Was Bazire right to leave Jushua Tree out of today's Prix d'Amerique?

The talented 5-year-old dominated the \$340,000 Prix Bold Eagle on Saturday at Vincennes, making some wonder if the famed horseman should have aimed higher this year.

Jean-Michel Bazire chose to let his top 5-year-old **Jushua Tree** (Bold Eagle) stand in the stall when the Prix d'Amérique goes at Vincennes today (Jan. 28). Instead of claiming his place in the PdA, Bazire opted for Saturday's (Jan. 27) \$340,000 Prix Bold

Eagle for 5-year-olds and the big favorite proved best among several strong crop siblings.

Jushua Tree found a spot third over while the leader J'Aime le Foot defended his position in front when outside trotter Josh Power asked a timid question for an overtake. The two front horses kept the pace going and Jushua Tree's attack three wide became more a road of transport than a serious attack. Three horses entered the home stretch three across the track, but it would soon be clear that Jushua Tree was the best horse this day. The best J-horse in the French crop danced to a safe victory, without shoes for the first time in his career, and won in a mile rate of 1:56.2 over 1.6 miles.

Italian-bred Dimitri Ferm finished well as the runner-up and quick-opener Justin Bold claimed third place.


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Was it the right decision to pass on the Prix d'Amérique for Jushua Tree? Yes, probably. Bazire knows what he's doing and Jushua Tree is 5 years old. The Prix d'Amérique will be back in 2025 and another year means more merits and more muscles. The Bold Eagle son will be France's big hope next year and by winning Saturday's Prix Bold Eagle, he painted the already nice Prix d'Amérique weekend's picture in the most beautiful of colors.

Meanwhile, the \$340,000 Prix Ourasi was guite a race.

Four-year-old trotters battled and the fans at Vincennes got plenty of bang for their buck. Favorite Koctel du Dain did not make it gait-wise in the initial part of the race, but was eventually sent to the lead as the field turned into the flat part of the track, after the long stretch in front of the grandstand. Koctel du Dain got company on the outside from King Opera and in third over Kana de Beylev saved her speed for the finish.

Koctel du Dain struggled with his gait when the field was in the last turn and he couldn't hold his trot all the way as he made a break with a guarter of a mile to go.

The race was then open for anything to happen and that played out in the home stretch. Horses were all over the track with five, six of them with a chance to win. Not many could have foreseen that Sébastien Guarato's **Krack Time Atout** (Face Time Bourbon) would be the winner when 300 meters remained. Far, far outside,

almost in the audience's area, Paul-Philippe Ploquin attacked with Krack Time Atout and the winner of the 2023 \$340,000 Criterium des 3 ans claimed another big win at Vincennes as he hit the wire first in a mile rate of 1:56 over 1.6 miles.

Ksar finished second while Karlito and Katinka du Mouchel shared the bronze medal in a dead heat.

Trainer William Bigeon has his horses in great shape when he races at Vincennes and for the moment, his younger trotters have reach high levels. In the \$160,000 Prix Roquepine for 3-year-old fillies, Bigeon's **Louisiane de Bomo** (Ready Cash) proved best paired with Benjamin Rochard.

Louisiane de Bomo got cover three wide throughout the last turn after a third over trip and when the field turned into the stretch, Louisiane de Bomo accelerated and sprinted to a seemingly outstanding win. But far outside, longshot Little Star Fleury (136-1) flew and approached the leader as the wire got close. The nose first at the wire was Louisiane de Bomo's, who came home in a mile rate of 2:00.2 over 1.6 miles.

The 3-year-old colts had the \$160,000 Prix Paul Viel as their objective this weekend and Jocelyn Robert-trained **Lovino Bello**

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Some Impressive Facts....

- ★ He won \$2.8 plus million according to the US records or \$3.2 million in Canada. While winning 42% of his 96 starts, and finished 2nd 20% of the time.
- ★ He has won on every size track (1/2, 5/8, 7/8 and mile). He did this while setting many track and stakes records.
- ★ He paced his back half in 52.1, coming from 7th at the half defeating Bythemissal, Allywag Hanover, etc to win the Canadian Pacing Derby.

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(Village Mystic) was served the perfect trip by Eric Raffin. Second over, covered by first over trotter Lemon Tree proved to be the winning tactics as the bettors' choice Luciano Menuet was stuck behind leader Little Brown. Raffin had his eyes on the favorite on his inside and didn't attack three wide until the top of the stretch. Lemon Tree had the advantage for a while and attacking horses on the outside approached quickly as the wire got closer. Raffin then let Lovino Bello speed between horses and the victory became safe in a mile rate of 2:00.1 over 1.6 miles.

Lombok Jiel finished strongly as the runner up ahead of Lemon Tree.

Matthieu Abrivard had two strong cards in his hands when the \$125,000 Prix du Luxembourg, over 2,100 meters, was held at Vincennes on Saturday's card. With Gaspar de Brion, he used optimistic tactics, aiming for the lead after 600 meters. At that point, the favorite Ganay de Banville had been pushed to the lead as early leader Missle Hill very much wanted a cover trip on the inside.

Abrivard's second horse in the race, **Face Time** (Coktail Jet), driven by Gabriele Gelormini from the second line behind the gate, started the attack three wide on the backstretch and in the last turn, Face Time challenged new leader Ganay de Banville seriously.

WHAT TO EXPECT IN TODAY'S BIG EVENT

The 2024 Prix d'Amérique is here and Paris is the place to be for all European harness racing fans. After yesterday's sparkling show at Vincennes, it's now time for the very best older trotters to compete in front of the large crowd at the Paris track's grandstand.

And what can the fans expect to see when the race gets underway at 4:20 p.m. Paris time (10:20 a.m. ET).

The crowd, at least a big part of the crowd, will keep their fingers crossed for the Duvaldestin stable's Idao de Tillard, who is mentioned as the new Face Time Bourbon or Bold Eagle. Idao de Tillard is maybe not on the same level as them yet, but the trotter is a "crack," a star who probably would adapt to any kind of racing conditions all over the world. With that said, he should be the horse to beat in today's Prix d'Amérique.

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There are 17 challengers though and at least 10 of them are still hungry for a win in one of the toughest races in the world and there is no room for mistakes in the bike for Clément Duvaldestin.

A highly non-professional prediction regarding how the race will develop looks like this: Idao de Tillard will make a quick start, aiming for a position as third, fourth on the outside, while Izoard Vedaquais will be sent to the lead after a quarter of a mile. If that happens, and Izoard Vedaquais hits the lead, the race can be locked in for a kilometer. Drivers at Vincennes are well aware of Izoard Vedaquais' ability to race in the front, in high pace, so the probable moves from behind will come on the backstretch, just before the uphill part of the track begins.

