Yonkers does away with the passing lane

But is it the right move to drive handle?

Cammie Haughton made news yesterday on the harness racing podcast Post Time with Mike and Mike, when he announced that that Yonkers will be doing away with its homestretch passing lane. Pending approval from the New York State Gaming Commission (NYSGC), the change is scheduled to take effect when Yonkers begins its 2018 racing season on Sunday, Jan. 7.

Haughton was recently appointed last month as the director of racing at Yonkers (full story here), and one of his primary responsibilities is to improve handle. Haughton said Thursday regarding the removal of the passing lane, "We're going back to basics... These guys (drivers) are going to pull. They're not going to sit in there and wait for the passing lane and go on through."

The decision to get rid of the passing lane at Yonkers seems to be more well received than not in the usual social media circles. But the question becomes, will doing away with the passing lane improve the Yonkers product and in turn, the tracks handle?

By any objective account, the style of racing at Yonkers leaves much to be desired. This, despite attracting the top

overnight horses in the country and having a driver colony led by Brian Sears and George Brennan. In his comments, it is obvious Haughton believes that the merry-go-round style of racing that Yonkers has become accustomed to, will change with the passing lane no longer an option.

I'm admittedly going to be in the minority in this decision, but I don't believe removing the passing lane will have the effect its intended to. Coming from someone who consistently bets into the Yonkers product, I think it may actually make handle even worse.

Let's start by looking at what brought about the passing lane in harness racing to begin with. Bettors became tired of seeing their horses full of pace or trot not be able to go anywhere in the stretch because of being locked in with no chance of going anywhere.

To accommodate for this, tracks began adding passing lanes to give more horses chances at winning. Horses that would have been locked in through the stretch otherwise, some would now have openings and a chance to compete. Simply put, the passing lane was put into place to give as many horses as possible at least a fighting chance to win.

Those such as Haughton who believe removing the passing lane will help racing, insist that drivers will now

become more aggressive. The thought process goes that without having the luxury to sit on the rail to wait for the passing lane to arrive, drivers will now need to make earlier decisions to pull their horses and race forward on the outside, instead of taking a wait and see approach on the inside.

It's not how I see it, however. While everyone laments the style of racing at Yonkers, just about the same people commend the aggressive and sometimes wild style of racing at Northfield Park – another half-mile harness track with a passing lane. Why the disparity in racing styles between tracks with similar make-ups?

The answer in my estimation is the inflated purses that drivers race for nightly at Yonkers (although Northfield now has slots, its purses are still dwarfed by that of Yonkers). Why would drivers possibly want to be extra aggressive at Yonkers if racing in a N/W4 condition for \$14,000 when they can continue to collect checks for finishing second through fifth and then do the same thing week after week in the same class.

Would removing a passing lane and forcing a driver to go first-over more than usual change that motivation? The rich purses that can be attained with minimal effort is by far the

larger reason for the type of racing that takes place at Yonkers compared to having a passing lane.

To me, the fundamental question is why shouldn't as many horses be given chances to win? If a horse is buried three or four deep on the rail but is overloaded, he should be given a chance to race somewhere in the stretch.

There seems to be this thought that there's no strategy in half-mile racing with a passing lane, or that the pocket-sitter wins every race. Both are far from true.

With the passing lane going away at Yonkers, what we're going to be left with is a year-round version of the Delaware County Fair. Racing will be dominated even more now by post draw, and the post position of a horse will be of greater value than the ability of the horse itself.

Some feel that by forcing drivers hands earlier with no passing lane, that races will become more unpredictable and will lead to larger payouts. Is creating unpredictability really something that is going to inspire handicappers to bet more? And even if that were the case, why are the payouts at the Delaware County Fair always miniscule? It's because those horses with inside posts are at an even more advantageous position, making things seem more predictable than ever. It all seems counter intuitive to me. In terms of improving handle, are there some harness racing purists left who may come back and bet Yonkers because the removal of the passing lane? For arguments sake, let's say yes. But what about those "precious millennials" that everyone is trying to cater to these days. The first bet a new young 20-something person makes in the sport where they see their horse never had a chance will quickly be their last bet. Plus from a visual standpoint, it's more appealing to see horses coming through the inside of the passing lane than seeing a bunch of horses boxed and climbing on top of the horse in front of them.

The passing lane obviously isn't the only thing Yonkers management feels that can be changed, but that it's something that can at least help turn things around. I'll be the first to admit if I have it all wrong and the removal of the passing lane turns out to be a big hit, but I think bettors are going to want it re-instated eventually for the same reasons the passing lane came to exist in the first place.

Diary of a Career Year, Part 1 of 2

Trainer Brian Brown recounts his fantastic - and sometimes trying - year campaigning top pacers Downbytheseaside, Fear The Dragon and Blazin Britches.

