly out of Put On A Show for \$550,000. And later on that night he sold a son out of double millionaire Darlin’s Delight for \$450,000. Another high-dollar sale was a son of Big McDeal for \$300,000. Forty-six per cent of his offering – 12 colts and six fillies – brought at least \$100,000. Eighty-seven per cent of them sold for at least \$50,000 – that includes all 25 colts. Only one failed to reach the \$25,000 level.

Sixty-one by the sire of Darlinonthebeach, Pure Country and Check Six, will be available in Harrisburg in early November. Captaintreacherous and Sweet Lou, each of whom bred 140 mares in 2015, will sell their first crops next year. The Pennsylvania market is very popular, but sharing the buyers’ loot with that pair will put pressure on SBSW’s bottom line at the 2017 sales.

**So Surreal**, a half-brother to Well Said from the second crop of SBSW, who was retired at two with a fast mark, sold three colts and a filly for a \$60,000 average – two of them brought more than \$50,000. He bred 130 mares in 2014. If he’s that popular off a severely truncated career, what will happen next year when the Captain comes online?

**Bettor’s Delight**, who has been the leading sire of all-age pacers in North America for some time, although he recently fell \$172,000 behind his younger adversary SBSW, sold 29 for an average of \$55,655. This is his second, and last, Pennsylvania crop. Next year’s group will be back in the Ontario program. The sire of Betting Line will sell 57 in Harrisburg. Bettor’s Delight sold three for more than \$100,000; 16, or 55 per cent, brought at least \$50,000; and almost 80 per cent sold for more than \$25,000. Last year he sold 25 for an average of more than \$42,000 in Lexington.

BD produces long lasting types that can win at the highest level, but he's never been an object of affection commensurate with his output at the sales.

**Art Major** saw his average drop almost \$16,000 from last year's sale. Thirty-one averaged a shade over \$39,000, down from \$55,000 last year. The 17-year-old stallion ranked third in the NYSS for both the two and three-year-old classes. His stud fee dropped from \$12,000 to \$10,000 in 2016.

**American Ideal** sold 15 colts and 17 fillies for an average of \$48,375, about the same as last year. Two colts and a filly topped \$100,000, while half brought at least \$50,000. More than 65 per cent brought at least \$25,000. On the downside, the 14-year-old sire of Funknwaffles, Candlelight Dinner and bedroomconfessions, sold nine for less than \$25,000.

**A Roncknroll Dance** introduced 19 from his first crop. They averaged \$36,421. A colt out of See You At Peelers brought \$120,000, while another colt and filly sold in the 50s, but most fell in the middle, with almost 74 per cent bringing at least \$25,000. Four sold for less than that. The seven-year-old double-millionaire stands in the tough, and soon to be tougher, Pennsylvania market for a modest \$5,000. There are 69 in this crop; 25 will be for sale in Harrisburg.

**Sportswriter** outdid OSS rival Shadow Play by a mere \$378 in average. He sold nine for a \$54,778 average. Five of them brought at least \$50,000 and all nine sold for more than \$25,000. Last year the nine-year-old son of Artsplace, whose promising son Sports Column was barely staked outside the OSS, averaged more than \$34,000 for 11 sold. Sportswriter is second to Mach Three on the OSS leader board.

**Shadow Play** only sold five; they averaged \$54,400. A colt brought \$70,000 and a filly \$100,000. This is up from last year when four averaged \$35,500. World champion Lady Shadow has put a charge in his resume

**Western Ideal** saw a colt out of a daughter of Worldly Beauty sell for \$100,000, but beyond that the results were disappointing, as six of the seven failed to top \$25,000. They averaged about \$30,000, thanks to the outlier. Last year nine by the sire of Rocknroll Hanover and Artspeak averaged \$47,000, but as was the case this time, there was a \$200,000 outlier and six of Eight failed to top \$25,000. Twenty-seven by Western Ideal will sell in Harrisburg. In 2015 twenty-two averaged \$33,000 there.