So where do we find the winner? My winner is Ampia Mede Sm and for her to go all the way, Franck Nivard needs to find the magical road to success, which he is very well capable of doing. If Ampia Mede Sm gets her cover trip, let's say until the last turn, her speed can make checkmate with the opponents, without a doubt.

Off course, Idao de Tillard will be hard to beat if he gets the race where he's most efficient, but today can be the day when trainer Fabrice Souloy claims his first win in his country's biggest race.

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Prix d'Amerique makes case for U.S. horses to race longer distances

For as long as standardbred racing has been around in recorded times, everyone knows that the "standard" set has been at a one-mile race.

In nearly every part of the world outside of North America however, that's not the case. Races elsewhere are run at all sorts of longer distances, including today's 2024 edition of the Prix d'Amerique at Paris-Vincennes which goes at a distance of 2,700 meters (or about 1 and two-thirds miles). In that race alone are four horses whose sire or dam — or both — are from the U.S.

Today, breeding is international, no longer restricted by borders. The best example is the most well-known one, Joviality. Though Swedish-foaled, Joviality is by the U.S. trotting super sire Chapter Seven. Joviality was campaigned here in North America to dual-millionaire status in her 2- and 3-year-old award-winning seasons. The dam of Joviality, Pasithea Face, is similar. She, too, was Swedish-foaled and her dam consists of European lines, but her sire is Muscle Hill.

When racing with tremendous success in North America, Joviality won all her races at the distance of one mile because that's the only distance offered here. In Sweden last year, Joviality won multiple times at longer distances, her most prestigious victory coming in Sweden's Trotting Derby which was contested at a distance of 1-5/8th miles. With her international breeding, distance obviously hasn't been a hindrance to the success of Joviality.

The only horse in the Prix d'Amerique richer than Joviality is Vivid Wise As, who most here will know from his big win in last year's MGM Yonkers International Trot. Vivid Wise As is Italian-foaled and has won millions racing in his career at varying distances longer than one mile, though his breeding is purely American. By Yankee Glide, Vivid Wise As is out of the

unsuspecting mare named Temple Blue Chip, who won \$38,295 with a mark of 1:57.1 racing in Pennsylvania for two years. Her third dam Maiden Yankee produced the great Muscles Yankee. Even with strictly traditional, domestic breeding, Vivid Wise As, now aged 10, has excelled at longer distance races.

It gets fascinating when looking at another Prix d'Amerique starter, Hail Mary. He, too, is the result of U.S. breeding. By Googoo Gaagaa, one of the more remarkable breeding stories to start with, he's out of the mare Nan's Catch, making him a half-sibling to Moni Maker. Sire Googoo Gaagaa himself is by a 1:52 pacing stallion, adding only more hodgepodge to the pedigree. Last year, in a Gr. 1 race in Sweden, Hail Mary won the 1-5/16th miles race, with three of the top four finishers being by Googoo Gaagaa.

One final example is another Italian-foaled horse named Aetos Kronos. By the French hero Bold Eagle, he's out of the U.S. mare Will Of A Woman. In addition to producing Aetos Kronos who has starred internationally, Will Of A Woman has also sent out \$600,000 earner in the States, Woman's Will.

While these are instances of elite horses, the same can be found in lesser, more common races. It works both ways, also. Not only are horses with U.S.-breeding influence racing just fine abroad at longer distances, but we see every single day here horses with international designations — even now seeing more horses with GB and IR notations — and they too are able to adapt to the faster racing at shorter distances.



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In thoroughbred racing there's differentiation between sires as to which ones have a predisposition for preferred distances. We don't have that in harness racing because horses have never consistently raced at any distance other than one mile. But, who's to say that if races were introduced with regularity at a one and a quarter mile, one and three-eighths miles and so on, that similar deviations wouldn't emerge in harness racing? Maybe - and likely even we'd see pacing and trotting sires with different levels of success based on change in distances. It could change breeding entirely.

With all of this said, the point is that there's no valid reason races in North America shouldn't be extended beyond one mile. And I'm not talking about adding just a small extra $1/16^{\rm th}$ of a mile or the one or two races a year that go an extra $1/8^{\rm th}$ of a mile, but really opening things up.

In thoroughbred racing there's differentiation between sires as to which ones have a predisposition for preferred distances. We don't have that in harness racing because horses have never consistently raced at any distance other than one mile. But, who's to say that if races were introduced with regularity at a one and a quarter miles, one and three-eighths miles and so on,

that similar deviations wouldn't emerge in harness racing? Maybe — and likely even — we'd see pacing and trotting sires with different levels of success based on change in distances. It could change breeding entirely.

Longer distances would absolutely change how horses would be trained as well as the strategy for how they would be driven, but those are all good things in the bigger picture. For all the chatter that at times racing can be boring, redundant, and predictable, breaking away from racing only at one mile would change that. In one of the more exciting races from last year, M-M's Dream got the best of Jiggy Jog's 11-race win streak in the Hambletonian Maturity, and the outcome may not have happened the way that it did if not for the rare extra eighth of a mile in that race.

That horses from varying pedigrees including U.S. ones will compete at the highest of levels today at Vincennes shows that horses can be trained to race successfully at longer distances. It's a matter of training conditions more so than genetic conditions, and it would benefit racing in North America to advance the breed beyond the standard one mile.



A conversation with "Bet with The Best" podcast host Chris Larmey

The popular podcast host talks about great betting, what to do about the computer teams, pricing, the current state of horse racing and what it needs to do to grow.

Chris Larmey has worn many hats. He's a self-described "math guy" by education and profession and has been a long-time fan and bettor of horse racing. In addition to being a National Horseplayers' Championship Hall of Fame member and chairman of that organization's players' committee, he's a co-host of the Sport of Kings' podcast, and author of numerous articles.

What caught my eye for this interview, however, is his most recent undertaking; his work as the **host of the Bet with The Best podcast**.

Larmey has interviewed some amazing guests with a vast knowledge of the sport. Andy Beyer, economist and horseplayer Maury Wolff, economics professor and owner/bettor Marshall Gramm, professional players, and new database and computer modeling players like Dennis Montoro who came from the world of finance, to name just a few.

I wondered, what has he learned from them, what does he think can be done to improve the game, and what does he foresee the future of wagering looking like, especially in the new world of computer wagering?

He was nice enough to answer these questions in the usual "Larmey" way – thoughtful, detailed and informative.

What was the impetus for you to start the Bet with The Best podcast?

"There is a lot of racing content available now through TV, simulcast feeds, and social media. Most of it is well-produced

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with pleasant, knowledgeable on-air personalities but almost all of it is focused on either giving out picks or tickets with very little context other than a quick regurgitation of the past performances and very little, if any, discussion of how to use that information to identify value and make good bets. Also, because of the nature of the medium, that content usually disappears or quickly becomes stale after it is presented.

