Standardbred Canada announced the winners of the 2023 O'Brien Awards, honoring Canada's best in harness racing over the past season, at the Black Tie Gala in Charlottetown, PEI on Saturday (Feb. 3).

The event marked the 35th edition of the O'Brien Awards, named in honor of the late

Joe O'Brien, an outstanding horseman from PEI and member of the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame.

Sylvia Hanover was the evening's headliner, as she was crowned the Somebeachsomewhere Horse of the Year and was the winner of the Three-Year-Old Pacing Filly category. With the awards gala held in PEI, the Maritimes were well represented on stage all evening, highlighted by reinsman James MacDonald, who took home his third consecutive Keith Waples Driver of the Year award, and Dr. Ian Moore, who was recognized with his first Trainer of the Year title. Moore conditioned two 2023 O'Brien Award winners: Tattoo Artist, a former sophomore divisional winner who was named Older Pacing Horse of the Year, and Stockade Seelster, who won his second consecutive O'Brien Award, this time in the Three-Year-Old Pacing Colt category. The Maritime representation didn't end there, as So Much More, bred in PEI, repeated as the Older Pacing Mare of the Year, marking her third win in this category.

Following a dominant freshman campaign, Sylvia Hanover returned just as strong, and perhaps even better, as a sophomore. The daughter of Always B Miki—Shyaway notched 10 wins in 13 starts at 3, totalling \$839,375 in earnings, and taking a record of 1:48.1 at Red Mile for trainers Shawn and Mark Steacy. Her victories included wins in the Fan Hanover, Mistletoe Shalee and Glen Garnsey, prior to capping it all off with a score in the \$600,000 Breeders Crown. Her outstanding sophomore campaign not only earned her Three-Year-Old Pacing Filly honors, she took home the Somebeachsomewhere Horse of the Year title as well.

Tara Hills Stud Farm Ltd., owned by David Heffering, was recognized for the first time with the Armstrong Breeder of the Year award. Horses bred by the Port Perry, ON-based farm found the winner's circle 169 times in 2023 while bankrolling more than \$3.4 million. The 2023 O'Brien Award winner, Tattoo Artist, was the farm's lone \$1 million earner this past season, thanks in part to wins in the Canadian Pacing Derby, the Jim Ewart Memorial and the Dayton Pacing Derby. In addition to the son of Hes Watching, Storm Shadow was another one of the breeding farm's standouts, earning more than \$375,000 in his freshman campaign, which was headlined with a win in the Ontario Sires Stakes (OSS) Super Final.

After an exceptional season, Dr. Ian Moore was awarded Trainer of the Year honors for the first time in his career. A two-time recipient of the O'Brien Award of Horsemanship over the past decade, the PEI native achieved a career milestone by surpassing \$3 million in seasonal purse earnings for the first time. In 2023, Moore captured the Canadian Pacing Derby, courtesy of O'Brien Award winner Tattoo Artist, who finished with more than \$1 million in seasonal purse earnings. His other O'Brien Award winner, Stockade Seelster, enjoyed a strong sophomore campaign, being one of the standouts in the Ontario Sires Stakes program, as well as putting forth strong runner-up finishes in some marquee stakes events in the U.S. Moore also captured the



OSS Super Final for 2-year-old pacing colts, courtesy of Storm Shadow. Moore's 51 victories in 2023 represent the second-highest seasonal performance of his career.

James MacDonald was honored as the Keith Waples Driver of the Year for the third year in a row, becoming the first driver to win the award for three consecutive years since Doug Brown achieved the feat twice (1989-1991, 1993-1996). MacDonald reached the 400-win mark for the second year in a row and exceeded \$10 million in seasonal purse earnings, which was the first time he's done that in his career, and the first time a Canadian-based driver has reached the plateau in more than a decade. The native of PEI drove several of the O'Brien Award winners, including So Much More, Legendary Hanover, Willys Home Run, Righteous Resolve and Adare Castle. MacDonald also received a third consecutive Lampman Cup title, awarded to the leading driver in the Ontario Sires Stakes program. Some of his seasonal accomplishments were winning the Shes A Great Lady, Forest City Pace and multiple OSS Gold divisions plus a Super Final.

Mark Etsell followed up his first million-dollar season in 2022 with yet another seven-figure season in 2023 and was named the winner of the 2023 O'Brien Award of Horsemanship. The talented horseman has been in the spotlight over the last couple of seasons primarily due to his star mare, now two-time O'Brien Award winner Adare Castle, who captured O'Brien Award honors as a sophomore in 2022 and as older mare in 2023. Etsell trained a second O'Brien finalist in rookie trotter Willowtime. Etsell's ability to develop young, bargain-priced trotters has been a focal point of his career, and has especially been a strong accent of his over the last couple of years. To go along with his second straight million-dollar campaign, Etsell set a career high in wins (32) and sported a sterling UTRS of 0.321.

After a runner-up finish in the Future Star category a year ago, **Cassidy Schneider** took the 2023 title. Following in her father's footsteps, Schneider had a successful training season in 2023 building on her achievements in 2022. In 611 seasonal starts, the young trainer accumulated 83 wins, with earnings of \$521,886. Doing most of her racing across Ontario's B tracks, Schneider topped the 2023 trainer standings at Hanover Raceway and The Raceway at the Western Fair District.

Pass Line won the O'Brien as the country's top Two-Year-Old Pacing Filly. During a freshman season in which she reached the winner's circle 10 times in 13 starts, Pass Line was nothing short of spectacular. Trained by Dave Menary on Canadian soil, the homebred daughter of All Bets Off—Breakheart Pass was a standout in the OSS program, winning four of her five Gold events, and capping it off with a convincing Super Final triumph. In addition, she put forth very respectable runner-up finishes in both the Battle Of The Belles and the \$700,000 Breeders Crown, earning \$682,152 along the way while taking a mark of 1:49.3 at Woodbine Mohawk Park.

- ★ He won \$2.8 plus million according to the US records or \$3.2 million in Canada. While winning 42% of his 96 starts, and finished 2nd 20% of the time.
- ★ He has won on every size track (1/2, 5/8, 7/8 and mile). He did this while setting many track and stakes records.
- ★ He paced his back half in 52.1, coming from 7th at the half defeating Bythemissal, Allywag Hanover, etc to win the Canadian Pacing Derby.

In the Two-Year-Old Pacing Colt category, **Legendary Hanover** was awarded the 2023 O'Brien Award. The son of Huntsville—Lillian Hanover found the winner's circle six times in nine starts, while taking a speed badge of 1:50 at Mohawk. Included in those victories, the talented freshman captured Nassagaweya and Champlain stakes divisions, as well as the Dream Maker Series final. The richest payday for the colt, trained on Canadian soil by Anthony Beaton, came courtesy of his second-place effort in the \$970,000 Metro Pace, helping to lift his seasonal earnings to \$405,100.

Stockade Seelster took home his second consecutive O'Brien Award, this year in the Three-Year-Old Pacing Colt category. In a strong sophomore campaign, the son of State Treasurer—Soiree Seelster notched seven victories in 19 starts, while bankrolling \$677,688. Three of those victories came in OSS Gold legs, where he lowered his lifetime mark to 1:48.4. In addition, the Dr. Ian Moore trainee had wins in the Somebeachsomewhere Stakes and North America Cup consolation. He was a runner-up in both the Max Hempt Memorial and the \$600,000 Breeders Crown.

In the Older Pacing Mare category, So Much More scored her third O'Brien trophy for her connections. The daughter of Big Jim—Ladysai had 13 wins in 33 outings during her 7-year-old campaign, marking her fifth consecutive season with double digit victories. She competed against both the boys and girls again this past year and was able to conquer the boys on multiple occasions. Other notable achievements for So Much More consisted of a win in the Forest City Pace at Western Fair, as well as eight fillies and mares preferreds at Mohawk. The Don Beatson trainee earned \$357,992 in 2023, while taking a new lifetime mark of 1:49.1.