This has been a year of dreams for Delaware, OH-based trainer Brian Brown. He was the conditioner of trio of top the sport's best pacers – Downbytheseaside (1:48.3f; \$2,179,558), Fear The Dragon (1:48.4s; \$1,578,547) and Blazin Britches (1:48.4; \$540,424). Brown is a finalist for the Dan Patch Award for Trainer of the Year and should make the banquet stage with at least one divisional honoree.

The following is part one of a two-part look back at a memorable, yet rollercoaster year for Brown and his three top trainees. Part two will be published on Sunday, Dec. 17.

Tuesday, March 21 – Spring Garden Ranch

Brian Brown sends out 21 horses during the seven race qualifying session at the DeLeon Springs, FL training center. Blazin Britches wins the first race with Shane Bowermaster in the bike. Fear The Dragon won the 4th race with Hall of Famer, David Miller in the sulky. Both sophomores are timed in 1:57.1.

"(Dragon) was very good. Britches gualified that day and I

don't think she went real fast, but she was so impressive. Even back then, we were saying we weren't sure she couldn't beat Dragon and Seaside at that point."

Wednesday, April 19 – Miami Valley Raceway

Downbytheseaside makes his first three-year-old qualifying start, his first on Lasix. Chris Page steered the son of Somebeachsomewhere to a 7 ³/₄ length win in 1:53.1.

"We raced him clear up into mid-November. Dragon quit right

after Lexington. (Downbytheseaside) was turned out over a month longer than Dragon. So (Fear The Dragon) got a later start. No physical problems, just raced him a lot longer. As a two-year-old, right before the Governor's Cup, we qualified (Downbytheseaside) at Dayton (Raceway) and he showed a little bit of blood... I didn't want to come out in his three-year-old year knowing that they were going to have to go in (1):48 several times. There is going to be tough trips... We wanted to make sure, so we went to Lasix."

Friday, April 21 – Hoosier Park

Fear The Dragon wins his first start of the season in conditioned (NW4/5) event with Trace Tetrick driving. The son of Dragon Again wins in 1:51, last quarter in :26.

"It was muddy that day. When we first came home from Florida, he popped a gravel and it actually turned into a quarter-crack. Our blacksmith, Dave Thomas, did a great job of patching that. He went right to Hoosier Park. I was worried to death because the track was really hard. That horse raced like nothing was ever wrong with him. Trace gave him a nice easy trip."

Saturday, May 6 - The Meadows

Downbytheseaside makes his sophomore season debut in one of four divisions of the Pennsylvania Sire Stakes during the Kentucky Derby Day matinee card. Chris Page was able to use an off-the-pace trip to score in 1:52.1. Fear The Dragon (Trace Tetrick) wins the first \$37,820 division by an identical 1¼ lengths in the same time.

Fear The Dragon was feeling particularly good in preparation for the NA Cup.

"It was just (Downbytheseaside's) first race on the schedule. We had a great qualifier the week before and we felt he was ready to go and Chris did a great job. It was terribly muddy that day, the track was awful. Chris gave him a nice easy trip, let him settle off the gate, moved him at the 3/8's and he cleared down the backstretch. I don't even think Chris pulled the (ear) plugs that day. He was really in hand. It was a great race for his first

start. It was a good chance for us to pay Chris back for all the things he does for me. He qualified that horse, he shows up and helps me train if I ever need him to. It was a good time for Chris to drive that horse. As you can tell later down the road, it was great for all of us that he got to drive him a couple of times."

Saturday, May 27 – Yonkers Racetrack

David Miller guides Downbytheseaside to a 31/4 length win in the \$300,000 Art Rooney Final in 1:52.

"We went into the Rooney, we kind of planned this a little bit at stakes (payment) time. The horse is great on a half. He set a world record as a two-year-old on a half. The money was great and the race had not been as tough as it had been years ago. We planned this going in. This way it got us away from Dragon and Huntsville for a while. We planned later to go the Messenger and we thought if we could do well in these two races we won't need to worry about the sire stakes championship. The money was better and we got away from Huntsville and Dragon at the time."

Saturday, June 10 - Mohawk Raceway

Twenty five sophomore colts entered the 34th edition of the North America Cup forcing three eliminations. Downbytheseaside (David Miller) took the first elimination in easy fashion in a final time of 1:50.4. Fear The Dragon also enjoyed an easy trip, cruising down the lane until the shadow of the wire, when he jumped a discarded head number laying in the middle of the track. David Miller was able to gather Fear The Dragon back together and won by 1 ½ lengths in 1:50.

"That night Seaside didn't finish as well as he should, he wasn't strong, but he was doing that in the Rooney. He would go just enough to get away from them, then he would cruise home. He did the same thing that night. David was probably a lot more worried about it than I was. I thought he was just waiting on horses. Dragon was really sharp at the time. Even though he jumped the head number coming down the stretch that night, he was drawing off. He was going to win in under (1):50 that night. It really wasn't Dragon's kind of race. He made the front early and he was always much better from behind. When he jumped that head number, I was like 'holy smokes, what just happened?' I couldn't see (the head number) at the time. Before I got to the winner's circle people were telling me they saw it on the replay. Both were actually very good that night even though Seaside wasn't charging through the wire."