"One of the most common laments that I hear from horseplayers, is 'I am a pretty good handicapper but a lousy bettor.' To use a golfing metaphor, 'You drive for show, but putt for dough.' Picking winners is analogous to driving for show. It's fun and being correct is a big ego boost and very addictive, particularly, in today's world where social media dominates the discussion.

"But a 280-yard drive that splits the fairway doesn't do you any good if you can't then put the ball on the green and eventually putt it into the cup. The Bet with The Best podcast is intended to help horseplayers 'putt for dough.' It goes beyond picking winners with discussions about how to take your handicapping opinion and translate it into a good bet. How to identify and exploit value and make better decisions. How to handle all the aspects of being a successful horseplayer, including the mental side, money management, race and pool selection, ticket construction, etc. Best of all, this information is coming from the best of the best. Successful players that have made a living betting on races such as Maury Wolff, Mike Maloney, Paul Matties, Tommy Massis, and Inside the Pylons as well as legendary players and authors such as Andrew Beyer, Steven Crist, and Mark Cramer.

"My goal is to create a library of evergreen content that can help horseplayers (including myself) improve, which they can also reference for years to come."

How much do you think the average racing customer can improve their overall game by just wagering better?

"The simple answer is a lot. The correct answer is that it depends on the player and why they are playing. Players that are focused primarily on picking winners regardless of price can improve their results significantly by making the shift from simply picking winners to finding good bets. Players who like to fire away in exactly the same way on every single race can improve immensely by becoming more selective in the races that they play and the pools that they bet. Most players are probably playing a lot of races that they should be passing and playing in sophisticated pools such as the Pick-5 in which they are very likely overmatched. They would be much better off focusing only on the types of races that they are most comfortable betting and sticking to less complex wagers such as win, exacta, and doubles.

"The bottom line is that all of us can improve our results and learn from others that have had long-term success. We can all get better at some aspect of being a horseplayer. For some of us it might be ticket construction, or money management. For others it might be developing a better process for analyzing races and making good decisions. For still others it might be learning to deal with the extreme highs and lows of the game. Going back to the golf analogy, we will probably get more benefit by spending extra time on the putting green than we will from spending it on the driving range."

You've interviewed the who's who in the game. Do you have any favorite interviews or moments?

"That's an unfair question because it's like asking a parent who's their favorite child. All the guests have been great and have offered some useful insight and I encourage the readers to listen to them all — shameless plug — but I will not completely dodge the question.

"Marshall Gramm was my first guest and Marshall helped me prepare for that first show. He actually teaches a university class on handicapping and betting, so he was a great resource. I had been thinking about doing it for years but to finally produce and release that first show was a big moment especially when it received a much more positive response than I had ever hoped for or expected.

"I have always been a big Andy Beyer fan so having him on the show was special. Same for Steve Crist. Those two are on my Mount Rushmore of horseplayers for sure. Mark Cramer is another author that I have admired and was a great guest on the most recent show. He had some very entertaining stories that really helped illustrate the psychological aspects and challenges of being a horseplayer.

"The pro players have also been great. Maury Wolff is so smart and made lots of good points about the dynamic nature of the game and how fleeting an edge can be and how important it is to exploit them when you find them. Mike Maloney talked about his disciplined process and 'guard rails' for being successful and provided some interesting insight into the aging tote system and its potential security issues. Paul Matties had a lot of great stories and advice including his 1/3/11 bet weighting and how he has been adapting to all the recent changes with new rules on Lasix and other legal meds and the rise of the CAW [computer assisted wagering] teams.

"Tommy Massis shared his aggressive approach to hammering the pools and his pyramid ticket structure for crushing horizontals. Inside the Pylons described how a bad favorite is a horseplayer's best friend, how to make a 'basket of bets' to reduce variance, and some next-level thoughts on horizontal ticket construction.

"Michael Kipness had entertaining stories from the racetracks in New York that featured Runyonesque characters with names like The Leprechaun, The Brain, and The Cue Stick.

Harness Racing Update

"Dennis Montoro gave us some insight into how computer models work and how he turns a horse race into a math problem.

"That's just a small taste of what is already in the library. There is a lot more in there as well and I hope to continue to add to it with each new show."

You talk a lot about computer assisted wagering (CAW) on the podcast. Some say it is upwards of 30 per cent of total handle. Entities like the New York Racing Association have taken some steps to curb late odds drops by not allowing this type of wagering late in the cycle, for example. Harness racing has fought with this every day. Do you think anything can or should be done with CAW wagering?

"I certainly think something can and should be done. The current state is not sustainable and everyone, including the CAW teams, will eventually suffer if something is not done.

"Par-mutuel wagering is predicated on a level playing field for all participants but currently the CAW teams have two big advantages over most if not all other players. One is the last look at the price and the ability to execute a large number of wagers just before the betting on a race closes and the other is their much cheaper cost of a bet. Going back to the golf analogy, the CAW teams' having that last look at the price is like a golf hole that has a blind approach to the green so nobody but the CAW teams can see the flag or know where it is located. That's obviously a huge advantage and there is no way that a golfer, regardless of how skilled, could successfully compete against someone with that sort of advantage.

"So how do you solve that problem? It's tough because the CAW money is such a large portion of the current pools that it would be very hard to safely unwind even if there was an appetite to do so, which there is not.

"Some people advocate completely banning the CAW teams, but I don't put myself in that camp. I know I am probably in the minority in that regard but I think there can be a healthy betting ecosystem that includes the CAW teams but it has to be managed in a way that provides a much more level playing field for all. I don't claim to have all the answers, but I think the solution has to somehow reduce the advantage that the teams have over everyone else.

"Here are a few ideas, none of them are original and many of them have been suggested by guests on the Bet with The Best podcast. This is nowhere near a complete list but it's a start and I admit that some of these ideas may not be very feasible or effective for all sorts of reasons. Some of the suggestions address only symptoms while others get much closer to the root causes.

- Make CAW teams pay a steep price for the privilege of having the last look in the pools. Not just in the win pool to address the bad optics of late odds changes but for all the pools. I believe that Del Mar is doing something like this for the win pool, but I am not sure about that because there is not a lot of transparency when it comes to this topic. I think that approach makes sense and should be expanded to all pools at all tracks.
- Give regular players access to better wagering tools and information including better estimates of the expected final prices and the ability to make large batch wagers at the last second similar to what the CAW teams are doing. The first part will help all bettors deal with the late odds change issue in the simpler pools such as win and exacta and the second will give more sophisticated players a better chance of competing with the CAW teams in the more exotic pools such as trifectas, superfectas, Pick-Ns. This first part is already starting to happen with tools like DRF Formulator providing estimated off odds based on will-pays and a few ADWs and tracks have also begun displaying similar info alongside the live odds in the win pool. This should become the standard practice for all tracks and ADWs.
- Significantly reduce the cost of a wager for all players, not just the CAW teams. This one is tricky because of the complex nature of the wagering system. I would love to see rebates eliminated and takeout reduced across the board for all pools at all tracks but that is a big lift and probably not ever going to happen. Another alternative that may be a bit more feasible would be to make rebates similar to those provided to the CAW teams available to all players. Doing so would not require any approvals by state commissions or horseman groups but would obviously reduce the near-term profits for ADWs and tracks, so again seems very unlikely to ever happen even though it might actually increase their long-term profits and sustainability.
- Upgrade the antiquated tote infrastructure to process bets in a much faster and more secure way. This would benefit everyone but obviously comes with a big price tag. Until this happens, the frustrating late odds drops are probably going to continue and the potential for past-posting and other system hacks will be higher than it needs to be. I know a lot of people are advocating for closing the betting a few minutes before the race is off. That would certainly improve the current bad optics of the odds