A finalist for the Older Pacing Horse Award one year ago, Tattoo Artist capped his career with an O'Brien Award in this category — his second O'Brien after winning as a 3-year-old in 2020. After finding the winner's circle nine times this season, the 6-year-old reached the \$1 million mark in earnings for the second year in a row. Of those nine wins, seven of them were recorded on Canadian soil, where he was trained by Dr. Ian Moore. His biggest triumph came at Woodbine Mohawk Park, where he captured the Canadian Pacing Derby. He was retired at the conclusion of his 2023 season for stallion duty in 2024..

Willys Home Run won Two-Year-Old Trotting Filly honors. With a perfect record in the OSS program, the rookie trotting filly had an outstanding freshman campaign. In 10 starts, she found the winner's circle six times, earning \$523,935 under the guidance of trainer Kyle Fellows. The homebred daughter of Archangel—Rite Outa The Park swept all five OSS Gold legs, and including her win in the \$300,000 Super Final, her smallest margin of victory in the provincial program was 2-1/4 lengths. Willys Home Run never missed the board in her debut season, finishing second in the \$425,000 Peaceful Way Stakes and took a mark of 1:55.1 at Mohawk.

For the Two-Year-Old Trotting Colt division, **TCI** won the 2023 O'Brien Award. The freshman trotter enjoyed an exceptional debut season, earning more money on Canadian soil than any

other standardbred in the sport. With 10 victories and two runner-up finishes in 12 starts, the son of Cantab Hall—Nicoles Promise amassed a total of \$1,453,370 in North American earnings for U.S. Hall of Fame trainer Ron Burke, while taking his mark of 1:51.4 at Red Mile. He went three-for-three in Canada, including wins at Mohawk in the \$620,000 William Wellwood Memorial and the \$1 million Mohawk Million, where he made a break leaving the gate before circling the field to win going away in an impressive comeback.

Righteous Resolve captured her second O'Brien Award, winning the 2023 Three-Year-Old Trotting Filly category. As a sophomore, the daughter of Resolve—Motown Muscle was ultra-consistent, hitting the board 10 times in 11 starts, while taking a mark of 1:52 at Mohawk. Trained by Matt Bax, Righteous Resolve earned \$397,514 at age 3, with two OSS Gold wins and runner-up finishes in both the \$381,000 Elegantimage and \$157,200 Simcoe Stakes. Arguably, her most impressive performance of the year was in the \$500,000 Hambletonian Oaks at The Meadowlands, where she finished a lapped-on third and trotted her mile in 1:50.4.

Ghostly Casper took home the O'Brien Award in the Three-Year-Old Trotting Colt division. Despite earning more than \$200,000 as a freshman, Ghostly Casper went winless in 12 starts at age 2, but had no such trouble finding the winner's circle in his sophomore season, getting his picture taken four times for trainer and co-owner Benoit Baillargeon. Three of those victories were achieved in the OSS program, where he captured two Gold events as well as the \$300,000 Super Final, by 5-1/4 lengths in

a lifetime best of 1:53. The son of Resolve—Cool Creek Breeze earned \$404,385 in 2023, and did Canada proud by qualifying for the final of the \$1 million Hambletonian at The Meadowlands after finishing a lapped-on fourth in his elimination.

Adare Castle was crowned champion in the Older Trotting Mare category, winning an O'Brien Award for the second time in her career. The daughter of Muscle Mass—Pacific Edge won six times at age 4, earning \$201,300 and lowering her lifetime mark to 1:52 for trainer/co-owner Mark Etsell. All six of her victories were at Mohawk, where she swept the three legs and final of the Ontario Graduate Series, took a leg of the Miss Versatility Series and had a preferred trot triumph against the boys. She also travelled to Ohio in September and had a runner-up finish in the Miss Versatility final.

In the Older Trotting Horse category, **Logan Park** won an O'Brien Award for the first time in his career after a previous nomination as a sophomore. With a dozen trips to the winner's circle during his 5-year-old campaign in 2023, the trotter shattered his previous high of five seasonal wins, which he accomplished in both 2021 and 2022. The son of Archangel—Rite Outa The Park—a full sibling to O'Brien Award winner Willys Home Run—was a force to be reckoned with all year in the free-for-all ranks at Mohawk, winning at that level 10 times. The Kyle Fellows trainee also won his Breeders Crown elimination at Hoosier Park and finished fourth in the \$600,000 final, resulting in his richest payday of the season. He bankrolled \$348,970 on the year and set a new track and Canadian record of 1:50.3 at Mohawk in a career-best performance on July 4.

The Media Excellence Awards and Outstanding Groom Award were also presented during the O'Brien Awards Gala.

HRU columnist **Chris Lomon** won his first Media Excellence Award in the Outstanding Written Work category for his feature, "Felix Marion, Farrier to the Stars." The story, which was published in the January 2023 edition of TROT Magazine, highlights the passion, meticulous craftsmanship and dedication to the craft of Felix Marion as a farrier.

Woodbine Entertainment Group won its 11th Media Excellence Award in the Outstanding Video, Film or Broadcast category for the production of the "Pepsi North America Cup" on TSN on June 17, 2023. This one-hour, special broadcast of the \$1 million Pepsi North America Cup aired in high definition and featured live race coverage of the marquee event. Commentary was provided by hosts Laura Diakun, Greg Blanchard and Mark McKelvie of Woodbine Entertainment, with the race call provided by Woodbine Mohawk Park's own track announcer, Ken Middleton.

Defending champion in the Outstanding Photography category, **Clive Cohen** captured his eighth Media Excellence Award for his photograph, "The Rainbow." The photo, which captures two horses and their trainers jogging on the racetrack, is highlighted with a gorgeous rainbow in the backdrop. The photo was taken at Mohawk on July 20, 2023 and was published on the track's social media feeds.

Andrew Ward of Saint John, NB was recognized with the Outstanding Groom Award. The man fondly known as "Drew," has been involved in the world of horse racing since his childhood days. Ward started caring for horses at 5 years old with his dad, James. He then went on to work with Winston (Soupy) Campbell, Jody Hennessey, Ross MacDonald, Hughie Baird and Gilles Barriault before moving to P.E.I. in the summer of 2015 to work with Earl Watts. Over the past six years, Ward has continued to grow his passion as a caretaker, now dedicating himself to the Tom Weatherbie Stable, where he plays a pivotal role in ensuring the well-being of the horses both on and off the track. Among the horses he's cared for in 2023 are Island Beach Boy, Fern Hill General, Redlandbethanyjean, Woodmere Heather M, Downtown Tonight, Century Keyanna and Fern Hill Indigo.

The 2023 Cam Fella Award was presented to the **Honorable Dennis King**, Premier of Prince Edward Island. Raised in PEI, King developed a profound passion for harness racing at an early age. Beyond personal interest, King became a fervent advocate for harness racing, leading to a notable increase in participation, improved infrastructure and heightened community engagement in the sport under his visionary leadership. His unwavering commitment to promoting the values, traditions and potential of harness racing significantly contributed to its growing popularity within the province. King prioritized initiatives to support local breeders, trainers, drivers and enthusiasts, fostering a thriving ecosystem that nurtures talent and ensures the sport's sustainability for future generations in PEI.

Established in 1989, the O'Brien Awards honor the people and horses that made the greatest contribution to Canadian harness racing over the past season.

Michigan horse racing faces troubling future as Northville Downs has had its final race

After 80 years at its current location, the last live harness race was held at Northville Downs on Saturday. A new track in the state is now a long way off — if ever.

Saturday night (Feb. 3) was the last card of live pari-mutuel harness racing for the foreseeable future in Michigan as Northville Downs is now closed and will soon be developed.

This week, the future of the horse racing in Michigan was put into further doubt when Plymouth Township voted unanimously to rescind a motion authorizing construction of a new track on a 128-acre plot of land owned by Northville Downs ownership.