**Well Said**, who saw his fee cut in half to \$7,500 in 2016, sold eight colts and 10 fillies for a \$23,611 average. That's down from last year when 30 averaged a shade over

\$39,000. Control The Moment helped raise the ten-year-old's profile, but only one of the 18 topped \$50,000. That's a damning figure. 44 per cent sold for at least \$25,000, but the rest did not. Fifty-two will sell at Harrisburg. There were more than 60 available there in 2015, and 18 per cent topped \$50,000.

**Betterthancheddar** sold eight from his first and only New York crop. They averaged a robust \$50,875, with three-quarters selling for at least \$50,000 and all topping \$25,000. The Breeders Crown and Franklin winner now stands in Ontario for an attractive \$3,500 (cdn) fee. Ten will sell in Harrisburg.

The Indiana stallion **Always A Virgin**, the sire of world record holder Always B Miki, only sold one, but that half-brother to Ohmybelle and Bob Ben And John brought \$110,000, so it was worth the trip. AAV sells one filly in Harrisburg.

**Roll With Joe**, the sire of Messenger, Adios and Tattersalls Pace winner Racing Hill, sold nine for a \$30,000 average. That's down considerably from his \$47,454 average for 11 sold here last year. Only one topped \$50,000 and 55 per cent failed to exceed \$25,000. Joe was second to American Ideal among two and three-year-olds in the NYSS this year. He'll sell 21 from his crop of 64 in Harrisburg.

**Rock N Roll Heaven** averaged \$39,778 for nine from his second last New York crop. That was up considerably from the \$17,241 he averaged for 29 sold here in 2015, however, a sister to Band Of Angels and Romantic Moment skewed that figure when she sold for \$150,000. Two other fillies topped \$50,000 but two-thirds of the offering failed to crack \$25,000. Twenty-eight will sell in Harrisburg. Heaven will have a monopoly on the NJSS landscape in a couple of years, but by then that may be like owning a big chunk of the desert. Rock N Roll Heaven averaged \$39,778 for nine sold from his second last New York crop. That's up from the \$17,241 he averaged for 29 last year. A sister to Band Of Angels and Romantic Moment sold for \$150,000 and skewed the figures.



## NJ casino proponents prep for worst, try to limit damage

Backers supporting the New Jersey ballot initiative to add casinos to northern New Jersey said Friday (Oct. 14) at a forum in support of the measure that they have turned their attention to keeping the margin of defeat to a minimum, said an Associated Press report written by Wayne Parry.

The proponents acknowledge the Nov. 8 measure is probably headed for defeat.

Parry wrote, "Bill Pascrell III, a lobbyist supporting the measure, said that if the proposal loses by 20 or more points, it will be much harder politically to get it back on the ballot in two years.

"Our goal is to do everything we can to keep this as close as possible," he said.

"Ralph Caputo, a Democratic state Assemblyman from northern New Jersey, was more blunt.

"If we get clocked, we're not coming back," he said."

State Sen. Paul Sarlo is a Democrat whose district includes the Meadowlands Racetrack. He said, the next ballot initiative will attempt to approve a new casino only at the racetrack and there will be full disclosure about the tax rate the Meadowlands will pay. Track owner Jeff Gural has previously offered to pay the same 55 per cent tax rate that Pennsylvania casinos pay on their slot machine revenue, and estimates it would provide New Jersey with \$500 million in annual tax revenue.

Currently, the ballot initiative does not reveal key details of the casino expansion proposal. The ballot question does not specify where the casinos would be built, what rate they would be taxed at, and how the resulting tax revenue would be allocated.

"Under the current proposal, part of that money would go to Atlantic City to help redevelop it as a more non-gambling resort," Parry wrote. "Gural predicted a casino will eventually be built at his track, even if it takes six or more years. But he said he will no longer support giving any tax aid to Atlantic City in a future referendum, saying the city has refused to tackle its own problems.