- changing during the race, but it still gives the CAW teams the same "last look at the price" advantage so it doesn't really help level the playing field in any meaningful way.
- Have all organizations that own tracks divest any ownership or association with the CAW teams. Stronach and NYRA have an ownership stake in Elite which just seems wrong and puts the integrity of the entire pari-mutuel system into question. If these organizations are profiting, even indirectly, from giving the CAW teams pricing and tote access that is unavailable to retail players, that seems unethical and possibly even borderline illegal.
- Have all entities report handle data in a standard, fully transparent, manner that categorizes the types of handle, broken out at a minimum by CAW teams and other. Ideally it would also show handle broken out by rebate level along with other useful cuts of the data. Without this basic information, it is very difficult to understand and effectively address these issues."

Switching over to the betting game itself, and horse racing's growth — or maybe more appropriately, lack of growth — what do you think the sport can do better to increase the handle?

"I ask a similar question of most of the guests on the Bet with The Best podcast and they typically give the obvious answer, which is to improve the quality and pricing of the product. The tougher question is how best to do that? Marketing is not very effective if the product stinks. You can spend a lot of marketing money getting people to try a new restaurant but if the food tastes bad and is overpriced, then they are not coming back.

"The pricing issue is critical. With the legalization of sports wagering in most states, the competition for the wagering dollar has increased and right now wagering on horse racing is not priced competitively.

"I often hear or read arguments that most horseplayers don't care about takeout. That is simply not true. Just look at how players react to carryovers, which effectively reduce takeout. Even if it were true, all horseplayers should care because it

does affect them even if they don't realize it. Their gambling dollar does not go as far or last as long and thus they bet less and may eventually get discouraged and play less often and less enthusiastically and possibly even move on to some other gambling game.

"I talk to a lot of horseplayers and many of them, including some of the guests on the Bet with The Best podcast, are doing just that, which means that everyone suffers including the most skilled players and even the CAW teams. Coming up with feasible ways to reduce the price is complicated as I mentioned earlier, but something has to be done with takeout and/or rebates to reduce the retail price of a bet.

"I applaud recent efforts to reduce the price of a wager by a few tracks such as Hawthorne which significantly reduced WPS takeout last year and the state of Kentucky for switching to penny breakage. Those moves are a small step in the right direction, but the entire industry needs to get involved to a much greater extent to have any meaningful long-term impact.

"Fixing the quality of the product is also important. There are a lot of obvious little things that could and should be done like improving the on-track experience, accurately timing races, better adjudication of races, and improving the video presentation of races, but they are unlikely to have much impact unless the fundamental problem is addressed. That fundamental problem is the rapidly decreasing number of large, competitive fields in races. On most days, at most tracks, horseplayers are now being fed a steady diet of small, uncompetitive fields along with obscene prices for wagers on those races sometimes with 25 per cent or higher takeouts. That's not an appealing product no matter how you try to dress it up and if that trend continues, it is very likely to drive many players away from the game.

"The good news is that betting with reasonable prices on horse races with large, competitive fields is by far the greatest skill-based gambling game ever conceived and that is exactly how the game should be marketed. The tremendous popularity of other skill-based gambling games like poker and sports betting demonstrate that the market is out there and the so-called "barrier to entry" for new horseplayers due to the complexity of handicapping and betting on horses should be considered a feature rather than a bug. That challenge is exactly what got me and probably many of you hooked on racing and thirsting for more. Those are the types of people who will become avid, life-long players. Exactly the type of new participant the sport needs to survive and grow. We should be touting that as a feature rather than as a bug and trying to dumb it down.

"On a related note, these types of younger players are data hungry and are accustomed to getting free, easy access to data. Racing needs to better accommodate these players by providing free access to basic data on past performances.

"Finally, I think that the key leaders and managers in the racing industry need to acknowledge and understand that the primary customer of horse racing is the horseplayer and that the primary

product that they are marketing and selling is a bet. If that is understood and accepted, then the importance of what we have been talking about becomes very obvious and it becomes clear that if these issues are not addressed, then racing as we know it today is in real jeopardy over the long term."

Thoroughbred and harness racing handle was approximately \$15 billion in North America in 2023. What do you believe that number will be in 2033?

"I am not familiar with the North American data, but U.S. handle, on thoroughbreds, fell nearly 4 per cent in 2023 to \$11.6 billion.

"It was 30 per cent higher 20 years ago at \$15.2 billion and that does not even account for inflation. If you do, then that \$15.2 billion in 2003 was equivalent to \$24.9 billion in 2023 dollars. So, the numbers are ugly, and the rate of decline is accelerating.

"The other important thing to consider is where that handle is coming from. Twenty years ago, there were few, if any, large CAW teams. So, assuming that the CAW teams actually do provide close to 30 per cent of the handle today, and it's impossible to know for sure because of the lack of transparency of these numbers, then the decline in non-CAW handle has been much worse than the numbers above would indicate and is clearly not sustainable for much longer. The CAW teams' portion of the handle probably cannot increase much beyond 30 per cent so it is also eventually going to begin to decline along with the rest of the handle.

"And it's not just handle that is decreasing. The contraction of all facets of racing has been relentless for the past 20 years. There are fewer stallions, fewer foals, fewer horses in training, fewer owners, fewer trainers, fewer jockeys and drivers, fewer races, fewer horses per race, fewer racetracks, fewer people at the track, fewer horseplayers, etc. I think you get the picture and it's not very pretty.

"Also, keep in mind that this is happening while purse sizes are exploding due to gaming-based subsidies. So, increasing purses and increasing and holding on to those subsidies is obviously not going to reverse these trends.

"I don't want to even venture a guess at a number for 2033 but it is almost certain to be less than it is today and quite possibly much less unless some of the issues we just discussed are successfully addressed. If not, horse racing might start to look a lot like polo with just a few very rich guys competing against each other for trophies."



How John Campbell acquired his iconic mustache and why some — including his wife — still struggle with his decision to shave it off three years ago.