On the NA Cup elim undercard, eliminations for the Fan Hanover were also held, without Blazin Britches, who was suffering from a gravel.

"Britches had a gravel and it took like two weeks for it to pop. It finally came out the bottom of the foot. We sent her to the

farm and they worked on the foot over there. Her blacksmith (Eric Thomas) got trimming it out and found the hole. She had to miss the Fan Hanover and the James Lynch. We were really wanting to go, she was winning races at Hoosier Park, beating older mares. We were disappointed that we could not go to Canada or Pocono with her."

Saturday, June 17 – Mohawk Raceway

Just days after having to choose between the two elimination winners, David Miller drives Fear The Dragon to a three-quarter length victory over Huntsville to win the \$730,000 North America Cup Final in 1:48.4. The pacesetting Downbytheseaside and new pilot Brian Sears held on for third.

"Leading up to the final, we had a great week. Those horses were really good at the time. We did everything that we were supposed to do. We had them checked out, scoped them, pulled their blood. They were trained light in the middle (of the week), so I didn't train them hard enough so I couldn't say anything could be wrong. We turned them out every day, they were out there playing every day. We went into that final not really that nervous. I had been in a big race before, but never with horses

that really had a shot. Leading up to that week, it was actually very fun because we had a lot of people, interviews, people just coming by (the barn) talking. I didn't get nervous, because I knew we did everything we were supposed to do. The horses were going into the race in really good shape and I thought we would do well. I didn't go in expecting to win, but I thought I sure had a chance with either horse."

Saturday, July 1 – Pocono Downs

The three-year-old colt pacers invaded eastern Pennsylvania for the Max Hempt Memorial. Saddled with post #8, Downbytheseaside was used hard to get the lead and faded to fifth. Once again, David Miller gave Fear The Dragon a perfect drive to take half of the \$500,000 purse in 1:49.3. After the race, Downbytheseaside showed signs of sickness.

"When you race two horses like that and one wins and the other one does not race well, you are in the winner's circle but you are not enjoying the win. You are not enjoying the moment because you are worried about the one that didn't race well. You are happy that (Dragon) was great again, but the other one wasn't as good as he was supposed to be. It was a good night, but it was also a sleepless, worrisome night."

Tuesday, July 4 – Meadowlands Racetrack

A total of 13 sophomore pacers enter the Meadowlands Pace. The connections of Downbytheseaside elected to accept a bye into the final. Fear The Dragon's owner, Bruce Trogdon of Emerald Highlands Farm, elected to skip classic event due to the Meadowlands' 150-mile stabling rule that would have forced the Ohio-based pacer to stay in New Jersey for two weeks.

"Bruce and I both understand what Jeff (Gural) was after. Being from Ohio and Dr. (Ian) Moore being from Canada, we were the only ones that were affected by the rule. Everyone else was within that area. Huntsville was from within the area and got to stay in his own barn, his own trainer and got to do his own routine. If Dragon could have taken a bye and Jeff would said you don't have to come until the week before, we would have gladly put in that race and came out the week before. But with Seaside taking the bye, we still had to be there (nearly two weeks)... It was in Seaside's plan to go. Dragon was going to race eight straight weeks, so we didn't stake Dragon because we knew we were going to skip one (race). Dragon got to go to Bruce's farm and he took that whole week off. Down the road, it actually worked out to Dragon's benefit to just forget about that race."

Fear The Dragon skipped the Meadowlands Pace, but was able to get an important break at Emerald Highlands in Ohio.

Saturday, July 29 - The Meadows

Adios Pace days have always been special for Trogdon. This year was no different when freshman colt pacer, Whatstroublnurocky won a division of the Arden Downs, Blazin Britches won the Adio Volo and Fear The Dragon took the Adios Pace Final.

"(The three winners) were all owned by Bruce. It was all Bruce that day. Everything worked out great. To tell you the truth I thought Britches was more impressive that day than Dragon was. She pulled past the half and went by a really good horse in Bettor's Up. We were still a little cautious at the head of the stretch because she made such a huge move down the backstretch. She opened up a couple of lengths. It looked like Bettor's Up was maybe starting to catch her at the top of the stretch. As they headed down the stretch, Britches wasn't pulling away from her, but she couldn't gain on her. She was very, very impressive that week."

Saturday, Aug. 5 – Meadowlands Racetrack

Hambletonian Day is a day for champions. Blazin Britches opened some eyes with her track record equaling 1:48.4 win in the Shady Daisy. Downbytheseaside finished third in the \$334,325 Cane Pace.

"I didn't expect her to go the (1):48.4 and she probably could have paced more that day. All we wanted was to win the race. It was Hambletonian Day, everyone is watching Hambletonian Day. Maybe a lot of people didn't see the Adio Volo, but after that day, everyone knew who she was.