"I will never go along with a referendum that gives all that money to Atlantic City," Gural said. "They had their chance; they screwed it up."

## World champ State Treasurer to Seelster Farms

State Treasurer, one of the best open pacers to look through a bridle in recent years and Canada's reigning Horse of the Year, has been retired to stand stud at Seelster Farms of Lucan, ON, starting with the 2017 breeding season.

Now seven, State Treasurer earned \$2,072,450 during his illustrious racing career during which he faced the gate 106 times for a top three summary of 33-15-16. Trained throughout his career by Dr. Ian Moore, State Treasurer's most successful season was last year at six where he earned just shy of one million dollars in purses and his life mark of 1:47 when he captured the U.S. Pacing Championship at the Meadowlands in a world record.

His other victories during that double O'Brien Award winning season included the Roll With Joe in a track record 1:47.2, the Canadian Pacing Derby, where he tied the fastest three-quarter mile time in WEG history, The Dayton Pacing Derby, the Mohawk Gold Cup and the Molson Pace.

It was the third straight time he'd captured the Molson Pace, Western Fair's signature race. Other major stakes to his credit include the Allerage at The Red Mile in 2014. During his three-year-old season he swept Summertime Series at Mohawk, won an elimination of the Confederation Cup and two legs of the Diplomat Series (second by a nose in final).

He faced and defeated many of the sports' best pacers throughout his career and was victorious over all sizes of racetracks. He is the first foal from Ideal Treasure whose other offspring is State Treasurer's full brother \$168,000 winner Hickory Icon. His dam is a full sister to \$593,000 winner Ideal Matters. ## Always B Miki leads Breeders Crown open pace

The world's fastest pacer, Always B Miki, who recently reset the time standard in harness racing to 1:46, leads a group of 39 eligible pacers for the \$400,000 Breeders Crown Pace, slated for Friday, Oct. 28, at the Meadowlands Racetrack.

Always B Miki, the defending Breeders Crown pace champion, is one of a record six Crown champions among the eligible pacers: the five-year-old son of Always A Virgin is joined by Freaky Feet Pete (2015 sophomore pacing champ); Foiled Again (2013 open pace); Luck Be Withyou (2013 freshman champ); McWicked (2014 sophomore champ); and Traceur Hanover (2014 two-year-old-colt pace champ). Both Freaky Feet Pete and McWicked have called it quits this season.

Also eligible is the sensational Shamballa, who was just one and one-quarter lengths back of Always B Miki in that historic 1:46 mile, and also defeated both divisional leaders Always B Miki and Wiggle It Jiggleit in a 1:47.1 score in the U.S. Pacing Championship at the Meadowlands on Hambletonian Day, Aug. 6. Shamballa is driven by the red-hot Scott Zeron, who is having a career year at age 27, having just won the Triple Crown of Trotting with Marion Marauder. Zeron has more than \$800,000 in Crown earnings though he is still seeking his first title.

One of four Breeders Crown events slated for the Meadowlands on Friday, Oct. 28, the Crown Pace will be featured in a one-hour live broadcast on SNY (SportsNet

New York) from 9-10 p.m. (EDT).

The battle for division supremacy may very well come down to the Breeders Crown, as 2015 U.S. Horse of the Year Wiggle It Jiggleit is not eligible to the program, which has stallion eligibility as its cornerstone.

The \$400,000 Breeders Crown Pace carries a supplemental tag of \$50,000, and supplements are due Monday, Oct. 17 at the Meadowlands race office. The starting fee is included in the supplemental amount, and at least 50 percent of the supplemental money, minus the normal starting fee, is added to the purse of the individual events.

Horses eligible to Breeders Crown events must enter by 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 18, also at the Meadowlands race office.

Elimination events, if necessary, will be raced on Oct. 21.