When John Campbell walks into the paddock at Vincennes this morning in Paris, he fully expects some people he's known for a lifetime not to recognize him without his mustache, despite shaving it off three years ago. That's how iconic the mustache was for the Hall of Fame driver and CEO of the Hambletonian Society.

For more than four decades, he was harness racing's Tom Selleck.

There were people that I have known and met that walked right by me until they realized it was me without it. I was definitely less recognizable, especially over there without it."


Campbell sported a mustache for over 40 years, apart from a brief period in the mid-1990s when he shaved it off to the alarm of his wife, Paula, and their three daughters.

"Paula wasn't happy with me and the kids and the dog hardly recognized me, so I grew it back," Campbell said. "I just got tired of it and thought I'd shave it off and see what it looked like. I was tired of shaving around it at that time and said, 'Let me shave this off and see what happens.' But when you have all women in your household, it's easier to just get along."

Anatomy of the Burke racing stable

by Murray Brown

Just about every fan of harness racing knows that the Burke family runs the largest harness racing entity on this world of ours. Although the horses generally run under the auspices of Ron Burke as trainer, there are many more people who play a part in its destiny and usually its success.

First, there is the Burke family, the entire family down from patriarch Mickey Burke, Sr. who oversees the breaking and initial training of the yearlings, both the homebreds and those purchased at various sales throughout North America.

A major component of the stable is Mark Weaver, the chief scout involved in the racing part of the operation, who secures its future stars through racehorses currently competing. There are of course, the other owners, many of whom have been with the stable for quite some time.

There was a time when the stable was almost totally composed of overnight horses, with a rare yearling being present in its roster. Although they are always on the lookout for a good racehorse to add to their ranks, these years most of their champions are, in effect, developed from the time when they are yearlings. They are the proverbial little acorns from which their stable's mighty oaks are grown.

Note that this is more than just a roster. It also tells you where the Burkes got the horses and, in the case of those that were purchased at public auction, where and for how much.

Going through the roster of the present 2-year-olds, one finds a distinct geographical bias in the horses that they breed and buy. Of the 77 juveniles in training:

The stable is made up of 47 pacers and 33 trotters.

The pacers include 20 colts and 27 fillies.

The trotters are made up of 22 colts and 11 fillies.

Of the 20 pacing colts, seven are homebreds, with 13 having been purchased at Lexington (four), Harrisburg (six), Ohio Selected (two), and Hoosier Classic (one).

Of the pacing colts 11 are eligible to Pennsylvania Sires Stakes, five to Ohio, and one each to Indiana, New Jersey and Ontario.

The 27 pacing fillies are made up of six homebreds with 21 having been purchased at Lexington (11), Harrisburg (five), Ohio Selected (three), Buckeye Classic (one), and one at the Hoosier Classic.

Of the pacing fillies, 16 are eligible to Pennsylvania, six to Ohio, two to New York and one each to Indiana and New Jersey.

Of the 22 trotting colts six are homebreds, with 16 having been purchased at Lexington (six), Harrisburg (five), Ohio Selected (four) and one at the Hoosier Classic.

Of the trotting colts, 11 are eligible in Pennsylvania, five in Ohio, five in New Jersey and one in New York.

Of the 11 trotting fillies, two are homebreds, the other nine were purchased at Harrisburg (three), Ohio Selected (three), Buckeye Classic (two) and Lexington (one).

Of the trotting fillies six are eligible in Ohio, three in Pennsylvania and one each in New Jersey and Kentucky. This category presents an anomaly being the only one in which the leader is not in Pennsylvania breds. Pennsylvania is where the stable has its in season headquarters.

Many of the homebreds are made up of the issue of two of the stable's greatest stars, the pacer Sweet Lou (seven) and the trotter Southwind Frank (four).



Peter Blood: "Hinsdale, fast track, Abel Eden, 2:17 in 1975 or 1976. He got on the list and couldn't go enough to ever race again."

Stephane Bouchard: "2:09, Quebec City, middle of winter."

Jack Darling: "2:17, in the snow, Western Fair in about 1975. I was driving Nevele Sunshine."

John Kopas: "Twin B Luvsong in 2:14 at Monticello in 1979. She was a 2YO by Songcan."

Bob McClure: "At Flamboro; it was way too muddy to race."

Kim Hankins: "2:20.1 at Rushville, IL, in the early '80s."

Patrick Lachance: "Chantitown Jackpot, Dec. 30, 1996 at Monticello, 2:09.2. [Paid] \$26.00."

Linda Toscano: "2:07 at Roosevelt."

Brad McNinch: "2:17.3 at Flamboro, Pride Almahurst. The track was thawing in the spring."

James MacDonald: "2:02.1 at Flamboro, when the track was six seconds off, for Casie Coleman."

Michael Cruse: "Eds Anita at East Lynne Farm in New Jersey, 2:14.2. That was my first fair win. Pari-mutuel, that was with Nevada Skipper, 2:03.2, at Liberty Bell."

Neil Glasser: "2:09.4 at Monticello. Someone got the idea to throw more dirt on the track to dry it out and it kept raining."

Lauren Tritton: "2:05.4 at Monticello with a filly trotter."

Bill O'Donnell: "Glen Brae at Saratoga in the 1970s, 2:18. They still had the clay surface then."

James Bernstein: "Afton Chips, 1972 at Foxboro in 2:18."

JoAnn King: "2:17 at Harrington Raceway, 100 years ago."

Kyle Wilfong: "Premier Hanover, 2:06.1, in a walkover in the Review at Springfield for my dad."

Dave Mattia: "Crown Tribute on the trot at The Meadowlands in 2:02."

Dave Smith: "2:28 in the mud at Saratoga on a night where nobody went faster than 2:26. I won with a \$4,000 claimer named Scott's Goose."

Greg Wright, Jr.: "2:09 at Western Fair in the winter. My dad can top this for sure."

Mike Lachance: "2:19 at Batavia, Mr Reco, 1968."

Mike Keeling: "OSS event with Worthy Folk at Woodstock in 2:06."

Paul Kelley: "With me driving, in 1982, Taffy Devonshire, 2:07.4 at Scarborough Downs."

TEN MOST AGGRAVATING THINGS ABOUT DRIVERS

Hey, it's a public sporting event. Money down too. These are 10 gripes I personally have and a few I've heard that you're bound to see if you've been at it as long as I have.