"We were going with Seaside and we even thought about putting Dragon in the Cane. We had raced Dragon hard the week before. We just said 'no, we will just skip again and stick to the plan.' We stuck to the schedule and it worked out for the both of them."

Stakes scheduling, the secret to life and curing tie-up

Barry Lefkowitz asks: On the subject of staking, what is your general feeling on the way tracks and states schedule stakes? As a trainer, how do you go about the staking process? Do you like the conflicts in the staking schedule? What about stakes close together like four or five days? In the case of dual eligible horses, should the schedule accommodate the dual eligibility?

The race secretaries meet every December in Florida and do the best they can to solve this puzzle. Conflicts with indigenous races and Grand Circuit races are bound to happen especially now with expanded slot money in the Midwestern states there are home to more sires stake races than ever. Unfortunately there are not enough days of summer and fall to accommodate all the races in an orderly fashion.

Dealing with trotters it is a lot easier to plan a stake schedule than with pacers. Trotters, with exceptional ability are far more evident at stake time for two-year-olds than are pacers. With a pacer, you are lucky if you know after the first start. I personally always made stake payments to Sire Stake races, but as my entire barn would go west to Springfield and DuQuoin right after the Hambletonian, any owner who would want to skip the Grand Circuit and go the sires route would have to give the horses to another trainer. I truly miss the Midwest swing. If it wasn't for the demise of Illinois racing I would still be training horses. My relationship with Doc Narotsky and his family and Phil Langley will always remain a bright spot in my life.

Back to your question, there is nothing hard about staking. It is almost rote. In an outfit where you are buying expensive yearlings, if you don't stake to the Grand Circuit you can't get out. The money is only there if you stake. There is no worse feeling than looking over a stall door at a top horse with no place to race. horse that can't beat one or two others. You can duck them and may win somewhere else, but these conflicts are very rare especially at the age of two.

As far as stakes being four or five days apart, I have not seen that much at all. You would have to show me a situation like that on the Grand Circuit for me to understand. It would be highly unusual. It would be more common for state-bred races to conflict with Grand Circuit races.

I think with few conflicts, the powers that be have done a great job with the dual eligible races. There have been some close ones but the finals were all separated.

If you don't want to blanket stake horses I suggest you do a little research. Take each individual stake, add up all the payments you have to make to go behind the starting gate in the final, divide that number into the amount you will race for and you will get the percentage of the purse you spend to race. You may be shocked at the findings, but there are some great value stakes out there and some horrid ones.

Dave Briggs asks: What is the secret to life?

My editor asked three questions, all of which were good. This was the first and I found it to be fascinating, and therefore will answer it first and save the others for a later date.

My first inclination was to say the golden rule (do unto others etc.), however I found it wasn't nearly enough. So, my answer is two fold — Karma, and the power of positive thinking. I sincerely believe that if you go through life with love and kindness to all you meet along the road and believe in yourself that you can achieve any and all goals you set in life.

Unfortunately it wasn't till I had a wonderful family of my own did I come to this realization, so in actuality, my good life started at 40 years of age, and I credit my family for educating me in this area. But what they say is true, better late than never.

I can well equate these comments to my career at the Meadowlands. I was one of the first through the gates in 1976 and along with the Remmens, maybe the last to leave. I knew every caretaker, security guard, maintenance man, kitchen helpers etc. in the place for 30 years. I never said no to a request, whether it was "Ronnie could you please go a trip with a horse?", or "Gurf can you spare \$20 till payday." Over the years, my relationship with the fans and the horsepeople kept growing in a very positive fashion. I started out racing garbage, and when it started to turn the fans were with me.

You all know what home field advantage is in sports, that is caused by Karma. When I was in a big race I knew at the

Meadowlands I was the one to beat because the grandstand was on my side.

If you have been to a casino, think back, you rarely have a great run in the afternoon when the tables are basically empty, but at midnight with crowds screaming and cheering when you pick up the dice, you had the best night ever.

If you learn anything from this piece I want it to be don't make enemies. There is no purpose or place in you life for negativity, all it does is diminish the power you have within you to compete at the highest level.

Mark F Sosovicka asks: Any recommendations on racing tie-up horses? Would you use Lasix on a tie-up horse?

I have my own theories on tie-up horses and my own way of dealing with them. I have trained for breeders my entire career and have had four fillies for every colt, forever. Therefore I have had toooooo much experience on this subject.

I equate a tie-up horse with a human being that gets muscle cramps running, swimming etc. basically the same thing. When this happens to us, do we double jog the next day? Absolutely NOT. We rest.

So this is my first point, when a horse ties up give him a chance to rebound. Leave him alone for a couple of days in the stall. No grain, no rich hay, lots of water, bute and some dmso jugs and vitamin E. When you resume normal routine change some things. I know no one walks horses anymore, but after exercise I would be sure to leave the horse in the stall for about 20 minutes before bathing to let the body cool down. Then when you bathe her, do NOT use cold water. If a horse is going to tie-up, the worst thing you can do is put cold water on her when she is hot. The reason I say her is because although medical record show tie-up occurs 65 per cent of the time in fillies, it is my experience that it is more like 90 per cent.