The hope that a new track could be constructed there in the next 12-18 months has now been dashed, leaving horse racing in limbo in Michigan.

Tom Barrett, the president of the Michigan Harness Horsemen's Association, said the closure of the state's last remaining parimutuel horse racing track "is not a good thing by any stretch."

"The guys that are still in Michigan are a resilient bunch," Barrett said. "We will still have our fairly-lucrative summer program with our colt stakes program. It will be at the various fair tracks around the state and most of the horsemen that are still here participate in that. But not having pari-mutuel racing for a good chunk of the year is certainly not a good thing."

Horse race betting in Michigan is the oldest form of legal gambling in the state, predating lotteries.

And money appears to be at the root of the problem of a new track being built. Barrett said a recent vote to deny the new track concerned Northville Downs ownership balking at Plymouth Township requiring \$50,000 per year for 10 years to be provided to the township via a community benefit agreement.

The land will soon be developed as part of a \$250 million project to build new homes and commercial space.

Barrett said the development has been in the works for many years. It certainly isn't a surprise to the horsepeople that depend on the track for their livelihood.

"We knew that this year was going to be limited in terms of racing opportunities," Barrett said. "We knew that even if Plymouth Township had approved the PUD (Planned Unit Development) it was still going to be, I would guess, nine to 15 months lead time to get [a new track] built.

"But, now that it's actually happening, it becomes a little bit of a panic situation... It's one thing to plan for it or to know it's coming, it's another to have a date put on it and have to react."

Breeding, training and racing standardbreds in Michigan goes back to the 19th century.

At one point, Michigan was home to six harness racing tracks. In the last 15 years, three of the remaining four tracks — Jackson, Sports Creek and Hazel Park in Detroit — have all closed. That left Northville as the only pari-mutuel track left. And it contributed to a mass exodus from the state by people that race horses for a living.

Much of the demise of the sport is tied to the fact that, unlike other states and provinces where horse racing is prevalent, Michigan tracks did not receive a cut when gambling expanded to casinos and sports betting. Though the Michigan Agriculture Equine Industry Development Fund does now receive funding from Michigan online gambling tax revenue.

"It's incredibly disappointing," Barrett said. "In all of the surrounding states and the province of Ontario the government has supported horse racing. Indiana, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Ontario, all have [gambling] revenue that supplements purses and enhances agriculture in their areas."

Barrett said the horsepeople still left in Michigan will now have to race in some of those other jurisdictions to stay afloat. With that comes considerable travel and expense.

"A lot of them will have to ship to Cleveland or some other jurisdiction to race," Barrett said. "Miami Valley [in Ohio] is racing. Some may ship to Toronto... My son and I were just talking about going to Sarnia [just across the border in Ontario to race this summer].

"So there are options, but I'm not going to kid you, not having a pari-mutuel track in Michigan for a period of time is certainly going to be a stressor for our horsemen, having to travel more and spend more to get their horses raced."

Barrett said he is optimistic a new track will be built and additional gambling could be added to a new track to support horse racing in Michigan.

He said the most likely source would be from Historical Horse Racing machines. These are slot-like machines that allow bettors to wager on random horse races from the past.


HHR machines have been a major success in driving purses and revenue in Kentucky.

"We've always been hopeful that it's a tool we could add," Barrett said of historical horse racing machines. "And I think the planned track at Plymouth included at least the potential of a facility that would house HHR."

But first, the owners of Northville Downs have to find a new home.

In the interim, the closure of the state's last remaining track will put a damper on any 80th anniversary celebrations.

The staying power of Monticello

On Thursday, the tiny track had handle of more than \$1.1 million, its second highest in history.

In the category of not entirely out of the blue but still fascinating to ponder, handle at Monticello Raceway went over \$1 million this past Thursday (Feb. 1). In its press release, Monticello announced that the handle of \$1,114,118 was the second highest in the track's 66-year history.

To say that the resulting handle was a function of the high number of races on the card would be technically correct, but that alone misses the remarkably consistent handle dynamic at Monticello. The near-record card from the first day in February had 13 races, almost double than usual, to help make up for the latest track cancellation that came days earlier on Monday.

But what was not unusual was the amount wagered per-race that day of \$85,701. In fact, that per-race average is nearly on the nose to the \$85,019 per-race average from the prior Thursday when the track handled just over \$935,000 over 11 races. Nearly every race day at Monticello has multiple races with total pools in excess of \$100,000. If the track raced fewer days and went 11 or 12 races a card instead of the more general number of just eight, it would reach \$1 million in handle all the time. The amounts that Monticello averages in per-race handle is not something most tracks can boast.

What makes the Monticello handle such a phenomenon is that, respectfully, there isn't much in the product that suggests it should handle as high as it does. Its handle truly is far greater than the sum of its parts. It buries all traditional notions as to what drives handle.

If there were a performance ratio that was the result of handle to quality of racing stock, Monticello would be laps ahead of whoever would be next. Despite what was once thought to be One would think Yonkers would gain also from the historical visibility to a New York following, but that hasn't been the case. Maybe it's a different dynamic when racing at night as opposed to the afternoon. But whatever the case and despite Yonkers racing some of the best horses in the country offering purses about five times over that of Monticello, the track is almost routinely outhandled by its upstate neighbor.

favorable gaming conditions, purses at the track have been on the steady decline for years. On Thursday's card, only the fillies and mares open with a purse of \$6,500 went for a purse of more than \$5,000. The majority of the other races that day offered purses just in the \$3,000's, including a pair of \$5,000 claiming races going for \$3,000 and \$3,200.

That's not something that bothers Monticello bettors, though. In the race with a \$3,200 purse, total race handle was \$117,644. It defies conventional wisdom.

Similarly, Monticello shows that horses don't need to race in times of 1:48 to generate wagering interest. Especially in the winter months, races at the track still can be found going in times of over 2:00. From Nov. 13 of last year, there was a trot race that went in a time of 2:06 on a fast-rated track and it had tens of thousands of dollars wagered on it.

There's no definitive answer, but it's nonetheless interesting to ponder the uniqueness of Monticello that drives its consistently high handle.

Perhaps it comes down to two simple factors of appeal to its core following. First, it comes to mind as the only other track along with Freehold to offer afternoon harness racing for as long and as consistently as it has. Second, it has a long-established New York following. The fact that Monticello has retained its aging but still viable following and that it races in the afternoon — as opposed to Yonkers that races in the evening — maybe that is Monticello's secret for success.

One would think Yonkers would gain also from the historical visibility to a New York following, but that hasn't been the case. Maybe it's a different dynamic when racing at night as opposed to the afternoon. But whatever the case and despite Yonkers racing some of the best horses in the country offering purses about five times over that of Monticello, the track is almost routinely outhandled by its upstate neighbor.

There's nothing particularly flashy in the Monticello product and its style of half-mile racing is about what you'd expect from any other track of that size. But again, coming back to consistency, bettors have come to know what to expect. Many of the horsepeople at the track have been mainstays there for decades, and maybe there's some level of comfort and predictability in that. That there's perpetual familiarity has continued to keep the track's dedicated following.

From research online, I've seen conflicting information as to what Monticello's all-time handle is. Even Thursday's handle of \$1.1 million was cited as the second-highest handle ever, but there was that day from November with tote manipulation across the country and Monticello had one race alone with a \$950,000 superfecta pool. Did that day not count? At this point, million-dollar cards at Monticello may soon be even more commonplace.

Regardless of the specific records, the trend of Monticello along with other smaller, half-mile tracks over the past few years has been an increase to handle. Batavia Downs has set a record handle two different times in its first six days of racing in 2024. Western Fair Raceway handled over \$2.1 million across three race dates this past week.

There's something to be said for the following that each track has.



Campbell wishes North American harness racing was structured more like France and Sweden

The day before jumping on a plane to Paris to attend the Prix d'Amerique, Hambletonian Society CEO John Campbell was asked what he wished North American harness racing could adopt from the Europeans.