- 1. The driver who comes out at the 3/8ths from the 2-hole especially on the bigger track to get the top when everyone can see the front end is on a mission. Oops, right back in.
- 2. Drivers who come off the track and toss the lines at the trainer or caretaker and then head for a cigarette.
- 3. The occasional driver who doesn't, or didn't, know the Challenge Cup at Roosevelt was three times around, not twice.
- 4. Interview avoiders. You know who you are.
- 5. Grudges taken out on the track (see Webster-Case and Gagliardi-Poulin in the 1980s at The Meadowlands). Hey guys, this is a public sporting event. Out-of-towners at The Meadowlands in stakes competition years ago, shall we say, were not going to get any holes and would often be "fully extended" if they tried for the top.
- 6. Pylon violators. It can happen. Sure. Just not too many times. Hey, the rule is already vague, don't make us suffer worse while waiting.
- 7. Drivers with odds-on favorites who unnecessarily battle with longshots early in a race. Awful.
- 8. Guys coming off the track after the race, often in a post-race interview saying, "Wow, I didn't know the stretch was that long!" Really? Replays available upon request.
- 9. Guys who are happy to be there. Want to know why Campbell, Tetrick, Gingras, Sears, and Miller are right there in all the biggest money events? They are not looking for the nickel, and let's be honest, some really are.

10. You bet an outside post hoping the driver leaves, he does, and most others don't. He rifles out from post 9, few else are going early, and the next thing you know he's taking back and tucking eighth. Race over, at least for us.

OF ALL THE HAUGHTON STATS AND NUMBERS, HOW ABOUT THIS ONE?

Billy Haughton's gone 38 years now and still needs no introduction no matter how old you are.

This I will submit as one of his greatest stats!

He won his first Hambletonian at age 50 and the floodgates then opened with him taking it five times in a nine-year span, four of those driving.

The four of the five Haughton Hambletonian wins were the richest ever Hambletonians at that time!

1974 - Christopher T - \$161,150

1976 - Steve Lobell - \$263,524

1977 - Green Speed - \$284,131

1982 -Speed Bowl - \$875,000 (The last before the purse was raised to a million or more).

The 1980 Burgomeister Hambletonian win at \$293,570 just fell short of Legend Hanover's \$300,000 the year prior.

In 1984 Haughton took the Woodrow Wilson, the all-time richest race ever held, \$2,161,000, which still stands 40 years later.

THE YEAR 1966 WAS NOT THAT LONG AGO, OR WAS IT?

It was 48 years ago. Really?

Look at how popular standardbred racing was then:

- No. 2 spectator sport in the country.
- No. 1 fastest growing sport.
- There were 437 parimutuel/fairs/matinees in the U.S.

• Purses: \$58,679,557.

• Races: 64,443.

• \$100,000 races: 19.

• \$50,000 races: 38.

HAMBLETONIAN WINNER SHORTCHANGED?

Greyhound won the 1935 Hambletonian with one of the four smallest purses for the race. He's the only one of those four winners who got less than 50 per cent of the-purse!

His share of the \$33,221.43 was \$14,544.43 or 41.6 per cent.

BOYS WILL BE BOYS

At least I think so. The 1978 official Hambletonian program from DuQuoin has the winner, Speedy Somolli, listed as a gelding.

Thank goodness nobody told Park Avenue Joe, Alf Palema and Nuclear Kosmos, his sons who won the Hambletonian.

Kristin Shetler – Trainer, driver, advocate

Born in the Cicero, IL, Kristin Shetler started going to the barn as a youngster to help her parents, Dan and JoAnne Shetler, with their horses.

This was the time when harness racing was alive and well, and going to the racetracks was the place to go for an evening of entertainment.

"I am fortunate to have been born and raised in our wonderful industry," Kristin said. After my parents married, my mother JoAnne became heavily involved as a caretaker, trainer and bookkeeper. Together they have run their stable since 1976 and successfully continue to do so.

"When I was growing up, I always worked in the barn in some capacity. I spent the first eight years of my life watching races at Balmoral Park, Sportsman's Park, Maywood Park and Hawthorne. My father accepted a private training position, which had my family move around a lot, thus my transferring schools twice a year. Honestly, I believe the moving was beneficial to a young girl for I met a lot of great people.

"It was about that time when I really became involved with the horses. I always had a riding horse that travelled with our family from track to track."

When Kristin was in the eighth grade, she decided to stay in one place so she could attend high school.

"Fortunately, we had some good friends, Henri and Judi Lunsford, that had a farm in central Kentucky who were kind enough to offer me to stay with them When I was 12 or 13 years old
I bought my first standardbred,
Castleton Path. She was a large

during school season," Kristin said. "They had a daughter, who was close to my age so I feel blessed to have had two sets of parents and a 'surrogate' sister.

"When I was 12 or 13 years old I bought my first standardbred, Castleton Path. She was a large Landslide mare that came out of the great Castleton Farm pedigrees. Owning a part of that mare gave me permission to go to the paddock when she raced and groom her. That was the beginning of my career."

In the fall of 2011, Kristin attended the Blooded Horse Sale in Delaware, OH.

"I initially went to purchase a trotter but on the second day of the sale I saw a big, beautiful Camluck mare called Stoneridge Beauty who wasn't bringing much money," she said. "She had a very swollen left front leg that was so bad she couldn't flex, for there was no distinction from above her knee to her foot. Although she didn't show much on paper, she was a half-sister to Pet Rock.

"This was the time of Pet Rock's 1-year-old season. He was very impressive and horsemen were taking notice. Of course, Pet Rock turned out to be a successful racehorse and stallion. I bought the mare for \$400 and bred her to Palone Ranger. The result was Bourbon Chase."

During her early to mid-20s, Kristin stepped away from the standardbreds and ventured to the other side of the fence, the thoroughbreds.

"For roughly five years I galloped and ponied racehorses at Turfway Park and River Downs, but eventually returned to the standardbreds, pursuing my trainer and driver's license while working in the family stable," she said. "A lot of people think that thoroughbreds are more exciting but to me there is nothing like a standardbred."

Kristin also took a hiatus in 2014 due to a training accident.

"In 2013, I ventured on my own and had a public stable of 10 standardbreds," she said. "Unfortunately, in 2014 I was involved in a serious training accident, which sidelined me for roughly nine months and I was forced to sell the horses I owned and temporarily close down my operation. It was one and a half years before I was able to get back in the jog cart, and another two years before I was back in a race bike.

"Presently, I am running a stable of 18 horses with my other half; Jonas Czernyson. We are stabled at the Palerma Trotting Center located in Vero Beach, FL, and during racing season we race mainly at Mohegan Sun Pocono, The Red Mile, and this year we ventured to the inaugural meet at Cumberland Run in Corbin, KY. Jonas is also a horseman who is no novice to the sport. As a team we work well — on and off the racetrack — and love what we do."

Kristin's fastest horse to date is Bourbon Chase, the first horse she bred and raised.

"He race timed in 1:49.3 at The Red Mile, but holds a record of 1:50.2 at Hoosier Park," she said. "In his 3-year-old season, he earned \$135,000 and was competitive in the Indian Sire Stakes

with dad driving. To date Bourbon has amassed under \$240,000 and at the age of 11-years-old he is still going strong.

"Recovering after several injuries, he comes back year after year and refuses to retire. I tried to retire Bourbon in the winter of 2023 but he was having none of it, so he is still racing and will do so until he tells me it's time to hang up his harness. I drive him myself so I can pick and choose my spots and do what's best for him and when he retires, he will be my second riding horse."