Under no circumstances use Lasix on a tie-up horse as it will aid in removing much needed electrolytes from the system and most certainly exacerbate the situation.

Bill Bigler asks: I recently bought a well-bred trotter with lots of speed. The problem is that he hits his shins, which throw him into his knees. He seems better on a wet track. Please help.

The trouble with the new breed of very fast trotters is they all hit their shins. It's hard to find a Cantab Hall that interferes, but Muscle Hills and Chapter Sevens seem to be more inclined. If shoeing and equipment changes don't help, trotting hopples will. Somehow trotting hopples narrow the trotting gait in front and lessen interference with the shins.

I hate trotting hopples, so let's try and fix him with other

methods. The only way you can accomplish this is to lighten him up in front and do the same behind. The first thing I would do is try four aluminum combo shoes. I realize that there are few tracks you can race with shoes like that, but we can always add borium nails. Also, take his head up a bit. If this cures the problem for the time being, great, because he will almost definitely get better as he matures and muscles up. The fact that you say he is better on a wet track also makes me feel that he is slipping. The combo shoe has a lot of natural grab as it is porous aluminum and will act like a wet track. I know you are in Florida and of the three tracks near me Pompano, Sunshine Meadows, and South Florida training center, they are all way too loose for a trotting horse and although I hate to put grab on a baby, it could be necessary. One more possibility is that he likes a sloppy track because his feet hurt him. Put hoof testers on him and if he says ouch, try a flip flop with a queens plate insert for a couple of months.

Steve Katz asks: I have observed you spend less time than anyone watching each yearling perform in the paddock. Why is that and what do you look for? While on the subject can you expound on your thoughts on the importance of yearling videos.

To me there are two kind of trotters: ones that like to trot and ones that cant or don't.

What is the purpose of chasing a horse for 10 minutes? I see many successful trainers do it so I can't say it's wrong, just not my style. I would be happy to love three of every 100 yearlings I look at. When they enter the paddock, I like to see them take off on the trot and trot most of the time.

Paddocks have square corners so when I see one make the turn at the corner and still stay trotting I am loving it. Speed is also very important. If a yearling doesn't show a few bursts I am not inclined to be a buyer. To all you young trainers out there, don't waste your time having the farm manager chase a colt for longer than you need because you don't want to insult the guy. He knows his horses and doesn't expect you to like them all.

As far as my opinion on yearling videos, I find them a valuable time saver. However, here is my most important rule, NEVER buy a yearling because you like a video. The colt must have pedigree and be correct. I see so many colts with no pedigree and fabulous videos enter the ring and bring six figures and train like gorillas and can't beat me when the go behind the gate.

To quote Joe Holloway who was obviously quoting someone else, "don't try to reinvent the wheel" when he saw me looking at a horse in Harrisburg with a pedigree he didn't approve of.

Use the video to eliminate a horse from consideration not to buy. Remember the farm has all the time in the world to show you the best that a horse can perform in one minute. The colt could be in the paddock for 20 minutes and if they can't splice together enough good stuff to fill the one-minute slot you don't want him.

There are other things you can see clearly on the tape like if a horse has no extension (goes up and down in front rather than reach out past his nose), you can see if he wants to hit a knee, a shin, or an elbow. All these things make the video invaluable. But please remember to look at the horse on the floor.

I am sorry if I haven't answered your question yet I am

trying to space them out so I don't answer too many at one time. They are answered basically in the order I get them. Next week will feature a great question: What one horse do you wish you had trained that you didn't train and why?

Bird Parker beat Bold Eagle

In the \$140,000 Prix du Bourbonnais, the second "B-race" in France, Bold Eagle (Ready Cash) made his comeback after having problems with a hoof.

The race was held last Sunday at Vincennes racetrack in Paris and many of the best horses in Europe showed up. Bold Eagle was a heavy favorite and driver Franck Nivard really had to empty the horse this time. From a position fourth over, Bold Eagle attacked three wide with 5/8ths of a mile to go in the 1.8 mile race. In the last turn, the Sébastien Gurato trained 6-year-old son of Ready Cash had control of the leader, stablemate Carat Williams, but behind Bold Eagle another strong Ready Cash son followed easily. In the home stretch, Bird Parker (Ready Cash), trained by Philippe Allaire and driven by Jean Philippe Monclin, disarmed the big favourite and came home in 1:56.2 (mile rate).

Bold Eagle finished second and Italian bred Ringostarr Treb (Classic Photo) third. Bold Eagle and Bird Parker would both have been allowed to race in the Grand Prix d'Amérique even without this qualification race. They have enough money in their bank accounts to gain entry to the big race to be held at the end of January, 2018.