It's no surprise that Campbell said there is a lot to like about the fact that in France and Sweden one organization essentially controls everything — the rules, the medications, etc. After all, he has been working for many years to try to bring universal rules to North American harness racing.

Campbell said everything in French harness racing operates like NASCAR, which is a privately-owned company controlled by the family of founder Bill France, Sr.


"In France, the betting corporation [the Pari Mutuel Urbain (PMU)] is an arm of LeTROT, which organizes all the races and governs all the rules," Campbell said. "So, you've got one organization, rightly or wrongly, making all the decisions and you don't have all the fragmentation and piecemeal decisions that we have here with our different states and provinces.

"They make all the decisions for French racing and they've done a tremendous job building handle, building brands. PMU is the betting arm of LeTROT and they are a worldwide brand for betting. So, it's much different when you have that one organization and they are making the decisions."

Having the PMU operating as a separate entity under one house is key, Campbell said.

"And the funding mechanisms to support all the racing in France is under that same umbrella," he said. "They support races that are out in the country, what we would call smaller meets. They support and subsidize those from the money they corporation [the Pari Mutuel Urbain (PMU)] is an arm of LeTROT, which organizes all the races and governs all the rules. So, you've got one organization, rightly or wrongly, making all the decisions and you don't have all the fragmentation and piecemeal decisions that we have here with our different states and provinces.

make from Vincennes. So, there's popularity and top horses racing throughout the country for decent purses."

It's similar in Sweden, Campbell said. The national betting company, ATG, is 91 per cent owned by Svensk Travsport (the Swedish Trotting Association).

Unlike North America, "there are fewer people that you have to worry about," Campbell said. "You only need a few chairs in the room, not 25."

Another plus about European races? They start when they say they are going to start. Campbell said he wishes North American races would start on post time and not drag many minutes at 0 minutes to post.

"Certainly [European races] go on post time and that's a big plus, but the [North American] racetracks and the handicappers have created this system with drag, so here we are and we're stuck with it until there's a unified effort by all the tracks to go back to go on post time," Campbell said.

He said it's a major advantage that in Sweden and France harness racing is a national sport.

"People all over the country are aware of trotting races in both Sweden and France," he said. "We don't have that. Obviously, the Swedes tying their lottery to their races with the V75 and all that has made the exposure for harness racing tremendous in Sweden, but it's the same in France. It's a national sport."

As for what he loves about Vincennes, Campbell said his favorite part is going into the paddock — which is right beside the grandstand — and seeing the horses and old friends.

"Getting to chat with J.P. Dubois is always a highlight for me," Campbell said. "He's always in the paddock. There's a language barrier there, but we have no problem with it. So, to stop and have a glass of champagne in the paddock with J.P. Dubois, it doesn't get a whole lot better than that."

Though Dubois doesn't know much English and Campbell doesn't know much French, they share the universal language of horses.

"The language is not that much of a hindrance," Campbell said. "It's always a pleasure to get to stop by and visit with him.

"What a career he's had. He's just done everything in the sport on two continents, it's pretty amazing. He's just a personable, humble, gentleman and it's a highlight to get to talk to him every year."

Campbell said one of the few regrets of his career was never getting to drive at Vincennes.

"I was invited to [drive there] a couple times and I just didn't go," he said. "The first day I was ever there... I went into the washroom and I was recognized before I got out of there.

"Then I walked out and I looked at that track and I looked at the crowd and everything and I said to myself, I made a mistake not coming here to drive at least once.' It was just that impressive to look at the track and the whole facility the first time I was exposed to it.

"Now, I always said, with that [turn-and-go] start that they do for the Prix d'Amerique, I would never want to drive in the Prix d'Amerique with that start with a horse that had a chance because there's a knack to it and you'd have to do it 15 or 20 times to get onto it and make sure you did it right. But if the horse was 40- or 50-1 and didn't have much of a chance, I would have loved to have driven in the Prix d'Amerique.

"I did have a chance or two, but I didn't and I knew I made a mistake as soon as I took a look at that facility and walked out onto the track apron."

Gearing up for 2024

Scott Zeron turns 35 in May, but in February he's preparing to nail down his second "Trotter of the Year" trophy, prior to age 35 with Tactical Approach. This, of course, follows Marion Marauder who nailed it down in a 73-72 vote back in his Triple Crown year of 2016.

In 2023, Tactical Landing, the sire of Tactical Approach, is mirror-imaging what Andover Hall did. Both were the highest priced yearlings of their year, \$480,000 in 2000 for Andover and \$800,000 for Tactical Landing in 2016. Both will have landed a Trotter of the Year in their very first crop if overwhelming favorite Tactical Approach gets the job done for Tactical Landing in 2023 as Donato Hanover did in 2007 for his sire Andover Hall.

DRIVING NUMBERS INTO A NEW STRATOSPHERE?

Aaron Merriman started February 2024 with 81,172 drives. Dave Palone just surpassed the 80,000 milestone with now 80,091 needed for those 20,689 victories. Cat Manzi's 95,690 starts has been the existing high-water mark and he still reigns as the busiest ever. But, that now appears to be within telescopic sight. (Note: Tony Morgan is about to hit 85,000 drives).

How about the top three money guys? Tim Tetrick entered February needing 150G to then be within \$30 million of John Campbell, Numero Uno, with \$299,842,141. Sandwiched in at No. 2 is the amazing Dave Miller who was the only driver in 2023 over 45 to land in the top 12 in earnings. Now 59, and showing zero signs of any slippage, Miller, at \$282,106,999, is only \$17.9 million away from Campbell.

For arguments sake, let's say Miller tails off a notch or two at ages 60 and 61, and Tetrick does not at 43 and 44. We could all be meeting at the ultimate milestone in the late summer of 2026, before Tetrick's 45th birthday in November.

Even more amazing might be Campbell holding the record by then for 39 years and having been just 32 in July 1987 when he assumed the top spot.

ALL BETS OFF ON THIS ONE

Who in the world does this? Who goes 15-for-93 combined in their last four years of racing, at ages 4, 5, 6 and 7, yet banks \$1,999 million? All Bets Off did just that with \$3.1M for his career.

RIP AMERICAN IDEAL

What a great horse/sire. We just lost him at 22. A dual hemisphere stallion who was dominant not just in NY but all over.

"I just lost the sire of half of my barn," said Shane Tritton. Mark MacDonald said, "He's the horse who put Casie Coleman and myself on the map [in 2005]."

Western Ideal had the top two money-earning sophomore colts of 2005 in HOY Rocknroll Hanover and American Ideal from his first crop. It was American Ideal who vaulted past arch rival Rocknroll Hanover on 2005 Hambletonian Day to set the new Meadowlands' track record of 1:48.1, and then showed he had even more in his arsenal with history's first ever sophomore sub 1:48 mile, going 1:47.4 at the Red Mile that fall.

As a sire, American Ideal was at \$15.6 million in 2021, and over \$16 million last year. He will be greatly missed.

WILT OR TIMMY?

Who got jobbed/robbed worse, Wilt Chamberlain or Tim Tetrick, for MVP or HTA Driver of the Year, respectively?

In the NBA in 1962, Chamberlain averaged 50.4 points per game, 25.7 rebounds per game and 48.5 minutes per game. He missed eight minutes all year (due to DQ) and played in every overtime. But he was not the MVP. He got 35.8 per cent and Bill Russell was MVP with 18.9 points, 23.8 rebounds and an NBA title.

Tetrick was third in the 2012 HTA Driver of the Year to George Brennan and Dave Palone who both had strong years combining for \$19.5 million. Balloting was 92, 90, 88, respectively.

Ready? Tetrick won \$18,529,676, had seven divisional champs, by far an all-time best since four was the most entering 2012. Tetrick drove both the top two in HOY balloting and both the Trotter and Pacer of the Year in Chapter Seven and Captaintreacherous, respectively. He won the richest race of the year, the \$1,500,000 Hambletonian with Market Share and won four Breeders Crowns tied for No. 1 all time at that moment. (PS: No trotter since Market Share has enjoyed a \$2 million single season).