Coming up with her all-time favorite horse was difficult for Kristin because to her, every horse has different qualities that make them special.

"It would probably be easier to pick a least favorite since there aren't many of them," Kristin said with a laugh.

When it came to who has taught her the most in the industry, the answer was quick and easy.

"Without question, my parents," she said. "They both have amazing assets from all perspectives. It has never been about the hours spent in the barn, the short nights with little or no sleep, or the time spent running up and down the highway. My parents always have always put the horse first and what was

best for them. These are the traits they instilled in me and I am so grateful."

Kristin's lifetime in the sport is chock full of incredible moments with her parents and one stand out experience was just with her dad.

"My father and I were the first father/daughter team to drive together in a pari-mutuel race at Hawthorne Racecourse in Chicago," she said. "A very special memory indeed."

Her most exciting time in the sport was made more special because she shared it with her mom.

"That would be when I had my first pari-mutuel win as a driver at Indiana Downs," Kristin said. "It was pouring rain and I was driving Orixa, a maiden filly trotter. I didn't give her the best trip for we were first up from the half on, but it was the best path to take considering the weather.

"We won the race and as I drove back to the winner's circle, standing in the downpour, smiling from ear-to-ear was my mother. It was a feeling I can't explain."

Besides training and driving, Kristin is a huge advocate for saving and retraining standardbreds.

"One of my passions are saving, adopting out and retraining standardbreds," she said. "I have my own retiree, Longwell, who is a13-year-old Yankee Glide. He was one of my parents homebreds who was retired at the age of 7 after winning over \$300,000 lifetime. Longwell was mom's baby and she wasn't about to let him go anywhere. I was looking into buying a riding horse at the time and decided to turn Longwell into a riding horse.

"Needless to say, it worked out great for both of us as he goes everywhere with me. Another horse of mine, Bourbon Chase will probably be added to the roster when he tells me he's had enough racing."

Kristin loves this sport and definitely has some ideas on what we can do to improve it.

"There are a couple of avenues that I think we need to explore, such as placing more emphasis on advertising to help draw live attendance," she said. "Back in the day when dad was starting out, harness racing was a huge sport. The grandstands were always packed and the handle was great. It's sad but a lot of people don't realize a racetrack may even exist close to them.

"As for being on the racing side, I think there should be uniform rules and regulations across all jurisdictions. I believe our industry needs an influx of younger generations. Unfortunately, in my opinion I think technology has created a disconnection for most people under the age of 30. Some people have no idea what farm life or barn life is, or that it even exists.

"Horses have always been my passion, and to be blessed to have made a career out of something I love and not consider work is priceless. And the best thing about harness racing is there are no limitations. Whether I chose to be a groom, driver, trainer, owner or breeder, it was just a matter of what level I wanted to reach."

MONDAY

Today, I touched a horse, a filly. I was so nervous my hands were shaking. The name of the filly is Sweet Carlina. It's not Carolina because there is no letter "O" on the wooden nameplate above her stall door. Like me, Carlina has a tattoo on her neck, but the filly was smart enough to get inked up with a number under her mane and not stupid enough to have the words Regret Nothing on her knuckles like me. Rhonda said the horses also have chips under their skin.

Rhonda told me to stand close to the horse's side, stay away from the back or front, and move slowly and quietly. Then she said to give the horse a few strokes on her back and suggested I stroke her cheek and mumble a few sweet nothings before clipping a leather strap to the halter.

I knew what was next from watching all week. My job was to lead Sweet Carlina out of her stall and reclip her to a pair of chains dangling in the wide walkway between the stalls. There is another set of these two chains that people call crossties. Crossties keep the horse in place so people can do other stuff to the horse and work around the horse.

So far, no problem. It was like taking a gigantic dog on a fivestep walk. Then, it was back to the shovel and the wheelbarrow to clean Carlina's place while she was away pulling the cart.

I felt good doing this. I have problems remembering the names of all the boots, buckles, and Velcro straps Rhonda attaches.

TUESDAY

Today, I noticed something about horses. When Rhonda takes horses in and out of the stalls, they are gentle and calm. They are relaxed. Whenever I try this simple task, the horse is nervous. I believe the horse understands that I am afraid and senses my nervousness, which makes me more anxious.

People with an addiction are not necessarily more stupid than the rest of society; what we do is ridiculous, but I consider myself intelligent when not buzzed. These horses get dressed daily in buckles, belts, bandages, clip-ons, snaps, hoops, boots, braces, and Velcro. Grooms put this stuff all over these animals, INCLUDING INSIDE of mouths filled with teeth the size of dominoes and tongues the size of LeBron James' tennis shoes, not to mention the average horses here come with feet the size of pie pans and rear ends the size of wheelbarrows.

The other grooms automatically slap this stuff onto horses without seeming to pay attention. When Rhonda slowly walks me through dressing a horse, which she has done about five times, I'm okay. But the minute I am alone, I panic, my mind gets jumbled, and I do not remember what goes where. These damn horses are valuable. I'm terrified that I will make a mistake. Plus, I feel so stupid!

So, this means that now I'm not only afraid of the horses, but that I might have horse equipment dyslexia or amnesia, or my brain has been fried by you know what.

WEDNESDAY

Two days ago, a skank at the dinner table whispered she had a delivery scheduled for tomorrow afternoon. The price was a C for a K-packet of dust, no needle. I signed the deal by scratching the side of my nose.

Anyone reading this who does not have a substance use disorder will wonder why I would give her the okay sign, why risk the safety of this place, the job working with horses, and the chance at recovery. The answer is simple. Our want overpowers our why. Nothing tops our needs, not love, logic, fear of death, ego, or shame. We have to have it; you will never understand if you aren't in our shoes.

Being in this treatment center makes my usual degrading money-making or begging a bit more complicated, but I was working on it when the word came down that the deal was dead.

Here is the K-pack story as I heard it. The skank's mother showed up in the lobby with a birthday cake for her daughter's 22 birthday. The staff stretched the rules, summoned the daughter to the hall, cut the cake, and looked into the grocery bag with a can of unopened Ready Whip that would serve as frosting for the cake. Also, inside the grocery bag were sealed packets of plastic forks and paper plates.

One of the staff handed the grocery bag back to the mother and said the center would supply real forks and plates. The daughter got agitated and said she did not want to bother the kitchen with dishes, a total red flag because this chick is a hard case not known for consideration of others. One of the staff members gets suspicious and looks at the paper plates in the sealed plastic, so the staff member opens the bundle of paper plates, and 50 K-packs are in the hollowed-out center.

The birthday girl is on her way to do real-time, and there are no drugs for me today. Back to the horse farm tomorrow morning. I have mixed feelings about this bullet whizzing past my head. Could this be a good sign?