Propulsion (Muscle Hill) and this year's runner up in Prix d'Amérique, Belina Josselyn (Love You), both finished strongly on the far outside and will show up in Prix de Bourgogne on New Year's Eve in Paris next time.

On Dec. 24, the \$140,000 Prix Tenor de Baune for the 5-year-olds and Criterium Continental (\$280.000) for the 4-year-olds will feature another two Prix d'Amérique contenders. The winners in those two races are allowed to race in the big race in January.

In the \$280,000 Criterium de 3 ans, the Franck Leblanc-trained mare Erminig d'Oliviere took the victory when Eridan (Ready Cash) was disqualified for breaking stride in the home stretch.

Erminig d'Oliviere was beaten at the top of the home stretch but fought back and collected the victory in one of the most prestigious races for the 3-year-olds in Europe.

Mike Woebkenberg: A non-stop promotional idea machine

It's highly unlikely you'll ever see Mike Woebkenberg wearing an Armani suit, toting an attache by Hermes, and boasting about his MBA in marketing. Perhaps because he doesn't have any of those.

What Mike Woebkenberg has instead is an unrelenting love of harness racing and a passion for promoting and publicizing the sport to which he's devoted his life.

"Mike does more to promote harness racing than most of the people who are paid to promote harness racing," someone told me recently.

Woebkenberg - pronounced "WEB-ken-berg" - makes a living as a starter, in races such as the Little Brown Jug. He starts at Ohio mutuel tracks and many fairs. He also operates Superior Sulky Co. in western Ohio.

But Woebkenberg never loses sight of the fact that without fans, harness racing will wither and die.


Some people may think that promoting the sport isn't necessary with the abundant slots funds funneled into the purse accounts by the racinos. In those states with racinos, purse money is plentiful while actual bettors and fans are scarce.

It's no secret that many racinos not only don't want to promote harness racing, they want to get rid of it as soon as possible.

As my friend Jay Farrar, who's spent a lifetime in the sport, once told me, "The problem we have is that tracks are owned by people who hate harness racing."

(Not all of them, of course; Jeff Gural is a notable exception.)

So Mike Woebkenberg takes it upon himself to do whatever he can to entice and retain harness racing fans. Foremost among his efforts are inviting fans to ride along with him in the starting gate as he picks up the field and picks up speed before the start.

Anyone who has ridden in the starting car knows how it gives you an entirely new perspective on a race. You witness close up the tension and excitement of the start. I have watched Woebkenberg's passengers step out of the starting car after a race and their smiles are as wide as the prairie in Kansas. They are euphoric.

"They just can't wait to tell their friends about their experience," said Woebkenberg. "So I take their photo and post it on my Facebook page. They often share that photo on their Facebook pages, with comments like 'Boy, look what I did. It's all about promoting harness racing."

Not only do these fans have an enhanced appreciation for the speed and strategy, but they automatically become Woebkenberg's promotional assistants by telling their friends, "You've just got to take a ride in the starting car. It's unbelievable!"

Woebkenberg is an overflowing fountain of ideas on how harness racing can promote its virtues and he said that horsepeople must become promoters since so few racinos

will do so.

He knows that if just 10 per cent of the people who ride in the starting car return to the races and bring their friends, it's a net gain for the game he loves most.

"Harness racing has wheel-to-wheel action just like NASCAR," he said, "but you can't ride next to the drivers in NASCAR. There's no view quite like riding in the starting car at a harness track."

Woebkenberg often enlists the assistance of Brad Conrad, track photographer at several Ohio harness plants, to look for fans who may want a ride in the starting care.

"After the race is over," Woebkenberg said, "I take the fans down to the paddock and introduce them to a driver who was in that race. They feel like they're part of the action."

Woebkenberg knows it's essential for harness racing to educate new fans, and feels his efforts are the most memorable for newbies.

"No one takes people to the judges stand to entertain them," he said. "The start of a harness race is the modern version of a cavalry charge. It's exciting."

Woebkenberg's ideas for promotion don't require money but do require the same passion he has for the sport. He emphasized the importance of currying favor with politicians, local merchants, and youth groups.

He recalled one state representative in Ohio who rode in the starting car with him once. The politician shook Mike's hand, thanked him, and then asked, "Can I ride again? I learned more from you about the economic impact of racing in a few minutes than I've ever learned in Columbus."

"This is a way we can educate officeholders on the economic impact of horse racing," said Woebkenberg.

Ohio still has a strong network of county fairs with harness racing and yet Woebkenberg laments declining attendance there. Predictably, he has thoughts on how to promote it.

"Get a good-looking, good-mannered horse," he said. "Put it in a nice stall and decorate it a bit on the outside. Invite people of all ages to come and have their photo taken with that horse and provide copies of the photo for free. Put a little promotional message on the photo. Have a five-gallon bucket of old horseshoes and give those out for free.

"You ought to see the glow in a kid's eyes when he pets the warm nose of a horse."

He thinks tracks should have stick-horse races for kids between races to entertain their families and the public.