YOU NEED TO MEET TOM DURKIN

I saw his name on the ballot for a possible Hall of Fame suggestion/submission from the New Jersey Chapter of USHWA. Durkin's still around working with the Thoroughbred Hall of Fame I believe. Pencil in his name on your bucket list as someone you should meet. It'll be worth it.

Look at the years he called in NJ., the primo/million dollar era at its finest. It was no coincidence at all that Durkin was in the booth.

He was there when the World Cup came to town from 1982-85, the Statue Of Liberty Trot from 1985-89, the first ever million races for the ladies in the Sweetheart from 1984-87, the Hambletonian dead heat in 1989, and many more including the richest ever race, the 1984 Woodrow Wilson.

He was one of the all-time best Meadowlands/Allen Gutterman/ Sam Anzalone hires. He has an affability you pretty much hope for in people but never seem to find. There was a quote, years back, I heard about the great actor Robert Ryan. "The industry was not big enough for his talents." That's Tom too.



Remembering Los Alamitos and beyond

Bulldozers leveled Hollywood Park to sawdust in 2014. Its 260 acres were replaced by a housing development and an entertainment complex (which included a casino and an NFL stadium). The remnants of horse racing were exculpated to the extent of moving the graves and monuments of champion thoroughbreds to other tracks and horses' breeding grounds. Statues of Swaps and Bill Shoemaker were placed into storage; somewhere.

Los Alamitos Racetrack did not experience the fate of Hollywood Park. Quite the opposite. It was eventually renovated to become a part of a newer and healthier California thoroughbred racing circuit. But in the 1980s the Orange County five-eighths mile track featured three breeds of horse racing throughout the years. The pecking order included quarter horses and standardbreds and thoroughbreds.

The 21-or-so miles from Hollywood proper was a tedious drive; especially when I made the trip alone because Mr. Bruce was too busy elsewhere on particular racing nights. Getting to the track for an evening's first harness-program post meant battling rush-hour traffic bottlenecks heading towards the inland empire. When I made the ride alone it was a test of devotion; when Mr. Bruce was with me it was a cacophony of laughter defying any road stress.

Los Al was a different theater than Hollywood Park. Mr. Bruce said it had "a dark vibe." It was dark green and rusty brown compared to Hollywood's orange motif. It looked weathered and appeared no better in shape and atmosphere than when

it was in constant disrepair due to rain damage during its first race meet in 1951. But the harness faithful in the '80s endured. We gladly paid the parking and admission and program prices to share the action with the equine and human athletes changing venues from Inglewood to Los Alamitos. On the smaller stage were the same trotters and pacers handled by the same West Coast-based trainers and drivers. We were a part of their caravan.

We wagered more money at Los Al than we did at Hollywood because we were making more money from our professions. A \$30 win on Manga Hawk (Robert Sleeth in the bike) returned \$216; nearly a one-bedroom month's rent. And as the racing ensued it turned out that respecting the under-rated Sleeth awarded us some of our best investments on the three-turn mile. Los Al flourished for us with other drivers; Frank Sherren and Joe Anderson and Ross Croghan often over-performed the public's odds for our benefit.

One day Mr. Bruce got he and I a job as extras in the secondunit production of the movie "Meteor." It called for an afternoon of running around a public park as if shards of space rocks pummeled to Earth. The Orange County park doubled as an Italian town and the gig offered free lunch as well as cash. The shoot ended in plenty of time for us to make the first race that night. (Watching the film today reveals our brief appearances).

The Los Alamitos experiences also furthered my harness racing journalism success as they inspired material; I enjoyed income from published works about betting on harness racing. There were many periodicals covering the sport in the '80s. My byline appeared in *Sulky*, *Hoof Beats*, *Harness Horse* and *Gambling Times*. The pay was substantial.

A bulging bankroll developed and nothing prompts a gambler more than having extra money to dump into the pari-mutuel pools. Mr. Bruce and I became confident enough from our harness betting investments to attempt expanding. We took on the quarter horses at Los Al between harness meets. We traveled the turnpikes with bloated egos only to not last for a single quarter-horse program. Handicapping the sprinters was baffling and the action less dramatic as it presented blink-of-an-eye contests. As different as chalk and cheese for us harness experts. We laughed at the experience and held our breaths to return for the next harness meet.

But all was not well...

California harness racing in the '80s was only surviving due to die-hard fans like Mr. Bruce and I. The crowds once shoulder to shoulder on the aprons reduced by the month and left much space for bettors to stroll freely. Even our appearances lessened, but that was mostly due to professional and personal interruptions. Where did the others go?

We still stole time whenever we could to attend the two closest harness venues (a meet took place in Sacramento but it was out of our commuting range) but others did not. Could it be curtains for harness racing all together out west?

My harness racing contacts offered a glimmer of hope in the shape of a new racing venue in the Pomona Valley; 30 miles east of Hollywood proper. I was told there were racetracks there on the Los Angeles County Fairgrounds. One for autodrag racing and there was a five-eighths track used for thoroughbreds during fairs. It was called Fairplex Park.

WEDNESDAY

Like most addicts, I have a sixth sense of who is using and who is not; this is not a talent to be proud of. I am not picking up any drug vibes at the horse barns. So, I asked Rhonda about the substance problems in racing. For once, she had a lot to say.

She said that drugs are a problem in the sport, just like in real life. She also said, in her opinion, usage was like the sorting hat in Harry Potter. Some outfits had drug use, some were alcohol, some were family-oriented, and some, like this one, were clean. She said she left a few places after getting fed up with the problems.

She said that working in a training center was different than racing. Training centers were daytime, same people, and you went home. You could lead an everyday life. Going to the races at night is a different world, but the money is much better if you do both.

Then, she gave me advice, which was very un-Rhonda-like. "Girl, if you decide to return to the world of racing, start at a breeding farm, a good fairground in the sticks, or a training center. For somebody in your situation, you need more horse and less drama." Then Rhonda made her first wisecrack and said, "You should try to set yourself up with 10 horses and no people, maybe just a list of chores tacked to the door. That's my dream job."

THURSDAY

I like working at the barns. Horses don't talk. Well, they sort of talk. They are each a little different, so let's say they don't talk out loud or talk back. One of my many problems is my mouth. Loud and stupid stuff comes out at an alarming rate. It always feels like somebody is pushing me into a corner, and then I do two things: shoot up or talk too much.

The horses take my mouthiness off the table, but here is a strange thing: I talk to the horses all the time. I talk nice, gently. I guess the shrinks say horses are non-threatening, and they are probably correct. Truthfully, the best time is just me and the horses. Even when Rhonda is in the barn, some quiet magic goes away. I clench up inside when three or four people are around, at lunchtime, or when the straw guy is working.

FRIDAY

I dropped out of school when I was 15. I headed straight to the streets and the gutter. Boys and men came along. I talk a big game and scoff at regular people, but that is just a front. I blew off all my early years in a rush to get nowhere. I want to say I could write a book about how to screw up a wonderful life, but it is all a blur, and as you see, my writing ain't that great for a book.

Here is another thing I like about the barn and the work with the horses; it has a nice rhythm to the day. You clean the stalls, do the buckets, brush the horses, dress the horses, wash the horses. I mean, you can't sit on your ass. It is real work, but unlike many jobs, it seems to make sense.

SATURDAY

We try to deceive ourselves and other people. She asked us to pick three actions in our lives where we were wrong and to say them out loud to another person. Then she said if saying them to another person was too painful, we should write them in our journals.

I was wrong about this journal. Writing these words is NOT stupid. I enjoy writing and putting down what is inside me on paper.