THURSDAY

Well, today was interesting at the horse training place.

I was minding my own business, cleaning stalls and water buckets, when the head trainer, Ted, the guy with his arm in a sling who met the van on the first day was there. He's the guy I later learned oversees about 70 horses and a dozen employees. Today, Ted's sling was gone, and he had a rubber sleeve on his elbow. He stuck his head into the stall and asked if I had a few minutes. I said he was the boss, and I was used to being fired.

Ted laughed and said he was here to do the opposite. He gathered the three trainees/patients/addicts at the end of a barn and told us that two grooms who worked in barn three were no longer working. He did not say if they quit or got fired, but we will probably find out later. Anyway, Ted needs workers. He asked if we would be willing to work a full day if he talked to the rehab center. He said he would pay us \$10 an hour on top of our current arrangement, but everything depended on whether we were willing and if the rehab center would agree.

One of the girls asked him if we would still need daily drug testing, and he said yes. I asked him if this meant working away from the farm. He said no. It's been a long time since I have been in demand, so I nodded yes, and so did the other two.

Ted said he would make a few calls and see what he could do.

FRIDAY

The shit hit the fan this afternoon. Richard Fleck, from the rehab office, called us to his office to tell me the company denied the request from the horse trainer for us to work extra hours at the horse training center. Fleck blathered on about insurance coverage contracts and punctuated his stupidity by saying they were a treatment center, not an employment center.

Sherry and Donna just shrugged.

I erupted with one of my epic rants, magnificent obscenities, and began by calling Fleck a pencil-necked geek, hardly breathing and possibly spitting. I went off on everything from the staff to the federal government, food, and local government. My grand finale was, this isn't a f---king prison, nobody tells me what to do, I'm walking out and try to stop me MFer.

Fleck had 10 years of running a rehab facility under his belt, so he was used to poor behavior. He barely flinched. When I ran out of gas and deranged shouting, he recommended I take a walk, think carefully, and return to his office in an hour.

I took his advice.

One hour later, I knocked on Fleck's door. I apologized. And I meant every word. He was right. I was wrong. Fleck is not responsible. Nobody is responsible but me. People are trying to help. I make it difficult.



Fleck pushed a box of tissues across his desk. He was quiet as I tried to pull myself together. After my final nose-blowing, he leaned back in his chair and said he would see what he could do.

Beckwith and The Buckeye split Big M six-pack

It was just four days ago that driver Brett Beckwith celebrated a birthday that allows him to walk into a bar and order a drink. For Hall of Fame pilot Dave Miller, that birthday was long ago.

After Friday (Jan. 26) night's races ended at The Meadowlands, maybe the 21-year-old Beckwith and 59-year-old Miller went out and had a celebratory cocktail together, as both recorded three wins on the card.

Beckwith scored in the first, seventh and eighth races, with **Sneak On Bye** (\$5.60 to win), **Anna's Wish** (\$9.00) and **Shes So Sweet** (\$4.80), respectively.

For Beckwith, it was his second Big M driving triple in less than a month, having turned the trick on Dec. 29 of last year.

"[Anna's Wish] was super," said Beckwith of the Mike Terpolilli trainee who scored in 1:53.2. "I didn't know how good she would be based on her last effort [when ninth with better in her 2024 debut]. She needed that start. Mike came up to me and said she was acting really well, and the fractions [:28, :57.1, 1:26] helped a ton."

Shes So Sweet's score gave Beckwith consecutive front-end winners.

"[Trainer] Brett [Derue] is a great dude who had a great year last year at Saratoga," said Beckwith. "Driving for him is fun because his horses are always ready to go. Shes So Sweet fought right to the wire. She put in a great performance."

A winner of 10 of 25 starts a year ago, Shes So Sweet completed the mile in 1:54.2.

Miller must love racing on Fridays, having won four dashes two weeks ago before his three-bagger.

'The Buckeye' scored in the second, third and sixth races with **JK Lucky Charms** (\$3.40), **Rose Run Yankee** (\$3.00), and **Pattycake Mooss** (\$5.20), respectively. Miller came close to a fourth tally in the 14th race, but came up a head short with 6-5 favorite I'll Owe You One.

A LOT OF LITTLE: It was a big night for Big M TV host Dave Little, as the long-time handicapper tabbed six winners on top, including a big Pick-4.

When Little's top pick, **Bolt Of Beauty**, won the ninth race and paid \$43.20, it capped a Pick-4 that returned \$550.85 for a \$40 investment. He also had **Mount Royal**, who paid \$20.40 in the 13th.

Little's other winners were JK Lucky Charms, Rose Run Yankee, value play Anna's Wish and Shes So Sweet.

A LITTLE MORE: The 20-cent Pick-6 returned a staggering \$48,579 after a sequence that saw winner's odds of 7-5, 20-1, 6-5, 8-1, 5-1 and 9-1. All-source handle totaled \$2,753,123.

The \$200,000 Prix d'Ete returning to Hippodrome 3R

The Quebec Jockey Club is proud to announce that their signature race, the Prix d'Ete, will return at the Hippodrome 3R for their 2024 race season with a purse of \$200,000 for 4-year-old pacers plus a \$50,000 consolation race if 14 or more horses enter.

The race has not been held since 2019 due to COVID restrictions followed by reductions in stakes events. The race is scheduled to take place on Sunday (Aug. 18, 2024).

The last Prix d'Ete at H3R saw This Is The Plan (Somebeachsomewhere) and driver Daniel Dube set the Canadian half-mile record and all-age track record with a 1:49.1 triumph on Sunday (Aug. 18. 2019).

The Prix D'Ete was the most prestigious race in all of Canada from 1966 through 1992. World champions Bret Hanover, Albatross, Niatross, Hot Hitter, Cam Fella, On The Road Again, Ralph Hanover, Matt's Scooter and a host of other top pacers have won the Prix D'Ete when it was an open event held primarily at Blue Bonnets Raceway in Montreal.

To be eligible to the race, owners and trainers must make the first stakes payment by March 15, 2024. In order for the race to take place, there will have to be six different entries, a very important specification since we have seen in past years multiple entries that unfortunately reduce the wagering.

It will be interesting to examine potential candidates for this prestigious race. Several of the big names in the 3-year-olds have been retired from stud in recent months, which will open up the race to more contenders and provide another excellent show.

Will Stockade Seelster, a winner of more than \$1.5M, be there? He has all the trappings of a candidate, being trained by Dr. Ian Moore, driven by James MacDonald and Ontarian-owned. Why Not Now, a regular half-mile winner could also show up. Ervin Hanover of the Burke stable, who has competed in every edition to date, could also be there.

It should also be noted that mares can also participate. There has never been a mare in the Prix d'Ete, but this year's contenders contain two extraordinary ones in Twin B Fresh and Sylvia Hanover. If these two mares were in the race, it would be great.