No idea is too big or too small for Woebkenberg. He dreams big.

Many Ohio fairs offer betting, but Woebkenberg noted

often the mutuel sellers aren't easily accessible and Woebkenberg thinks they should be able to use a betting app on their phones.

"There is a lot of dead time between races," he said. "We need to fill that time to entertain and educate. We need a John Madden to explain what's happening on the track."

If the track announcer is the play-by-play guy, racing needs a "color guy or gal" to explain the nuances of racing to the fans so that they'll better understand and enjoy what they're watching.

Woebkenberg thinks that horsepeople should get magnetic vinyl signs to slap on the sides of their trucks and trailers to serve as traveling billboards as horse are shipped on highways.

Woebkenberg, 66, is proud of being a third-generation harness horseman, but he's hoping that racing has a future as well as a past.

"I hate to hear people say that if the slots last another 10 years, that's good enough for them," he said.

That's obviously not good enough for Woebkenberg. He loves harness racing and wants to keep it alive for future generations to enjoy.

Starting harness races is Mike Woebkenberg's profession; promoting harness racing is his passion.

One group to oversee racing in Ontario

The board of Ontario Racing and members of the Standardbred Alliance have voted to merge the two existing organizations. The combined entity will be an independent, not-for-profit industry organization that will represent all Ontario racetracks and horse racing industry associations in the Province with one unified voice.

"We're excited to announce the merger of the two organizations to create a more inclusive Ontario Racing with an expanded membership and governance mandate," said Hugh Mitchell, chair of Ontario Racing's board of directors. "Both the board of Ontario Racing and the Standardbred Alliance are confident that the merger will create a unified voice for racing to advocate for the sector's interests and ultimately negotiate a long-term funding agreement that ensures the sustainability of three breeds of horse racing in Ontario."

The newly formed entity will create a more cost-effective and streamlined approach to industry administration and governance, as well as a more collaborative and effective approach to decision-making and strategic planning on behalf of 15 racetracks and racing industry associations across the province.

Ontario Racing will create a not-for-profit to be called Ontario Racing Management (ORM), utilizing shared resources from Woodbine Entertainment's management team. This formula follows the successful business model of the Standardbred Alliance and allows racetracks to realize on multiple operational cost savings.

"Members of the Standardbred Alliance have benefitted from Woodbine Entertainment's expertise and have realized countless benefits including greater operational efficiencies and a coordinated approach to overcoming shared challenges," said Ian Fleming of Clinton Raceway.

The newly-merged organization is committed to having a three-year business plan in place by April 1, 2018. The plan will include guarantees of purse payments for all member tracks, staking programs and race schedules, as well as establishing and administering common racetrack rules and policies.

"Once the long-term funding model is determined, the sector can move towards a more sustainable plan for racing, which includes strengthening the industry to meet public demand and ensure the long-term success of viable racetracks," said Sue Leslie, [resident, Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association. "We need to work together, all racetracks and horsepeople, and we are committed to working collaboratively with all industry stakeholders moving forward."

"The alliance track model has helped stabilize racing since its inception. Merging the alliance tracks and OR will create a unified voice to communicate with government and secure the long-term funding. ORM will help sustain racing in Ontario for years to come," said Bill O'Donnell, president of Central Ontario Standardbred Association.

If you think you have to bet big or be part of a syndicate to rake the pot in the Meadowlands' new 20 Cent Survivor Pick 10 wager, you've got it all wrong.

The early returns are in on the Big M's challenging new bet, and not only is it popular, but the results prove that a small player can hit a nice ticket if they can survive and advance.

"Thus far (through nine days), the average winning ticket paid \$6,552 with an average ticket cost of \$80.82. One of our sharp patrons hit a winning ticket when he or she invested only 80 cents," said Meadowlands chief operating officer and general manager Jason Settlemoir.

The wager calls for a handicapper to select the winner of the first race. If they do that, they advance to the second. Then the third, and so on until no "survivor" remains, with that patron or patrons taking home the cash.

Jim Compton to receive Lifetime Achievement Award at Batavia

Jim Compton has been a respected western New York horseman for over 35 years. He trained, drove and bred many horses that are still remembered at his home tracks for their competitive nature and success.

For his years of dedication to the sport, the Upstate New York Chapter of the United States Harness Writers Association (USHWA) will present him with the Lifetime Achievement Award in the winner's circle at Batavia Downs on Saturday (Dec. 16) during the 10th annual "Night of Distinction" awards ceremony.

Compton's full-time job was working for General Motors in Rochester, NY, but his passion was for harness racing. So in 1978 he started moonlighting at the farm of local driving legend Fred Haslip to learn the ins and outs of the business. After a few years he got his trainers license and in 1983 he drove his first race.

Compton and his wife Sandra always ran a small but successful stable, racing horses such as Sly Hi, No Parking Zone, Splurging Rita, Gasper Again and Held For Ransom, who won multiple Opens at Batavia Down, Vernon Downs and Buffalo Raceway en route to amassing 51 lifetime wins.