I was wrong about Ellen, the therapist. She is a nice person, and she does care about us. After being a total bitch to her for the first few weeks, she doesn't hold my words and actions against me. I was wrong that the horse therapy was another money-making scam. I could tell you horror stories about the rehabilitation business, but this is not one. The horses are amazing, the people at the farm are nice, and nobody has an agenda.

Do not expect me to say these three things out loud. I'm not there yet.

And here is something strange, my only relief from the eggshells last week and today were the hours around the horses. Maybe I should grab a sleeping bag and move into a stall.







Armbro Nest, 32, dies

It is with great sadness that Diamond Creek Farm announces that Armbro Nest has passed away at 32 years of age.

After the passing of She's a Great Lady in early 2023, Armbro Nest took on the role of the farm's resident matriarch. She maintained her cool demeanor, perhaps softening ever so slightly to the extra attention the position gave her.

In the words of Adam Bowden from the "Golden Girls" series:

"Armbro Nest has gone from alpha mare to matronly caretaker in the course of the last [now 14] years. "Since her last foal, Eagle Nest, who arrived in 2010, she has taken to retired life with grace. She used to dominate the other mares in a way that exuded greatness.

"Her loosely termed, best friend, She's A Great Lady, was always under her hoof from the time they arrived until well after their last foals came. Armbro Nest and She's A Great Lady were not only stablemates during their race careers but become pasture mates at Peninsula Farms before we purchased both. They ended up being buddied up together when they arrived and have remained together since.

"While 'Great Lady' dominated the racing headlines, Armbro Nest [a daughter of Dragon's Lair—La Toya], was no slouch on the racetrack, earning \$674,821 and possessing a speed mark of 1:50.4. She produced nine foals including seven yearlings that went through the sales ring averaging \$134,286. Every one of her foals made it to the track and eight took marks in 1:56 or faster including three who earned \$300,000+. Although not quite as talented as her Great Lady stablemate, 'Nest' outshined her in the breeding shed and seemed to rub it in by dominating her in the field."

To the end, Armbro Nest was always the stoic, plain brown mare with her own mind. She was so lucky to have been so loved and cared for by Gina who gave her all the attention (and bright pink blankets) that she never wanted, but secretly enjoyed. What a life of love for an old broodmare.

We will always mourn the loss of these great mares. When they pass, it is always a time for reflection and sadness. They are the foundation of Diamond Creek, and we could never celebrate our current accomplishments without honoring those that were part of the beginning.

Armbro Nest has gone to be reunited with her forever stablemate and best friend, She's A Great Lady, in the greener pastures that await all these magnificent mares.

Cote assisted in Bourgault investigation

Further details on the <u>death of the standardbred</u> racehorse «Finish Line» at the hand of trainer Frederick Bourgault at a New York training facility last July reveal that Brice Cote, private investigator for Jeff Gurals racetracks, played an integral role in the process that led to Bourgaults indictment by Orange County District Attorney David Hoovler and eventual arrest on Jan. 30.

Cote was first made aware of the abuse by a confidential source soon after it occurred. He immediately contacted officials at Gural's tracks to have Bourgault excluded from any presence or participation at those tracks and set about seeing to the details of the overall investigation.

Cote then acquired the name of the attending veterinarian who had euthanized the horse, a young woman with limited experience in the field who had never encountered a situation like this one and was badly shaken by it. Cote helped guide her through the steps necessary to deal with the troubling incident and a course to get it to the hands of the proper authorities.

Cote, a former NJ. State Trooper, advised the veterinarian to report the abuse to the NY Gaming Commission and to involve the N.Y. State Police as well.

The police opened an investigation, relying heavily on Cote for guidance in a situation with which they had virtually no experience. Their investigation eventually required the exhumation of the corpse and a necropsy performed to confirm the injuries that ultimately led to the horse's death.

These details provided reliable evidence that enabled the Orange County DA to indict Bourgault for the crime.

Brice Cote's experience and expertise, along with the concern for horses that is a priority at the Gural tracks, went a long way in assuring the investigation process would support the charges for these brutal, malicious deeds and rid the industry of those who would commit them.

The SBOANJ remains committed to securing NJ appropriation

The Standardbred Breeders and Owners Association of New Jersey (SBOANJ) remains committed to working with the State Legislature and Gov. Phil Murphy to secure an extension of the state's annual appropriation for racing from 2025 through fiscal year 2029.

In January, the governor declined to act on a bill that would have extended the appropriation for five years, resulting in a pocket veto. The legislation was one of 12 bills that were not signed into law by the governor on Jan. 16, the final day for bills sent to the governor in the last 10 days of the previous legislative session to be approved.

Legislators can reintroduce the bills in the current session.

The racing appropriation legislation was passed by the Assembly, 73-0, and by the Senate, 35-1, during the State Legislature's lameduck session that ended in early January. Although the governor has not released a public statement regarding the situation, based upon our conversations with the Governor and his senior staff, he preferred the legislation be a part of the upcoming budget process in June instead of an off-line appropriation outside the FY25 budget. We take the Governor at his word and will continue to work with his Administration and Legislative Leadership to extend our appropriation another five years.

There can be no doubt the past appropriations strengthened the industry at a grassroots level while fostering growth and promoting breeding and racing in New Jersey. Harness racing in New Jersey enjoyed success on multiple levels, whether looking at stallions standing in the state, yearlings sold at auction, participation in the Sire Stakes program, or money generated from wagering. Many of the sport's brightest stars, human and equine, call New Jersey home.

Gov. Murphy and the members of the State Legislature have been strong supporters of the racing industry, and the SBOANJ remains dedicated to seeing the appropriation approved during the new legislative session now under way. The SBOANJ board, TrotPAC, and our lobbying group will continue to work diligently toward that goal.

Chris Lems notches career win 3,000 at The Meadows

Chris Lems collected career win 3,000 when he piloted **Bars Open** to victory in Friday's (Feb. 2) second race at Hollywood Casino at The Meadows.

"It's a real good feeling, something I had to get past," he said of his milestone win. "When you're coming to a mark like that, it always seems like it takes forever to get there."

In addition to his winning drives, he's compiled 188 victories as a trainer. Combined, his wins have been worth about \$25.8 million in purses.

Lems, a South Dakota native who now calls Stowe, OH, home, is a third-generation horseman who apprenticed with his uncles in Iowa and Minnesota. He recorded his first driving win in 2003 at Oskaloosa on the Iowa fair circuit. His most productive year was 2022, when he notched 315 wins.

"I always wanted to do this growing up," he said. "I really didn't think much about any other career."

Among his favorite horses, Lems lists Winning Shadow, a 9-year-old Jordan Hope trainee who's won 64 races and more than \$939,000 in his career, and he's still active. In 2022, Lems guided him to his lifetime mark of 1:52.3 at MGM Northfield.

"He's been an awesome horse," Lems said. "I can't really put too many in front of him."

Lems drives regularly in Ohio and at The Meadows, often working at multiple venues on the same day. It's a rigorous schedule, but he intends to stick with it.

"Northfield has been my base for six or seven years," he said. "I came to The Meadows originally to get my retirement starts. But I've been getting enough work, so it's worked out. The trip between the two tracks isn't too bad. I don't have a stable of my own anymore. If I still had a stable, driving at both tracks would be too much to do."

Hot Mess Express goes out a winner at Big M

Showing the heart of the champion she's been throughout her racing career, **Hot Mess Express** made her final career start a winning one Friday night (Feb. 2), taking a mid-range conditioned pace for mares at The Meadowlands in 1:53.2 in ultra-game fashion.

"It brought tears down my face for her and [driver] Anibal [Borjas]," said owner Sam Bowie, a former college and professional basketball standout. "They are both very deserving. Hot Mess Express showed so much class and determination. It was a beautiful way for her to end her racing career."

Sent to the gate as the 7-2 third choice in the betting, Hot Mess Express was away quickly from post 8 in the eight-horse field (there was one scratch), but so were 7-5 favorite Pattycake Mooss and 15-1 outsider I Love Ongait, which forced Borjas to back into the 4-hole as 'Pattycake' hit the quarter in :28 and the half in :57.1.

With the outer flow starting to take shape, Hot Mess Express had no choice but to vacate the rail just after the half and made-up ground steadily while first-over, getting to within a half-length of the leader as three-quarters was timed in 1:25.3.

At the head of the lane, Pattycake Mooss shrugged off 'Hot Mess', but the Tony Alagna trainee, who finished her career with a bank account of \$949,284, would not be denied, using every inch of the stretch to steadily chip away at the public choice's

edge before gunning that one down right as they hit the wire to record her 29th lifetime win (from 68 starts) by a head. Let's Misbehave finished third.

"Based on her last two starts [third-place finishes with better foes] she was sitting on a big effort," said Alagna. "She likes to rough it when she's sharp."

"I knew I had to move [at the half] because if I stayed at the rail, I'd be last," said Borjas. "When I started yelling at her, she listened to me and woke up. She's very special to me. I want to say thanks to Sam Bowie and Tony Alagna for the opportunity to drive this horse."

The 6-year-old daughter of Panther Hanover—My Heart Was True, who won 13 of 16 outings during a 3-year-old season that saw her bank \$631,634 while taking the 2021 Nadia Lobell and Mistletoe Shalee, is now off to the breeding shed after paying \$9.80 to win.

"She'll head to Hunterton Farm [in Paris, KY] next week and will be bred to Captaintreacherous in the spring," said Alagna.

And no doubt be a mom to more champions.

A LITTLE MORE: Dave Miller led the driver colony with four victories on the program. 'The Buckeye' also had three winners last Friday (Jan. 26). All-source handle on the 14-race card totaled \$3,276,820. It was the sixth time from eight nights of racing that wagering went past the \$3-million mark this year.

The \$6,500 filly and mares open saw **Perfect Queen** (Thomas Merton) easily dispatch her contemporaries as she strolled home to a commanding 2-1/4 length victory for owner/trainer Tiffany Barrett in 1:57.3, the fastest mile of the day, and paid \$5.10 to win.

We The Female (Moeykens) regained her winning ways after her five-race win streak was snapped last week when she drew the 8-hole. This week, from the rail, she was much the best in a wire-to-wire 1:58.3, paying \$3.40 to win for trainer Raheim Strong.

Getaway (Taggart) has put together a three-race win streak with a 1:57.4, \$8.50 score for trainer Shane Taggert and owner Amy Lynn Taggart.

Pocono Downs announces 2024 schedule

Pocono Downs at Mohegan Pennsylvania is gearing up for its 59th racing season, which begins on Feb. 17 and runs through Nov. 16. Post time will be 1 p.m. with the exception of Sundays, which will have a 6 p.m. post time.

The first qualifiers will be on Monday (Feb. 12). The deadline to enter will be Friday (Feb. 9) by 11 a.m. Qualifiers will also be held on Tuesday (Feb. 13). The deadline for those will be the previous day at 11 a.m. Qualifying races will start at 10 a.m. The following week qualifying races will be on the regular day of Wednesday. There will be a 90-day entry rule in place at the start of the season. The 45-day entry rule will go into effect with the draw for April 8.

The ever-popular Game Of Claims Series gets underway on Saturday (March 2). Horses of various claiming prices (and gaits) will compete in Game Of Claims events through March and April. Nominations and nominating fees will be due at the time of the 1st leg for each category. A new rule this year will be that a horse must have started in all three preliminary legs in order to be in the final.

The Bobby Weiss Series, with its 13th edition, will start its preliminaries on Saturday (April 6) and races through to their Championships on the four days starting April 27. There will be a \$100 nominating fee due on Feb. 15, which should be sent to the Pocono race office along with the nomination form.

The Pennsylvania-sired stakes season begins on Sunday (May 5) with a Pennsylvania All-Stars event; the PA Sire Stakes and Stallion Series make their first appearance on Saturday (May 18). This year the starting fee for the Pennsylvania All Stars events has been reduced from \$400 to \$200. This year Pocono will host the \$252,000 championships for all four of the 3-year-old divisions on Monday (Sept. 9).

On Saturday (Aug. 17) Pocono Downs at Mohegan Pennsylvania hosts its premier card of the season, the \$2 million Sun Stakes Saturday, with the finest 3-year-olds in North America coming to The Downs and racing in a main event and consolations based on seasonal earnings. For the 3-year-old pace, the Max C. Hempt Memorial and the 3-year-old open trot, the Earl Beal, Jr. Memorial, the main offers \$300,000 purse. Each will have a \$200,000 and \$100,000 consolation. For 3-year-old fillies on the pace, the James M. Lynch Memorial; and on the trot, the Delmonica Hanover. Their main events go for \$250,000. The consolations will be going for \$125,000 and \$75,000. As always, the \$75,000 second consolation will have no starting fee. There will also be \$100,000 invitationals for older horses on both gaits on the Sun Stakes Saturday card.

Nominations and nominating fees for the Sun Stakes Saturday and Pennsylvania All Stars events are due on Feb. 15. They are to be sent to the Hambletonian Society.

Horsemen are reminded to get their online racing applications sent in well before entering to race. Preference will be given to those who have completed this mandatory requirement as well as having submitted all the required medication paperwork. Horses that do not have the required paperwork on file at scratch time will be scratched and the trainer will receive a \$200 fine. Gural: Dealing with regulators can be maddening

I saw a story about a thoroughbred trainer having difficulties with HISA [the Horseracing Integrity and Safety Authority] and I thought people should know what it's like to deal with the state regulators.

In 2021, Captain Cowboy, a horse I owned with Ake Svanstedt was disqualified along with four other trainers — Brian Brown, Julie Miller, Bret Schwartz and Doyle Bross. They all had horses disqualified because of a high reading of Dexamethasone. I knew that it was impossible that these five horses all tested positive, and we learned later that the lab was doing a necropsy on a horse that had Dexamethasone in their system. We assumed the split sample would come back negative but that was not the case so the experts I talked to said it had to be a problem in the lab. Easy enough, we asked the state to do a urine sample and we offered to agree that whatever the results of the urine sample showed we would abide by it. To my surprise, the [Ohio] Racing Commission told us that they did not have to do a urine sample and we were out of luck. This was shocking as I had just assumed that they would want to know the truth. The reality was that they had no interest in the truth. My guess is they didn't want to show that the lab made a mistake as that might hurt them in future cases.

In any case, the lawyer I hired consulted with other experts and we decided to ask a Judge to order them to provide a urine sample since we knew they had the urine available. To make a long story short, after fighting with them for two years they finally agreed without a urine sample to dismiss all five positives and sent the purse money to the owners of the five horses.

That is the good news. The bad news is that my legal fees and the experts we hired combined cost \$270,000. We recouped about half of that in purse money. The message here is obviously if you get a positive you have no choice but to just suck it up, pay the fine and take the days. It is literally impossible to prove your innocence without spending a fortune in legal fees.

I hate to agree with Faraldo, but he is right when he talks about these crazy positives based on picograms of some prohibited substance. We are far better off sitting down with HISA and coming up with a plan that we can all agree with in establishing how we can address the positives coming from either lab errors or environmental factors.

Anyone who thinks that dealing with the state regulators is easy is fooling themselves. Had I not been so annoyed at the Ohio Racing Commission's refusal to order a urine sample I would have never spent all this money. Fortunately, it appears the owners are going to give me the monies they will receive as a result of this effort so I will only have lost about \$135,000 trying to prove that these five positives were a mistake.

Faraldo skeptical about HISA offer

RE: HISA will customize regulations to fit standardbred industry

The RMTC (Racing Medication and Testing Consortium) people too were once open to discussions and customizations for harness racing's different performance model, or so we were told. Based upon that expressed openness, for seven years the USTA had a seat at their table and contributed funds to have our talking points heard by the very same people who unfortunately have now been anointed to HISA's only scientific committee. What makes anyone think that the latest stated openness towards the customization of rules for harness racing is any more meaningful now, than as was promised before? Empty promises are nothing more than that.