When Held For Ransom's career was over, Compton bred him to one of his race mares named Suspicious Burns and the result of that breeding was a horse named Michael Scores.

Michael Scores was a New York Sires Stake star and rock-solid overnight campaigner for 11 years. He won 86 races and earned \$668,079 lifetime without ever seeing the Grand Circuit. He set track records at Tioga Downs (1:50.4) and at Batavia Downs (1:52.1) when he won the 2006 Kane Memorial Pace. And he will always be remembered for his

"intentionally parked out" style of racing.

Compton's numbers were not gaudy, however they were efficient. On the training side, he had 578 wins out of 2,892 starts with \$1.9 million in purses and a UTR of .337. As a driver, he won 522 races out of 2,725 starts and made \$1.13 million in purses and a UDR of .330. And all the horses he either trained or drove were 50 per cent in the money over his entire career.

Woodbine announces Jackpot Hi-5 mandatory payout

Christmas will come a few days early for horseplayers, as Woodbine Racetrack has announced a mandatory payout on the Standardbred Jackpot Hi-5 for Saturday, Dec. 23.

The Jackpot Hi-5 carryover currently sits at \$153,104.77 with six-cards remaining ahead of December 23. There will be no freezing of the pool ahead of the mandatory payout.

This will be the second consecutive year that Woodbine has offered a Jackpot Hi-5 mandatory payout on the final card before Christmas.

A mandatory payout on December 23, 2016, which had a carryover of \$548,396, saw more than \$2 million of new money wagered into the pool. Horseplayers that correctly selected the top-five finishers in order scored a Holiday bonus of \$4,842.70 for a \$0.20 ticket.

The most recent mandatory payout offered on the Woodbine standardbred product was on Oct. 14 at Mohawk. The carryover that evening was a record \$978,779 and horseplayers wagered an additional \$2.3 million on the Hi-5.

Winning horseplayers on Oct. 14 got back \$2,446.33 for a \$0.20 ticket.

The Jackpot Hi-5 requires horseplayers to select the top-five finishers in order and features a \$0.20 minimum wager with a 15 per cent takeout. The wager is offered nightly on the final-race of each card.

While racing in the top open class for 13 starts at Batavia, western New York newcomer Focus Power won three times and finished second another five while amassing \$36,010 in purses. He was on fire in September when he won three out of four starts while setting two new lifetime marks during that period (Sept. 2, 1:53 and Sept. 23, 1:52.4).

After being claimed at Yonkers just prior to the start of the Batavia meet, Focus Power made an immediate impact to the good fortunes of owner James Caradori and trainer Darrin Monti. Driver Drew Monti was aboard for every start. Overall, Focus Power has nine wins in 2017 and earnings that total \$97,395.

Trotter of the Meet: BZ Glide

BZ Glide was a fixture in the weekly open trot once again this year and showed although he's getting older, he hasn't lost a step. In 15 starts against the local best, BZ Glide won three with six seconds and a third banking \$34,405 in the process. He also set a seasonal mark of 1:56.3.

As has been the case every year, the family affair of Alana Caprio training and Mike Caprio driving, the two also team up in ownership of the big trotting gelding. For the year, BZ Glide has a total of five wins and earnings of \$52,405.

Mare of the Meet: Voltina

Competing the entire meet in the fillies and mares Open I or II, Voltina was as tough as they came winning three Open I's and one Open II along with six second place finishes and took home purses totaling \$34,060. She took her seasonal mark of 1:55 at Batavia as well.

Owned by CHS Racing LLC, the Tony Cummings-trained Voltina had a career year winning a total of eight races and earning \$69,456 in purses. Kevin Cummings was aboard for the majority of her starts.

Claimer of the Meet: Quicksilvercandy A

Listed as the winning-est pacer in North America for a good portion of the year, Quicksilvercandy A had a field day racing at Batavia Downs. Moving up and down the class ladder, the mare ended up winning seven claiming races including the \$20,000 Claiming Championship final for her division in November. Her four seconds and two thirds also helped bump up her bankroll to \$40,165 for the meet.

Owned and driven by Larry Stalbaum, Quicksilvercandy A recorded a career year of 20 wins and \$108,994 in earnings under the training of Kim Asher.

Most Improved Horse of the Meet: In Runaway Bay N

In Runaway Bay N came to Batavia Downs off a less than stellar early part of the year. He made his first start at Batavia in August, winning in the bottom class; non-winners of \$1,000 in 1:55.1. He strung together four wins while working his way up to the Open where he finished second two weeks in a row. The following week he faced Foiled Again and finished a respectable fourth to the richest standardbred of all time. Since then he has won three Open paces. For the meet, he took a seasonal mark of 1:53.1 and earned \$39,050.

In Runaway Bay N is owned by Super Mile LLC and is trained by Angelo Nappo. Kevin Cummings was in the bike for the bulk of the work.