What is needed now, and which has been sought from all those alleged to have influence in the process, is the precise wording that will be forthcoming from a special Harness Racing Scientific Committee, not a committee dedicated to the thoroughbred industry. The wording we would need to see is the precise wording that will be sent to the FTC to implement separate but uniform rules that apply to harness racing, when and if harness racing is brought under this private agency's jurisdiction and/or the creation of a separate Harness Racing Scientific Committee with the same independent powers afforded the current thoroughbred committee, and not subservient to it.

There is no reason to accept empty promises from those same people, now in charge at HISA, who have long stated that a "horse is a horse" no matter how different the breed. The same people who have long refused to recognize such a factual difference in our horses and our performance model. The same people who use boast about using testing methodologies that can prove that a substance permitted to be used within a certain

time period, can be detected in a horse way beyond that period or below an already meaningless threshold level then going so far even as to charge a current trainer for an administration that may have occurred when the current trainer did not even have the horse. If the hand writing on the wall is to rid us of race day Lasix, this new approach seems to signal an effort to seriously curtail the use of therapeutic medications altogether.

Different breeds should have rules that are uniform, with scientifically based sensible threshold levels. Rules designed to apply specifically to the harness racing industry uniform throughout every state developed by our own scientific committee.

American Winner should be in the Hall of Fame

American Winner is a horse, that I feel, is long overdue for inclusion in the Harness Racing Hall of Fame. The colt, by Super Bowl, was a sensational performer on the track and a stallion whose name has been scattered through the pedigrees of top performers for over two decades.

On the track, he was not only a world champion racehorse that garnered attention due to his patriotic name and racing colors, but also a horse that traveled the country while piling up Grand Circuit wins in trotting's biggest races against top competition. His legacy continues to live on today through his ability to pass his genes to some of racings most accomplished trotters.

I am aware that there are "benchmarks" and certain statistics that are often looked at when deciding if a particular horse is worthy of recognition or not. That is a fair process that places appropriate guidelines for inclusion, but I strongly believe this horse was ahead of his time on the racetrack and has somehow been overlooked throughout the years. Just a simple opening of the Stallion book, and one can see that his name is littered through the pedigrees, not just of the stallions but of their progeny as a very productive broodmare sire.


American Winner was the third foal out of Hall of Fame broodmare BJ's Pleasure, herself a sister to Mack Lobell. The colt was a homebred for owners Bob Key and Dr. John Glesmann. Anyone that was familiar with Mr. Key would probably tell you that he was certainly unconventional and sometimes perplexing in the way he managed his horses. While Mr. Key, in his own right, should be a Hall of Fame candidate simply based off the wins and numbers he compiled during his 40+ years as one of the sport's most passionate owners, he may have added a hurdle or two for American Winner from the track to the breeding shed.

Inarguably, the stallion's greatest ancestral achievement is through his daughters, most notably, Yankee Blondie, the dam of Muscle Hill. Contributing a quarter of the genes to perhaps the greatest trotting racehorse and sire that has ever lived is no small feat. He is also the sire or broodmare sire and to many other great horses, including seven world champions, 10 millionaires and plenty of quality racehorses. I have listed a few statistics and facts below to support American Winner's status as a Hall of Fame horse and a true contributor to what the standardbred trotter is today.

American Winner as a racehorse:

The bay colt had several trainer changes during his time on the circuit, the most significant being before the beginning of the major 3-year-old stakes races in 1993. After his current trainer resigned, ownership decided to hand over the lines to Milton Smith, who at the time was employed by Mr. Key as a horse transporter. Obviously, that decision would pay off as not only did Milton Smith become the first African-American trainer to win the Hambletonian, but he became only the second since Billy Haughton to win both eliminations and the final in harness racing's biggest race.

At age 3, American Winner won 15 of 22 starts, was second four times, and third two times for \$1,299,468. Only once was he out of the money. His main rival, Hall of Fame horse Pine Chip, sports similar stats from 24 starts: he was 16-4-1 to earn \$1,363,483 with the same world record-setting mark of 1:52.3.



At the time, this was the second fastest mile in history for any trotter. Despite a rigorous schedule and soreness, he still came home third in his 22nd start of the season in the Breeders Crown 3-year-old trot.

From May to mid-September, he tore through the Grand Circuit where he won 14 of 15 (second once), including a streak of nine in a row. During this stretch he conquered the Hambletonian (stakes record), Yonkers trot (stakes record), Dexter Cup, Currier and Ives, and the Zweig (world record). Five of these miles were in 1:54 or quicker, blazing speed in 1993. He won the Yonkers Trot going away by 10 ½ lengths. And not only was his Hambletonian victory a new record, it beat Mack Lobell's record by a full second.

From the seven times that he did not cross the wire first, six of them were respectable losses to Hall of Fame horse Pine Chip. Other notables he was defeating during this season; SJ's Photo (\$1,300,946), Hi Noon Star (\$859,264), Toss Out, Striking Sahbra.

American Winner as a sire:

His greatest son on the track and in the breeding shed is Hall of Fame horse Credit Winner, winner of just shy of \$1.5 million. Credit Winner has gone on to have a very successful career as a stallion, producing horses such as: Devious Man, Chocolatier, Crazed, Archangel, Dejarmbro, among many others. American Winner's genes are also shown through Credit Winner's success as a broodmare sire with recent horses like Ready for Moni, Raised by Lindy, and Play Trix On Me.

Furthermore, American Winner has made his mark overseas as well, siring the likes of Viking Kronos, who was a European sensation and sire of Maharaj and broodmare sire of current stallion, Readly Express.

As a stallion he never produced the number of foals as many commercial stallions. This was largely due to his owner utilizing him to breed mostly his own mares. Other than his first crops, where he stood at Hanover, he did not reside at one of the breed's premiere stallion farms. However, despite his smaller crops he still managed to sire an extraordinary number of fast and lucrative offspring. In comparison to some of his "peers" and his own best son, you can see that even while his production was less, he stayed very comparable with the speed and quality to these other dominant stallions.

American Winner as a broodmare sire:

This is where American Winner's legacy can be seen the clearest. To start, he was the broodmare sire of 169 \$100,000 winners from only 532 starters. From these same starters came 10 millionaire horses in America. This list also displays seven world champions that include: Muscle Hill, Maven, Break the Bank K, Sand Vic, Classic Photo, and Win Missy B (2 Heat World Champion).

Some other impressive horses on this list include: Solveig, the dam of Uncle Lasse and of three-time Dan Patch winner Shake It Cerry. Also, on the list is Winning Mister, another world champion millionaire racehorse and six-time track record breaker.

His greatness has also shown to carry through with successful inbreeding that can be seen in some of the best trotters of the last decade. These 3x3 crosses include; Hambletonian winner Royalty For Life, superstar sires Bar Hopping and Resolve, young sire You Know You Do, as well stakes-winning horses like Looking For Zelda, and the blazing fast filly Asiago.

When compared again to some of his "peers" he seems to hold up well. As a broodmare sire, again, despite smaller numbers, his 10 millionaires are certainly in the company of other Hall of Famers: Valley Victory (7), Andover Hall (9) Cantab Hall (7), Pine Chip (6), Credit Winner (4). Among these, only Muscles Yankee has more, with 14.

I believe the legacy of greatness that American Winner has left for today's trotters is apparent and undeniable. From his speed and dominance on the track, to his ability to pass that excellence on to further generations of trotters all over the globe, he is most definitely a horse deserving of the honor. Again, I understand that today there are certain boxes to check and stats to compile, but I believe this horse's performance both on and off the track are Hall of Fame worthy. I passionately believe that the Harness Racing Hall of Fame would be leaving a void in the breed's history without the inclusion of a horse that has contributed so much to racing history and to the pedigrees of today's best trotters.
